The season and the holiday are a contradiction. But here it is autumn with its flaming and colorful foliage. God speaks to us from the flaming bush, for it is in the process of destruction that He also spoke to Moses from the burning bush. Autumn marks the end of nature's life. The earth is getting ready for winter. Leaves have withered now and dropped away. The grass is turning brown. The cold dead winter is about to descend. No wonder Thomas Hardy said, "Give me the roughest of spring days rather than the loveliest of autumn days, for there is death in the air."

Does autumn mark the destruction of nature's life? We read the Community National Bank. in the scriptures, "The bush burned with fire and the bush was not consumed". It is like that with the autumnal bush. Autumn is not the consummation of life, but the renewal of life. The leaves drop because there is a tiny bud which pushes the leaf from the twig. It is a season of sowing. The rotting fruit on the ground buries its seeds. Farmers know that autumn is not only a time of harvest but also a time of planting. With Whittier we can therefore sing, "Thine is the seedtime. God alone beholds the end of what is sown; beyond our vision weak and dim, the harvest-time is hid with Him."

When we become thoughtful about autumn we realize that nature is preparing itself for spring. Let us be thankful then that the message of autumn is that of the continuation of life not death, hope not defeat, and of springtime as well as winter. When we are thoughtful we can be thankful.

In being thoughtful of others, one is reminded of the severe hardship the Pilgrim fathers endured during a cold and frigid winter when the food allotment was but five kernels of corn a day. Historians tell us that the Pilgrim ancestors had a custom on Thanksgiving Day which was a reminder of their forefathers' suffering. When the family was seated, upon each bare plate was placed five kernels of corn. After thanks was given "the turkey with all the trimmings" was served. This Thanksgiving let us all appreciate God's bounteous blessings and say with the Psalmist: "Bless the Lord O my soul, and forget not his benefits". Psalm

HEALTH DEPARTMENT **CAUTIONS ABOUT** CARE OF FOWL

Thanksgiving Day turkeys and other fowl must be handled with care both before and after the meal to avoid foodborne poisoning, the Michigan Department of Health reminded cooks and housewives today.

Extra care must be taken with fowl which are purchased frozen. The department recommended that frozen birds be thawed in a refrigerator. If a bird is thawed outside a refrigerator, microorganisms will multiply in the bird's exterior before the interior thaws.

The timetable for preparing the Thanksgiving dinner should allow sufficient time for thawing the bird, the department pointed out. A 20-pound bird takes three days to thaw in a refrigerator

Care also must be taken when stuffing the bird. The stuffing should be placed inside the bird just before it is placed in the oven. If the stuffing is prepared ahead of this time, it should be
