The Real Meaning Of Christmas

At this time our lights return to the crude little manger of Bethlehem where lay a little Babe who changed the whole world. What makes this season so sacred and filled with joy?

To Christians everywhere it is the day when Jesus Christ was born! Even with the celebration of Santa Claus in the home, Christmas is an empty, shallow affair without the blessedness of "keeping" Jesus' birthday. Why keep Christmas?

With the birth of Jesus a new day dawned on the world. It was moved quietly, serenely, peacefully among the villages of Judea and Galilee, speaking to the people about God and life. He preached a new doctrine of love and forgiveness. He mingled with the lowly and the outcasts and was scorned as their friend. Repulsive diseases and anguished sin won His tender sympathy and ministry. He offered no rank, no earthly glory; only service, self-sacrifice, and suffering. Yet He transformed the world!

And so it is on Christmas Day of all days when men's hearts are opened to one another by the impulses of the season, we come a little closer to an understanding of His purpose. You who have brought joy and laughter to little children, who have kindled a light in the tired eyes of a struggling mother, who have placed a hand of loving comradeship on the shoulder of a broken brother, who have in any way helped make lighter the burdens of a fellow mortal, you have to some degree, knowingly or not, fulfilled the promise which Jesus' birth brought to the world. Down in the heart of every mortal there is something noble and clean and fine; something made manifest to us in Bethlehem in a manger.

In a moving little story, The Keeper of the Inn, Bishop Remington points out the remorse the inn keeper must have felt when he turned away Mary and Joseph, and later discovered they were the parents of Jesus. "And so the Innkeeper missed the greatest opportunity that ever an Innkeeper had. Long years afterward it never did much good to repeat over and over again, 'They were but poor folk and how was I to know?'"

"We each one are the Keepers of the Inn. Never were there so many people on the roads demanding an entrance to our hearts and homes. Even as we prepare for our Christmas, we have rushed hither and yon, like little ants storing food, or heaping up little hills of dirt."

The "Inn" of each of our lives is the soul. It is God's "lodging place" where He likes to keep company with all His children. We find His presence there when we share His love with others, when we right what is wrong and evil, when we see the vision, "Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done, on earth as it is in Heaven," and serve Him to that end.

Like on many other days, there are many who are too busy to give God "room in the Inn". Give Him "room" this Christmas for there is another most important way which God finds a "lodging place" in the human heart, and that is in worshipping Him.

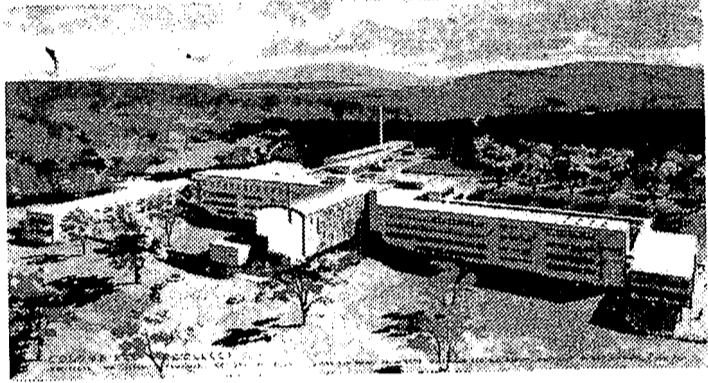

New College On T-V Sunday

Colombiere College, a four million dollar edifice now being built on Big Lake Road, Springfield Township, will be featured on a half-hour television program on Station WJBK-TV, Channel 2, next Sunday morning, December 22, at 8 o'clock.

The College is being built by the Jesuit Fathers and Brothers of the Detroit Province for the training of future Jesuit Priests and Brothers. The Society of Jesus, commonly known as the



Jesuits, has ten Provinces of the Order in the United States. One of these ten, the Detroit Province, was formed three years ago by an administrative division of the Chicago Province. The Detroit Province Jesuits operate the University of Detroit, and the University of Detroit High School; they conduct Gesu Parish and St. Peter and Paul (Jesuit) Parish in Detroit, and The Manresa House of Retreats for Men in Bloomfield Hills, besides parishes in Toledo, and parishes and a retreat house in St. Ignace High School and John Carroll University in Cleveland.

Each year many talented and capable young men from the Detroit area and the remaining area of the Detroit Province make application to become Jesuit Fathers and Brothers, and in order to train these young men to become future teachers, pastors, scientists, authors, retreat masters and missionaries, it was found necessary to build a new college since the former place of training, Milford Novitiate near Cincinnati, Ohio, was no longer able to accommodate the increasing number of applicants for admission to the Order.

An intensive search was made throughout the lower part of Michigan and northern Ohio for a suitable location, and the location finally chosen was the beautiful hilly spot on Big Lake Road about one-quarter mile west of U. S. 10, where construction is now in progress.

The television program featuring Colombiere College and the work of the Detroit Province Jesuits will be presented by Station WJBK-TV, Channel 2, at 8:00 A. M. next Sunday, December 22. All the members of the Clarkston area are cordially invited to tune in to Sunday's program to get acquainted with their new College.

residents of the area are invited to be present. This beautiful drama may be viewed from Buffalo Street in front of the church.

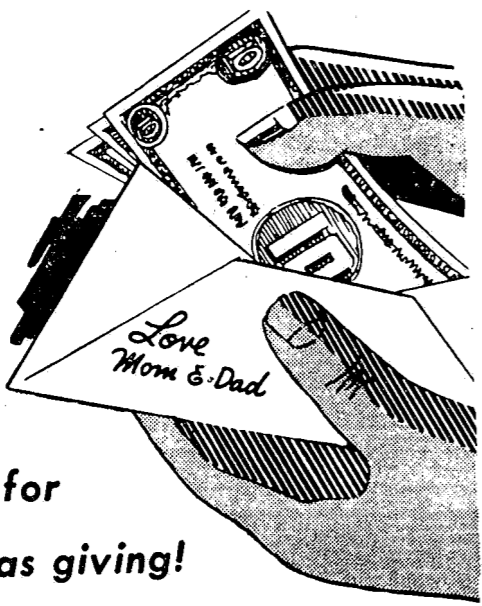

They will attend the State Science Fair at Hillsdale, the Metropolitan Science Fair in Detroit and the National Science Fair in Flint.

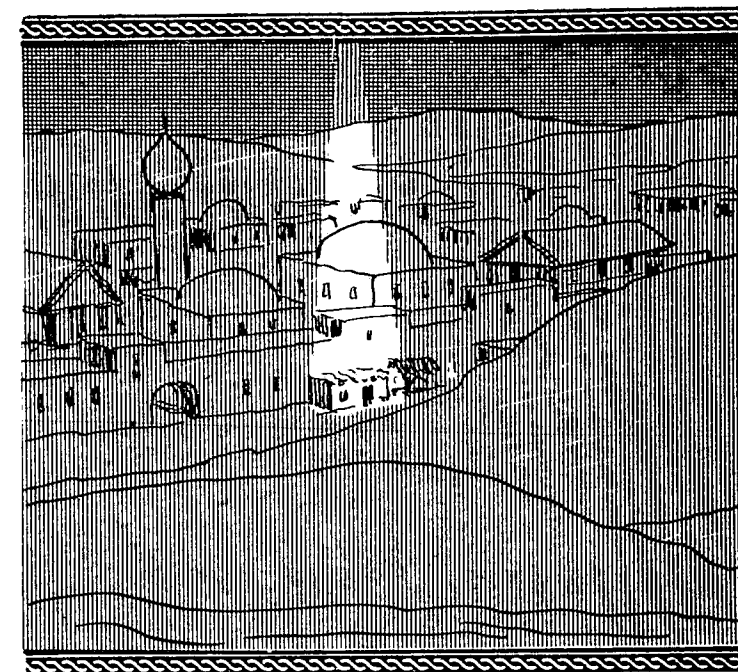
The Journal is sent to every Science Club in the state and throughout the country. This includes both college and high school clubs.

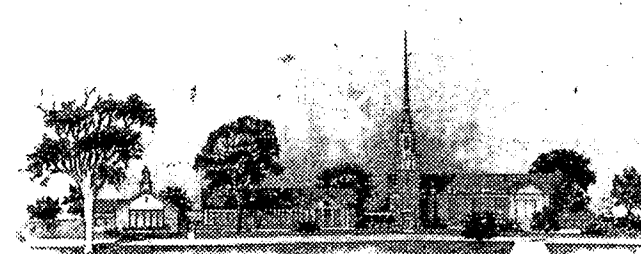
