Mrs. Roberts is the Elementary Curriculum Coordinator in the Livonia schools and has been in a supervisory capacity for the past eight years.

The course will grant three term-hours of graduate or undergraduate credit.

Michigan State is offering this course at Clarkston in response to numerous requests by interested area residents. The rapidly-expanding M. S. U. off-campus program enables adults to work towards degrees and teacher certification, to improve themselves professionally and to gain new skills without traveling to the East Lansing campus.

Chairman Named For March Of Dimes

The appointment of Mrs. Everett Dennis as Clarkston and Independence Township Chairman for the 1958 March of Dimes has been announced by Ernest Goldsworthy, Oakland County Campaign Chairman. Opening day for the polio drive is scheduled for January 2.

Mrs. Dennis said the 1958 campaign will emphasize the urgent task of caring for those who have been disabled by polio. The object is to restore them to lives as nearly normal as modern medicine can make them. She said the 1958 theme is "Survival is not enough".

The Oakland County Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis during 1957 gave financial aid amounting to \$5000 a month to a total of 192 men, women and children. Altogether, 1659 days of hospital care have been provided polio patients during the past twelve months.

"Those of us who are contributing our services to the March of Dimes realize we face a special challenge this year," Mrs. Dennis said. "We have seen the tremendous decline of new cases, thanks to Salk vaccine; as a result, maybe there are some who think that writes finis to polio. But this is far from true. What about the old cases? They run into thousands. The fact is that ninety percent of all March of Dimes funds being spent on patient care in 1957 is for 'old cases', those patients left on chapter rolls from preceding years. These patients are among the 300,000 living Americans who survived paralytic polio. We owe them the opportunity to get from life something more than mere vegetable-like survival."

"We also must continue to open new doors in the field of virus research. And we must provide new trained hands and minds for research, care of patients and the education of medical personnel—as well as continue to promote the use of Salk vaccine to prevent future cases of paralytic polio."

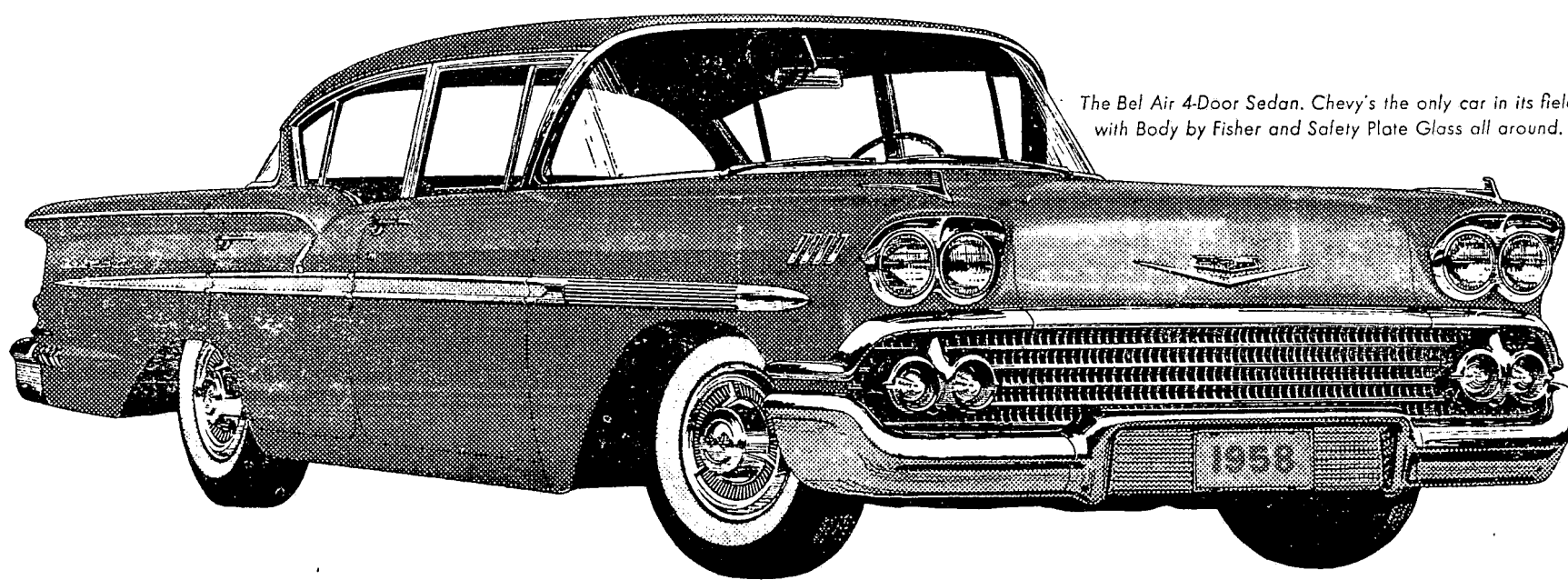

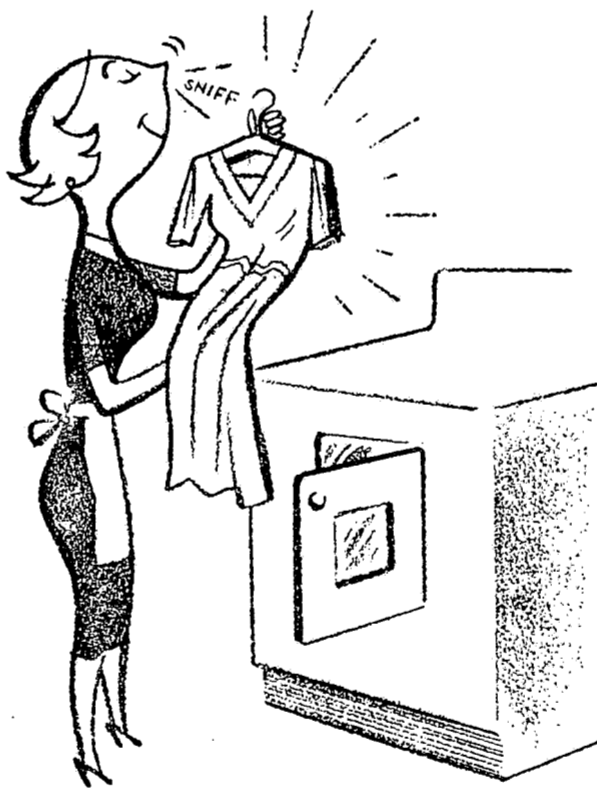
