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**Vanishing Species**



Michigan timber wolves, found only in the upper peninsula, face extinction as their numbers continue to decline. Latest evidence of this decrease is indicated by 1957 bounty records which show hunters and trappers killed only five wolves during the first 11 months of the year, compared with 28 during the same period in 1956.

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
