### ICE FISHING SEASON WELL UNDERWAY

The ice fishing season is well underway throughout Michigan and fishing shanties dot many of the state's inland waters.

Panfish, particularly bluegills and perch, are among the favorite catches of ice fishermen, with no closed season on non-trout waters throughout the state.

Other species open to year-round fishing on non-trout waters include white bass, sunfish, crappie, rock bass, warmouth bass and whitefish.

Anglers also may take muskellunge, northern pike and wall-eyed pike on all non-trout inland waters through March 15. Seasons on these species vary somewhat in the Great Lakes and connecting waters.

Spearing through the ice is popular with fishermen, especially during the winter. The sturgeon season on non-trout inland waters.

Spearing is permitted during January and February on inland non-trout waters—and some designated trout waters—for carp, suckers, mullet, redbreast, sheepshead, lake trout, smelt, northern pike, muskellunge, whitefish, ciscoes, pilotfish or Menominee whitefish, catfish, bullheads, dogfish and garpike. Use of artificial light for spearing also is legal during the two-month season.

Ice fishermen are reminded that all shanties must be identified on the outside with the owner's name and address in at least two-inch letters of insoluble material. All shelters must be removed before ice becomes unsafe.

Other regulations are listed in the 1953 Guide to Michigan Fish Laws, available free from license dealers or Conservation Department offices. The Guide also includes several important exceptions to general fishing regulations.

Lists of special spearing waters can be obtained from the Conservation Department Fish Division, Lansing 26.

### COMMERCIAL AIRLINES SEARCHED FOR BOMBS

A State Police training school in searching commercial airlines for bombs or other lethal devices was held at Willow Run Airport near Ypsilanti. It was the first school of its kind ever to be conducted in the country. The idea originated with Serg-

eant Joseph W. Lieberr, commanding officer of the Ypsilanti Post, who has led six plane searches at Willow Run since last fall due to anonymous telephone calls to the airlines that bombs had been placed aboard. The school was attended by two State Police pilots and a group of officers from all posts in the lower peninsula located near commercial airports at which emergency landings might be made because of bomb scares.

The procedure followed by Lieberr and which has been commended by the airlines for its thoroughness and time saved, is to isolate the plane out on the field, and immediately remove the passengers and luggage to a hangar. In company with a mechanic who is acquainted with all the compartments and can open locks, the officers then search the ship. Meanwhile, luggage also is searched, with the owner and an airline representative standing by.

Because in their hurried departure from the plane passengers often leave valuables behind, no one except the searcher is allowed aboard. When the search is completed the plane is released, after which the police turns it over to the airline for the resumption of service.

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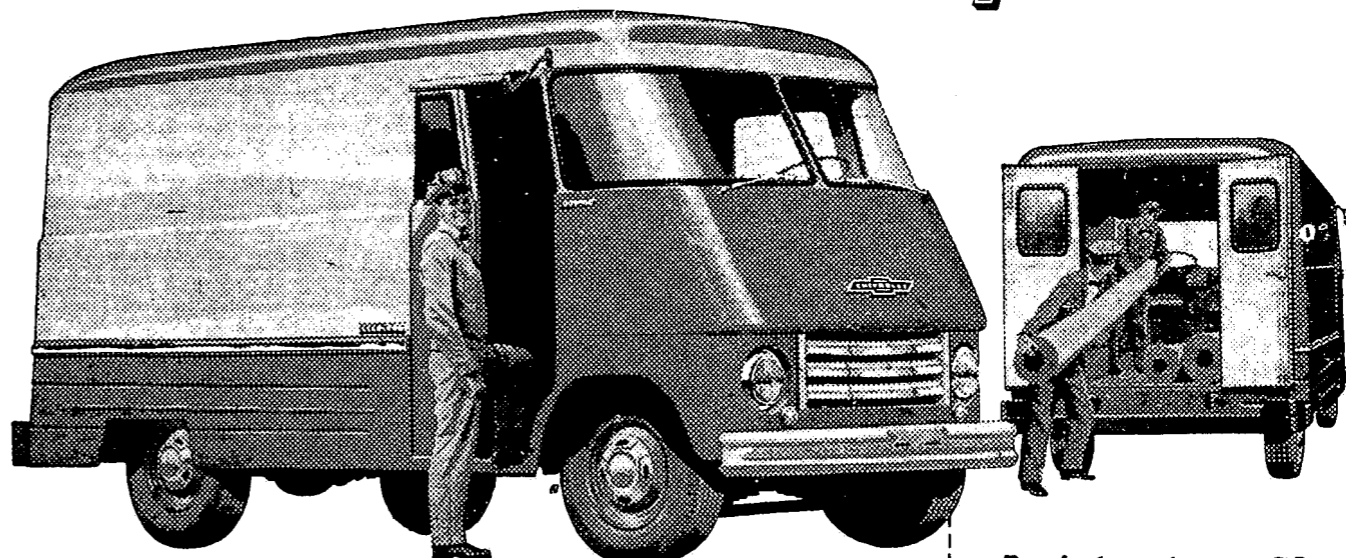

11-Million Members Mark Organization's 61st Year

On February 17 the world's largest voluntary service organization will celebrate its 61st birthday.

This is the National Congress of Parents and Teachers, whose nearly eleven million members are active today in P.T.A.'s throughout the 48 states, the District of Columbia, Alaska, and Hawaii. They will mark the organization's Founders Day with a variety of activities aimed at strengthening and expanding parent-teacher work in their own communities.

Mrs. Rollin Brown, of Los Angeles, president of the National Congress, points out that these 43,000 P.T.A.'s have set the pattern for parent-teacher associations in areas where U.S. armed forces have established American communities overseas. And parents of school children in other nations have sought help from the National Congress in forming similar groups to promote education in their countries.

Founders Day activities, scheduled for February 17, will honor two women whose imagination and energy for children planted the seed for this still-growing organization.

It was in 1897 that Alice McLellan Birney and Phoebe Apperson Hearst conceived the idea of a National Congress of Mothers to promote the health and welfare of children by helping their parents learn more about how to fulfill a child's physical and spiritual needs.

They worked hard to interest other women in their aims and approached the date they had set for the organizing meeting with hopes of seeing a hundred or so delegates arrive at Washington's Arlington Hotel. But "if only twenty-five are there," admitted Mrs. Birney, "I shall be satisfied."

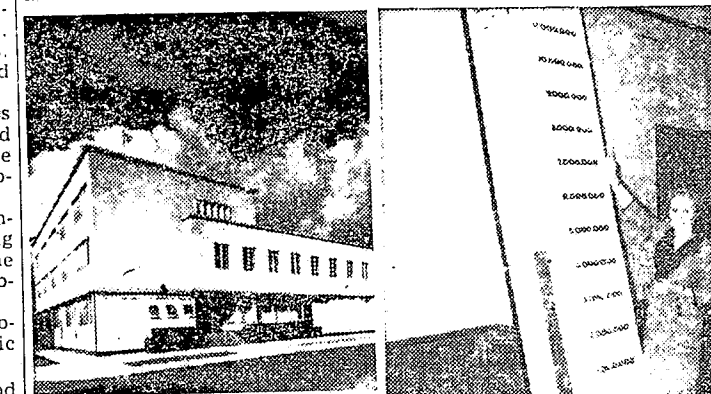
More than two thousand men and women turned out!

Their enthusiastic reception of the aims, as outlined by the Founders, and of the lectures, discussions, and conferences that made up the first meeting set the pace for a recent national movement. Soon state congresses were founded, and before long the original "mothers' congress" was broadened to include the

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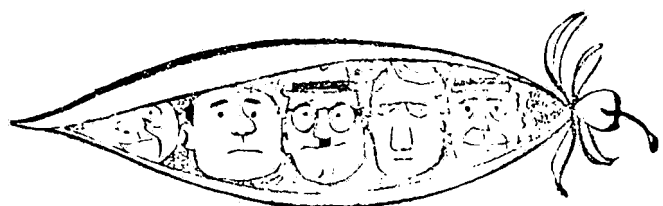
