Next Wednesday, February 19, is Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, when the churches of the Clarkston area will mark the occasion with divine worship. The Holy season of Lent marks a period of forty days which signifies the forty days Jesus spent in self denial in the wilderness. The forty days of Lent are observed by devout Christians everywhere as a period of self denial which might draw them closer to God. Members of First Methodist Church, Clarkston are using Lent this year, as a period in which: 1. They might channel God's love to all who meet them. 2. Restore Christian principles they have lost during the last year. 3. Make Sunday morning worship of God more important than anything else.

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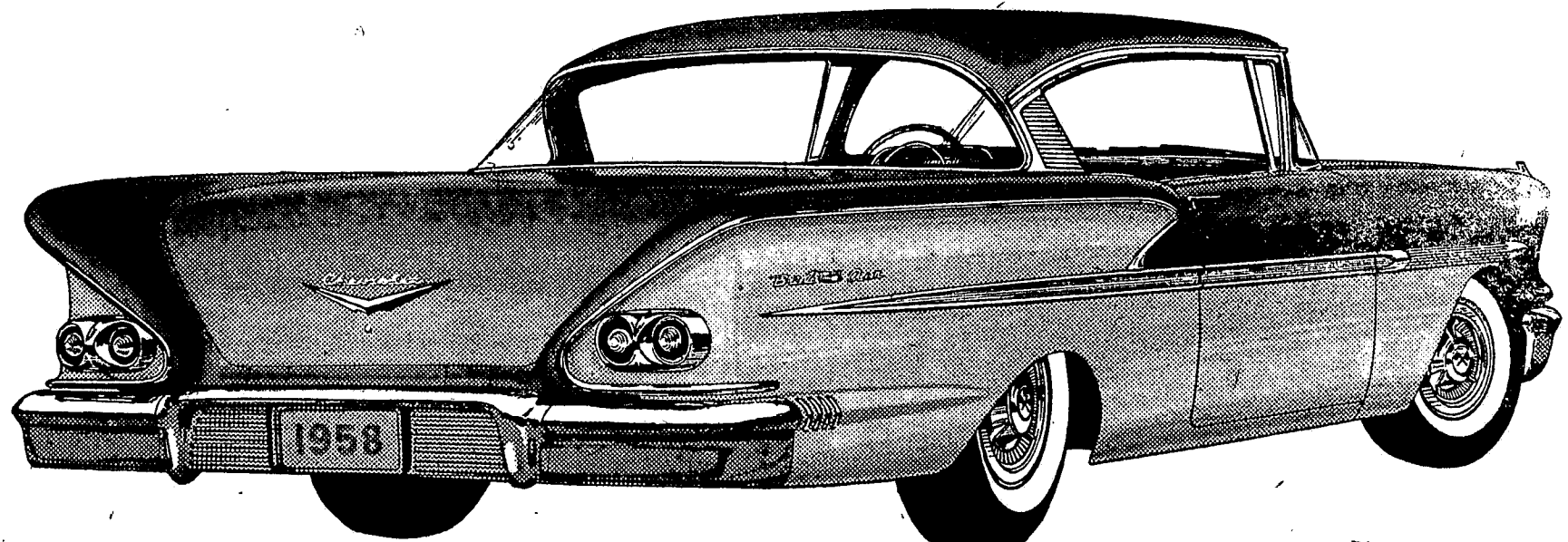
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**COUNTY REPUBLICANS MEET TUESDAY**

**HOCKEY WITH HUBER**

UNLESS ONE is the cockeyed optimist, which Ensign Nellie Forbush used to sing about in "South Pacific," one can plan to see the Prince of Wales Trophy reposing in the trophy case in the Montreal Forum throughout the 1958-59 hockey season. If one is a Montreal fan, one can then be an optimist anyway.

The Prince of Wales Trophy is awarded annually to the team which wins the season schedule championship in the National Hockey League. For a majority period of the past decade the trophy has rested in Olympia Stadium. In fact the Wings have been its custodians for eight of the last nine years.

**Two Trophies**

Hockey is peculiar in that it offers two trophies, though. In addition to the Prince of Wales award, for which all six clubs quest through a 70-game span stretching farther than the Straits Bridge, hockey also provides the Stanley Cup.

Actually, the latter trophy is better known than is the Prince of Wales. In Canada it is the most historic sports trophy of the Dominion. Canadians proudly point to it as the oldest sports team trophy in competition on the North American continent.

Four of the same six teams, which have battled for the Prince of Wales silver piece, are also eligible for the Stanley Cup competition. They are the Prince of Wales winner, and its three consorts, the teams which finished second, third and fourth in the season standings.

This season has produced the greatest battle in league history for those three positions. It can be simply called "a regular barn burner." No team has dropped as far out of contention for fourth place as the five teams have for first spot.

**Benefits Hockey**

Many times the value of the playoff system, its advantages and disadvantages, has been debated among the Stroh Press Box Coaches Club during their between-periods radio meetings. Experts themselves they have unanimously agreed that the benefits to hockey and the hockey fans far outweigh the weaknesses. Yet they have always had a sympathetic ear for the critics.

The current race provides the greatest possible arguments in favor of the playoff system. With the Canadian superiority early proven this season, principal interest in the make up of the other playoff pairings in the true justification for the league and with the closeness of the race, where almost every game becomes a "four pointer," one need look no deeper to prove that the playoff system has merit.

For it gives impetus to just about the toughest hockey possible, hockey which has the maximum of thrills, which the game provides the spectator, and which contains the ultimate in suspense. It is tense, nerve wracking for players and management, and true fans alike, but it is proof positive of the destiny for which hockey's playoff system has been conceived.

The Council is forming plans to rotate the meetings of the Council amongst the various organizations, both in the north and south end of Oakland County.
