STUDENTS PROTECTED BY STATE LAW

The 1957 Legislature passed an amendment to P. A.-148 of 1943 which is now effective.

The law provides that every private trade school and business school secure a card from the Department of Public Instruction to be carried by each representative when soliciting prospective students in Michigan.

This card has the name of the school and the name of the representative. The card to be presented when calling upon prospective students.

A school located outside of the State of Michigan that offers correspondence study or resident courses, must, make application to and secure a permit from the State Board of Education for their representatives who call on prospective students in this State.

These cards may be withdrawn for cause. All cards will expire on June 30 annually.

The reason for this legislation is to stop worthless, or of little value, courses being sold to students who cannot go to college but still desire to help themselves by home study.

1958 Assessments To Be Discussed

In August 1957 a reappraisal program began of all real estate in the Village of Clarkston (and in conjunction with Independence Township) in order to install a method of assessing the several properties on a basis that all property owners would be assessed on an equal basis.

The system used in this program is the approved method set up by the Michigan State Tax Commission in their assessing manual.

To determine what the 1958 village assessment would be the ratio between the 1957 values and the new appraised values was used, thus bringing about a value as close to 1957 as possible. This method shows up the over and under assessments of the past and currently places all properties on a fairer and more equal basis.

It is suggested that the several property owners avail themselves Tuesday, March 4th to appear at the Village Board of Review and find out their 1958 assessments. State Statutes provide this day when the property owner may legally be heard regarding his assessment. Subsequent action by property owner may be jeopardized by failing to appear in protecting his right of franchise.

All property assessments will be final at the adjournment of said Board.

The people of the Village of Clarkston are to be complimented for their fine cooperation and help that they extended to the several appraisers during the installing of the reappraisal program.

Several of the appraisers have stated that they had not worked in any other area where they were received so courteously as they were in the Village of Clarkston and the surrounding area.

Sometimes we feel that we agree with Noel Coward who, in one of his recent plays "Americans read entirely too many magazines".

Visit your library soon and enjoy with your children the pleasures and knowledge you will find there. Better to read the book than the review, we've decided.

M. E. S. Commission To Visit C. H. S.

Mr. Byron D. Williams and Mr. Carl Lown, vocational counselors from the Michigan Employment Security Commission, met with forty-five seniors from Clarkston High School last week. The M. E. S. C. offers a counseling program for seniors who are not planning to attend college. The following is a synopsis of the B. E. S. C. Counseling program.

First, the Employment Service has an overall program of services to youth of which the high school counseling program is a part of the effort to give better service to youth as they make their vocational choices and enter their first jobs. The high school seniors who are entering the labor market and have no vocational plan or a questionable plan, a plan inconsistent with senior's educational background. Also included in the program are the seniors who expect to enter service for whom employment service counseling would be beneficial in planning military service or post military service employment. (2) Placement service for those high school seniors who are entering the labor market and have made a vocational choice.

Through the employment service counseling program it is to be hoped that the senior will plan for a vocation, and in planning for a vocation the senior will plan in terms of his total assets and needs.

On February 20, Mr. Robert Draw, the testing director of M. E. S. C. tested our seniors who are engaged in this program. The vocational counselors will return within a short period and counsel each senior on an individual basis as to his or her vocational choice. We feel this is a wonderful program and it should be of considerable benefit to our seniors.

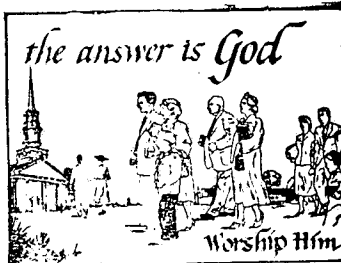

Once again I am in a position to write my report as per usual. After spending three weeks in captivity, at the local reformatory, I am very elated to report that I am in circulation again. I have not enjoyed my little, compulsory vacation, but I am forced to admit that the episode was not a complete waste of time. As fate would have it, I met some very interesting personalities during my stay at the jail. I have also recorded some very interesting data concerning the local penal institutions here on earth.

At a court session, the presiding magistrate found no record of past misdemeanors that I had committed. In fact he could find no record that I was even a citizen of the United States. This caused further complications which I will explain later. At any rate my sentence was shortened to three weeks, which I have served. For the present I am free to roam the streets once more.

After the hearing, I was escorted to a most uncomfortable little room with iron bars over the door and windows. Here I was forced to remain for the next three weeks. There were other men in the jail, also. I talked with them and recorded their stories one at a time. The information I attained from the prisoners will follow in one of my reports, after I arrange my notes.

Now to enlighten you more on the problem of having no identification at the Court Proceedings. The police sent to a central location where all crime reports are housed. They were able to find no record of my being a criminal or for that matter, even being born. This led to further investigations and the officials found that I had never signed up for the draft. 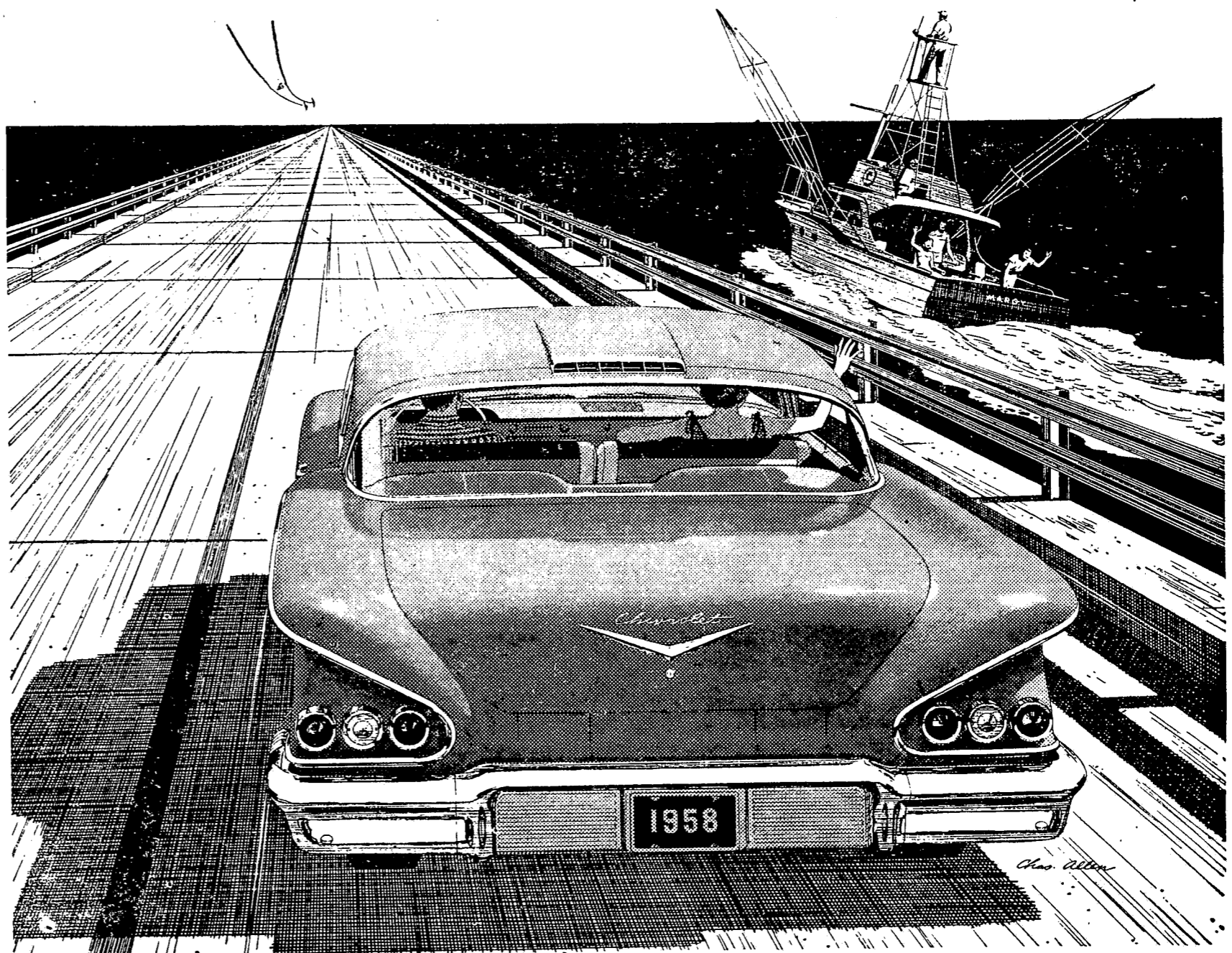

NEW MICHIGAN BOAT REGISTRATION LAW EFFECTIVE MARCH 1, 1958

Starting Saturday, March 1, Michigan's Sportsmen using boats or watercraft of any nature over 16 feet in length, and all motor propelled craft (inboard or outboard) regardless of length, will be required to register their craft with the Michigan Department of State.
 Richard O. Cook, Assistant Executive Vice-President of the Michigan Retailers Association, in speaking for the Michigan Sporting Goods and Marine Dealers Division of MRA, stated that the new law is designed to help curb theft, and the reckless operation of boats. Registration of the boat, with the requirement that the boats registration number must be placed in 3 inch high letters (painted or otherwise) on both sides of the bow of the craft, should materially assist law enforcement officers in tracking down stolen boats for return to their owners; and should also aid the officers in identifying violators of boating regulations and marine laws. The new law provides that it

shall be unlawful for any person to operate watercraft under the influence of intoxicating liquor or narcotics; or for any person to operate a watercraft in a manner such as to endanger the life and property of any person.

The registration will be applied for on a special application form prepared by the Secretary of State and available through the designated Branch offices of the Secretary of State, local Sheriff's Departments, and local marine dealers. The registration fee is \$2.00 and upon the receipt of the registration application and fee, the Department will process the form, return the registration certificate and assign a registration number.

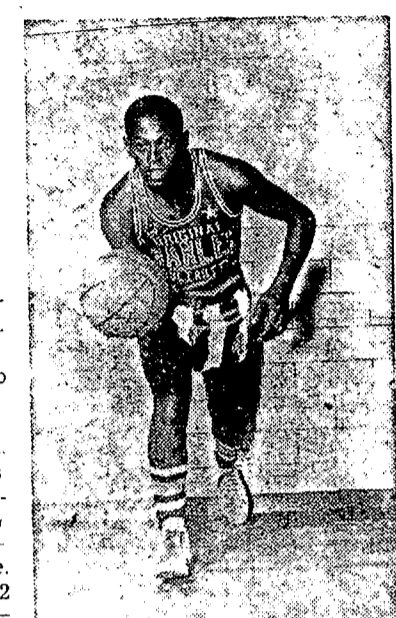

POLICE CAUTION YOUTHS ABOUT SHOOTING ROCKETS
 Shooting of experimental rockets by youths should be done only under supervision and after official permission has been obtained. Arnold C. Renner, chief of the fire marshal division of the Michigan State Police, warns.

Because of governmental activity in long range ballistics missiles and attempts to fire a "moon" rocket, numerous groups of youths, principally in high school physics and chemistry classes have undertaken similar experiments on a miniature scale, but nonetheless dangerous, he said.

Some injuries have already been reported due to premature or faulty explosion of the rockets. In addition, unless controlled and done in areas where there is no habitation, there is danger of injury to others as well as the setting of fires in residential and business areas.

In a letter to state fire chiefs, Renner pointed out that numerous requests had been received by his office from young persons asking permission to shoot rockets.

"It is my interpretation that these rockets are governed by the fireworks law and permission must be obtained from either the common council of the municipality or the township board for their use", he said. "It is my belief that more requests will be made all over the state and I would suggest that local government not issue any permits unless the board of education or the superintendent of the school approves of the request and the operation is performed under the supervision and control of a competent faculty member of the school."

Renner stated that he had received a number of complaints from officials and other persons who expressed alarm over uncontrolled rocket experiments.
