

Cherry Pie cherries, thawed and drained (4 cups)

frozen red 2-2/3 tablespoons cornstarch Few grains of salt 2 tablespoons butter 1 drop almond extract 3 drops red food coloring

2 cups sifted flour

1/4 cup cherry juice 3/4 cup sugar\* Place cherries and sugar in sauce pan and heat. Mix cornstarch with 1/4 cup cherry juice; pour into cherry mixture as soon as it starts to boil. Remove from heat and add salt, butter, almond flavoring and food solving. Let sool and row into the part of the same and salt, butter, almond flavoring and food solving. voring and food coloring. Let cool and pour into 9-inch pastry-lined pie pan. Arrange pastry strips over filling. Flute edge and bake at 450° for 10 minutes. Reduce heat to 350° and bake 20 minutes longer.

#### CAUTION AT HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS TO BE CHANGED

Use of red flags by workmen to direct traffic around highway construction projects will be abolished by the Michigan State Highway Department starting April 3, 1958.

In their place, "standardized" reversible "STOP" and "SLOW" signs will be used along with a highly visible black and yellow checkered vest for the traffic regulator, as ordered by State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie.

"Use of the red flag by workmen on road construction projects was often confusing to safety hazard for the workers on the job as well as for the traffic", Mackie said in announcing the change.

"The yellow and black checkered vest worn by the traffic regulator on construction projects will command attention from approaching drivers. The regulator will carry a reversible sign, mounted on the end of a pole, which will clearly state whether the driver is to stop or proceed slowly", he said.

The "STOP" will appear in white letters on a red background. The other side of the sign will read "SLOW" in black Ford Hospital and relayed to a letters over a yellow back-

ground. Tests of the new equipment, Haley, have been underway on various state highway projects around the state and indicate the sign and vest can be seen by vehicle operators from a far greater distance and much more plainly than the old style flag-

A directive signed by Comm-Commissioner Joseph Childs has been issued, making the vest and sign required by all agencies responsible for construction and maintenance work that interrupts or presents a hazard to the normal flow of traffic on all state trunkline highways.

Use of the vest and sign has also been recommended for local city and county road projects but is not mandatory under the order.

Private concerns, such as utilities, working along highways also will be required to use traffic regulators equipped with the new vests and stop signs during any operations that might interfere with highway

The Highway Department will have the authority to determine when traffic regulation is needed during operations of nongovernmental units. On highway construction jobs, the Department will determine where the traffic regulators should be stationed by the contractors.

The Department has prepared a manual for the instruction of men selected by contractors as traffic regulators in an effort to assure proper use of the new equipment on future highway construction projects under its jurisdiction.

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
