CAUTION AT HIGHWAY CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS TO BE CHANGED

Use of red flags by workmen to direct traffic around highway construction projects will be abolished by the Michigan State Highway Department starting April 3, 1958.

In their place, "standardized" reversible "STOP" and "SLOW" signs will be used along with a highly visible black and yellow checkered vest for the traffic regulator, as ordered by State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie.

"Use of the red flag by workmen on road construction projects was often confusing to safety hazard for the workers on the job as well as for the traffic," Mackie said in announcing the change.

"The yellow and black checkered vest worn by the traffic regulator on construction projects will command attention from approaching drivers. The regulator will carry a reversible sign, mounted on the end of a pole, which will clearly state whether the driver is to stop or proceed slowly," he said.

The "STOP" will appear in white letters on a red background. The other side of the sign will read "SLOW" in black letters over a yellow background.

Tests of the new equipment, developed by Highway Department Safety Supervisor Dennis Haley, have been underway on various state highway projects around the state and indicate the sign and vest can be seen by vehicle operators from a far greater distance and much more plainly than the old style flagman.

A directive signed by Commissioner Mackie and State Police Commissioner Joseph Childs has been issued, making the vest and sign required by all agencies responsible for construction and maintenance work that interrupts or presents a hazard to the normal flow of traffic on all state trunkline highways.

Use of the vest and sign has also been recommended for local city and county road projects but is not mandatory under the order.

Private concerns, such as utilities, working along highways also will be required to use traffic regulators equipped with the new vests and stop signs during any operations that might interfere with highway traffic.

The Highway Department will have the authority to determine when traffic regulation is needed during operations of non-governmental units. On highway construction jobs, the Department will determine where the traffic regulators should be stationed by the contractors.

The Department has prepared a manual for the instruction of men selected by contractors as traffic regulators in an effort to assure proper use of the new equipment on future highway construction projects under its jurisdiction.

SURGICAL OPERATION ON TV, MARCH 18

A live surgical operation will be seen in color by Michigan TV viewers on March 18 when a patient's damaged artery is replaced by a plastic reproduction.

This will be the first time that an operation, other than a heart operation, will have been televised live to the American public.

The special program is scheduled to open the annual Michigan Clinical Institute in Detroit at which doctors of medicine study the latest medical and surgical advances during a three-day session.

Brock E. Brush, M. D., Television Committee Chairman of the Michigan State Medical Society, said this year's live surgery will be performed at Henry Ford Hospital and relayed to a Detroit TV station for transmission to area viewers. Mobile camera units of Smith, Kline and French Laboratories, Philadelphia, again will televise the actual operation. By special arrangement, a network of TV stations throughout Michigan have planned to carry the show.

Doctors D. Emerick Szilagyi and Roger F. Smith of Henry Ford Hospital will perform the operation and it will be explained in everyday terms by a panel of experts consisting of Dr. Henry T. Bahnsen of Johns Hopkins, Dr. Prescott Jordan of Receiv-

ing Hospital; Dr. Eugene A. Osius of Harper Hospital, and Dr. Marion DeWeese of University of Michigan Hospital.

The Detroit hospital from which the operation originates is changed each year. Last year's heart surgery was televised from The Grace Hospital with Doctor James B. Blodgett as surgeon.

Michigan Cherry Pie Contest Champ



Judy Damman, 17, Fowlerville, Mich., who baked her way to the state championship, admires her cherry pie baked in an Admiral electric range. Here is her winning recipe:

Cherry Pie

2 (20 oz.) cans frozen red cherries, thawed and drained (4 cups)
3/4 cup sugar
2-2/3 tablespoons cornstarch
Few grains of salt
2 tablespoons butter
1 drop almond extract
3 drops red food coloring

Place cherries and sugar in sauce pan and heat. Mix cornstarch with 1/4 cup cherry juice; pour into cherry mixture as soon as it starts to boil. Remove from heat and add salt, butter, almond flavoring and food coloring. Let cool and pour into 9-inch pastry-lined pie pan. Arrange pastry strips over filling. Flute edge and bake at 450° for 10 minutes. Reduce heat to 350° and bake 20 minutes longer.

*If canned cherries are used, increase sugar to 1-1/4 cups.

Crust

1/3 cup lard
1/3 cup butter
1/4 cup milk
2 cups sifted flour
1/2 teaspoon salt

Put lard, butter and milk in a bowl. Tilt the bowl and whip until smooth and thick like whipped cream. Sift flour and salt into fat and milk mixture. Cut in shortening; form in a ball. Use half for lower crust. Roll and line pie pan. Roll out remaining pastry and cut in half-inch strips for lattice top.

"BABIES BRAND NEW"
 How many diapers shall I buy? What does it mean when the mother is the RH negative and the father is RH positive? How do you know when a baby is hungry? He cries for everything doesn't he? Questions like these are commonly raised in classes for Expectant Parents. The classes are conducted by public health nurses and are sponsored by the Oakland County Medical Society, the Oakland County Department of Health, and various Adult Education Departments.

Expectant Parents' Classes offer an opportunity for parents to gain knowledge and understanding that will help to increase their enjoyment in this experience and will prepare them to give care when baby arrives. The first four classes are centered around the mother. There is ample opportunity for discussions of family adjustments, growth and development of the baby before birth and labor and delivery. The last four classes will cover feeding the baby, what the new baby is like and baby's first year.

Audio visual aids are used to supplement discussion and conducted hospital tours are arranged during classes.

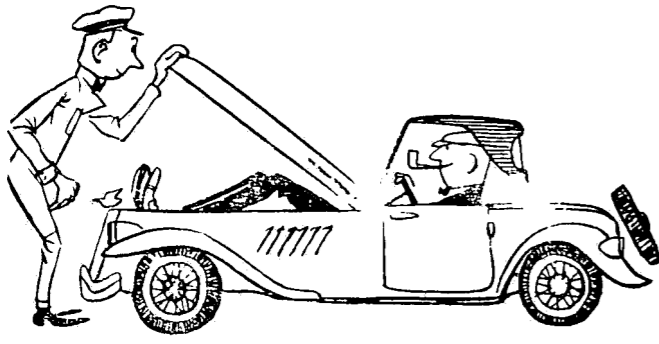

2. Said committee shall consist of seven members, to be appointed by the Township Supervisor, subject to confirmation by the Township Board.

3. Said committee shall not be permitted, and shall have no authority to contract for property, services or other things of value on the credit of or at the expense of the Township of Independence.

4. Said committee shall, after appointment, select a president, vice-president and secretary. Minutes of each meeting shall be properly recorded by the secretary, or some other person authorized to act in his place and stead, and a copy thereof shall be transmitted after each meeting to the Township Supervisor. Said committee shall have rule making authority.

5. All moneys received by such committee, shall be deposited with the Township Treasurer, and by the Township Treasurer deposited in a separate account for the benefit of such committee.

Such funds, shall be disbursed by the Township Treasurer, for the payment of invoices, or statements setting forth in detail the nature of such charges, and the purpose for which the same is made, after approval by the majority of the members of the committee present at any regular meeting of said committee.

6. Said committee shall be, and it is hereby authorized to receive gifts of money, or things, and retain the same for the benefit of the recreation program created.

7. No person, associated with the committee, in any capacity, shall be paid for services rendered, without the unanimous approval of the Township Board, provided however, this shall not constitute a prohibition against the employment of a performer, or referee, or instructor.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED, THAT:

8. The Treasurer is directed to deposit funds of the Citizens' Recreation Committee of Independence Township in a special account in the Clarkston State Bank, Clarkston, Michigan, in the name of the Citizens' Recreation Committee of Independence Township, and withdrawals shall be made only by Ira J. Snader, Treasurer.

Motion by Bauer, supported

by Doebler, that the following persons be confirmed members of the Citizens' Recreation Committee of Independence Township: Harold DeLongchamp, Lee Kelley, Robert Jensenius, Walter Wilberg, William C. Godfrey, Carl Anthony, Jr., and Stefanie Frank. Motion Carried.

Section 1. On the day of any election, polls shall be opened at seven o'clock in the forenoon, and shall be continued open until eight o'clock in the afternoon and no longer. Every qualified elector present and in line at the polls at the hour prescribed for the closing thereof shall be allowed to vote.

Section 2. Unless otherwise specified, the hours for the opening and closing of polls and for conducting of elections, shall be governed by Eastern Standard time.
