MSU BEGINS 7 COURSES AT AREA CITIES IN APRIL

CRIPPLED CHILDREN'S SOCIETY GETS AWARD

Mr. William Bullock, First Vice-President of the Oakland County Society for Crippled Children, and Mrs. Elizabeth Kirkby, Executive Secretary of the Society, received the annual award from FAR on behalf of the Crippled Children's Society. FAR is an organization of Friends and Relatives of the Handicapped in Southern Oakland County.

FAR has, since 1952, presented an annual award for "outstanding achievement in advancing the cause of Oakland County's handicapped. This year the award was given to the Crippled Children's Society because the Society aided 500 afflicted children; provided a special speech class, braces, special shoes, walkers, clinical examinations, physical therapy, medical and dental care, and summer camp.

The Society also provides a braille class and a meeting place for the blind.

The Oakland County Society for Crippled Children is supported solely by the generosity of Oakland County's citizens through the Easter Seal drive and direct contributions. 90% of all funds received during the Easter Seal drive remains in the county. The goal for 1958 is \$40,000.00.

Caring for the afflicted and

handicapped is caring for God's own. No person in his lifetime can repay his debt to humanity but supporting such a cause as aiding the crippled can help re-

pay that debt. It is our fondest hope and desire to witness the structure of life continue to flourish and bloom—never to remain still nor fall backward.

If every family gave at least a dime the goal of \$40,000.00 would be easily met.

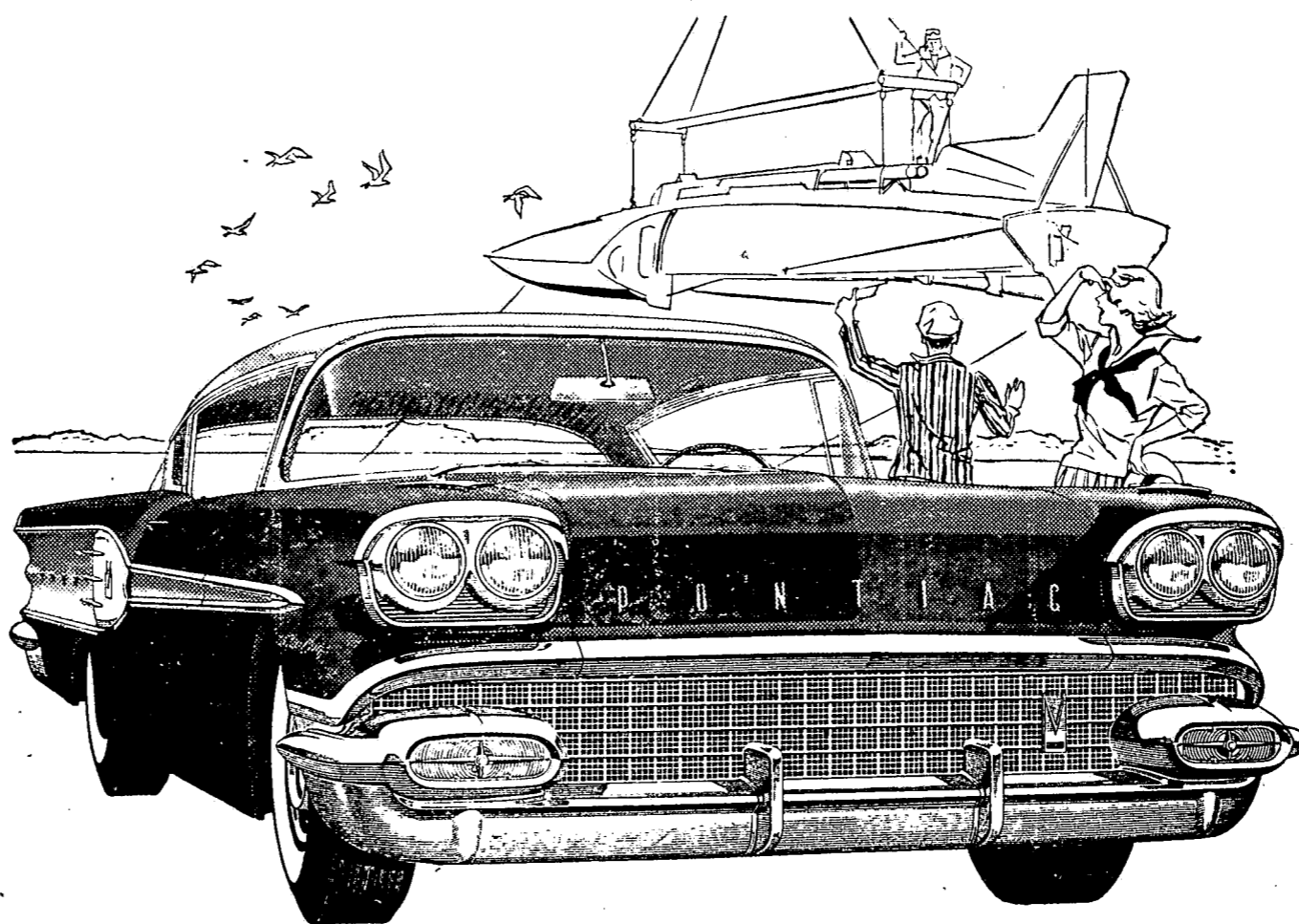

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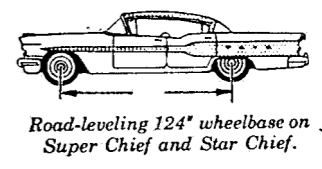
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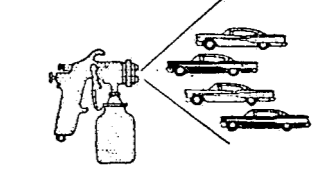
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An open air school room is one of the intriguing features of life in Hunza, the real Shangri-La Lowell Thomas presents for the first time in his newest

FULL MOON SETS DATE OF EASTER

The full moon of April 4 is of special interest because it determines the date of Easter this year, a University of Michigan astronomer explains.

Easter is designated for the Sunday following the first full moon that comes after the vernal equinox (March 20), explains Hazel M. Losh, associate professor of astronomy at the U-M. This year Easter is April 6.

"Probably a good reason for using the full moon for reckoning Easter was to enable pilgrims to the Holy City to have the advantage of moonlight for safe travel by night as well as by day", she declares.

Easter may occur any time from just after the equinox to as late as April 25, but this year the date turns out to be an average one, she says.

In 1951, Professor Losh recalls Easter came as early as March 25, but last year in 1957, it came much later, on April 21. The extreme early and late dates are rare, she says, the earliest possible not occurring again until 2285 A. D. and the latest not until 2038 A. D.

DEER HAVE CHANCE OF WINTER SURVIVAL IN MOST OF MICHIGAN

Mild weather the week ending March 10 boosted winter survival chances for deer in most of Michigan, but critical conditions continued in parts of the upper peninsula.

Snow depths of 24 to 30 inches were reported in the west end of the U. P. and in areas near Lake Superior. Deer were restricted to the vicinity of yarding areas in most of the peninsula and some deer starvation cases were confirmed in the Baraga district. Many winter forest cuttings in that district were halted by poor road conditions, eliminating that source of deer food.

Better news was reported from the northern lower peninsula where thawing allowed deer to range out rather freely for food. In the Baldwin and Gladwin districts, whitetails were beginning to use a fair amount of summer range.

Some deer have been killed by dogs in the northern lower peninsula, but this situation apparently is not nearly as serious as during some past winters. Deer in the region appear to be in good condition for this time of year.
