EDISON PREDICTS UPSWING IN WATER HEATER BUSINESS

Confidence in Southeastern

Michigan's economy was displayed again today by Detroit Edison when it forecast a 50 per cent increase in electric water heater sales for 1958. Having already announced a

\$75,000,000 building program for this year, Detroit Edison released figures on last year's sales of electric water heaters which were nearly double those of 1956. The increase was from 6,415 units in the twelve months ending December 31, 1956 to 11,596 units during a similar period last year. E. O. George, Detroit Edison

Sales Vice President, gave credit to several factors for the increase and for his optimism for 1958. They are the greater speed of heating elements in new electric water heaters; the doubling of the heating period provided on Edison's flat rate charge; the high temperature water which permits the most efficient use of laundry and kitchen detergents; and the flexibility of location of electric water heaters which can be placed anywhere in the house, utility room or garage.

The popularity of these advantages, George predicted, will increase 1958 sales of electric water heaters by at least 50 per cent to 18,000.

It is expected that most of these sales will be made by local appliance dealers and plumbers. thus putting more money into circulation on the local, directaction level.
