## Large Crowd At Science Fair

Several hundred parents and students inspected the various projects on display at the Science Fair open to the public Saturday, March 29. Dr. L. F. Greene commented at the end of the day that he was thoroughly impressed by the great number of fine projects and the scope of the fields covered. The judges spent over four and a half hours inspecting the 120 entries and interviewing the students and debated for a time after that on the merits of the projects in selecting those earning a special award.

The elementary grade projects showed much ingenuity and talent.

A great deal of credit for the success of the Fair goes to Mr. Terry Thomas, sponsor of the Biology Club, also to the many teachers who assisted the students with all the problems of getting their projects ready to exhibit and to Carol Fitch, Chairman of the Fair. The judges all agreed that this was one of the best Fairs they had attended and could easily compete with larger schools.

When the final tallying was completed the judges found three projects which qualified for a Science Trophy. A decision could not be reached so duplicate trophies were awarded. John Gettel, a third grade student, received a trophy in the elementary division for his project in electricity. His display included a series of parallel lights, a burglar proof box and a buzz game. It was very complete and showed originality and a thorough understanding of electricity.

Mary Inman, a senior, was awarded a trophy for her project, "A Compilation of Various Theories of Evolution", consisting of charts showing the development of life and four volumes of research including her own theory.

Paul Bennett, a tenth grader, also received an outstanding award trophy for his complex physics project, "A Demonstration of High Frequency Electricity". His project showed the effects of a Tesla coil in converting electric voltage and drew quite an audience with its blue arc flashing.

The three Medals for superior work in Science in the Junior High division were given to Joan Payne, 8th grade, for her project, "Progression of Time Pieces"; Nancy Walker, 9th grade, "Mathematical Cube" and Tom Wells, 7th grade, his own invention of a pencil vendor.

The award medals in the elementary department were given to Ronald Fusilier, 6th grade, "Complete Weather Observatory"; Joan Allen, 5th grade, "Baby Hydrogen Bomb and Power Plant"; and Tom Knox, 6th grade, "Cloud Chamber showing Alpha, Beta, Gamma Rays".

Senior High awards were given to three 10th graders: Sally Taylor, "Embryo Development of the Chicken"; Sandy Hollis, "Internal Organs and Reconstruction of the Chicken"; and Barry Sparks, "The Effects of External Stimuli on Tropisms of Plants".

A Special Award Medal was presented to Bill Jacobs, 11th grade, for Mechanical Drawing, his entry being a model of a Sunliner house. Superior ribbons were awarded Sharon Collick, Lucy Oakley, Jody Wilford, Larry Morgan, Betsy Osgood, Judy Ellibee, Pat Anthony and Shanna Stewart.

Several of the superior projects will be entered in the State Science Fair at Hillsdale College and the Detroit Metropolitan Science Fair where the awards include five \$1,000 scholarships.

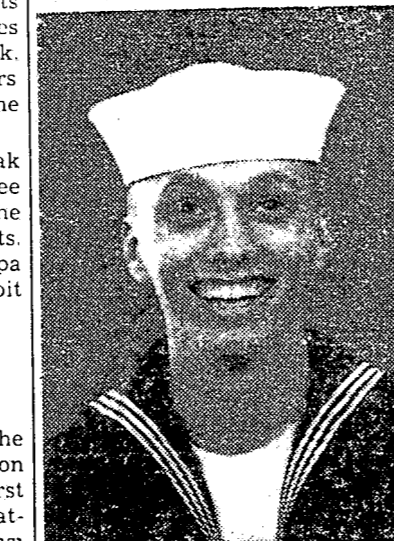
## WEST POINT TO GRADUATE FORMER C. H. S. STUDENT

**SCIENCE & MATHEMATICS CREDITS EARNED BY GRADUATING CLASS OF 1958 AT CLARKSTON HIGH**

This evaluation started in February of 1957 and was finished this February in preparation for Accreditation by the North Central Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges. 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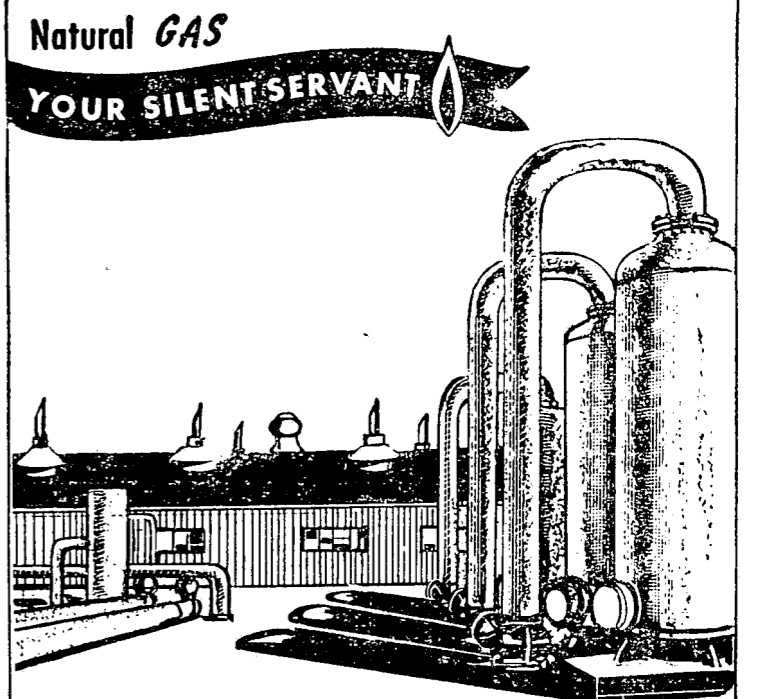

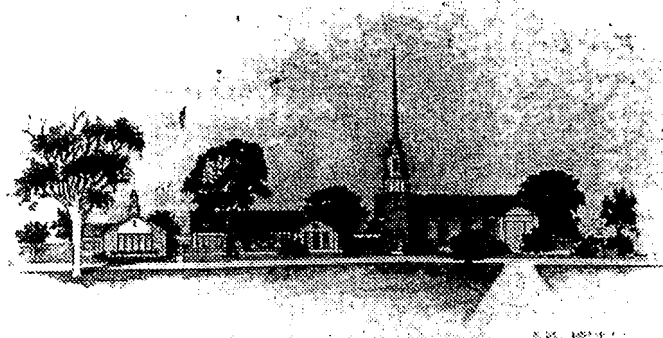
