At one time, Sgt. Lucas procured a Turkish typewriter for his office. It was similar to an American one, except that it did not have the letters "W", "X" or "Q". "When we ran across a word containing one of these letters, we just picked another word", Sgt. Lucas explained simply.

## THE GARDEN GATE



May is the month to beautify your home. There are so many beautiful varieties of flowers helping to welcome the warm May weather, that it's difficult to pick out a favorite. If I were forced to choose one May Bloom, though, I think I'd point to the lilac. . . . delicate, beautiful and with an unmatched fragrance. While you're enjoying your lilacs, there are some things to be done in the flower garden. Disbud your peonies for larger blooms. Since they are heavy feeders, give them a top dressing of bone meal or well-rotted manure mixed with compost. If you want your hydrangeas pink this year add a handful of lime to the soil around the plant. A heavy dose of acid peat moss will provide blue flowers. Water hydrangeas with liquid manure while they are in bud to increase the size of the blossoms. Sweet-peas may be planted. Add bone meal at the rate of five pounds per 100 square feet. Before transplanting house plants to the garden, they should be exposed to outdoor conditions for hardening. Chrysanthemum cuttings made by mid-May will do well in six inch pots and make very satisfactory house plants for fall. Seeds of biennials and perennials for flowering next year may be planted the latter part of May. Work compost into the soil together with pulverized potash and phosphate rock. Empty places in the border may be filled with sowings of larkspur, candy-tuft, poppies, marigolds or nasturtiums and petunias.

VEGETABLES: Beans, corn, cucumbers, melons, potatoes and squash may be safely planted in open ground in mid-May, assuming the ground is not too cold. If the season is mild, early corn may be planted during the first week. Add plenty of compost and a pound each of pulverized phosphate rock and potash rock to every 10 square feet of soil. Harden off tomato plants and plan to set them out the beginning of June. Work in phosphate and potash rock. Remember the tomatoes require little nitrogen.

Pictures were taken and students interviewed with their projects.

The most active is the Linnean Society of Pontiac. It is proposed that the Village pay one-fourth (\$500.00) as a down payment and assume a ten-year obligation for the balance (\$1,500.00). Therefore, the Village would be required to budget approximately \$1,500.00 annually over the ten-year period to cover the remainder of the principal and interest. This charge can readily be contained within the annual operating budget and would not require a general tax increase nor a meaningful curtailment of Village services.  
It should also be noted that the removal of the proposed site from the tax rolls would reduce current Village property assessments approximately \$8,800.00, or less than 1%. If there are no properties added to the tax roll to off-set this reduction, the reduced valuation would add about 25 cents per \$1,000.00 to each taxpayer's liability.  
I would like to suggest that the Council study this proposal over the next several weeks. Any suggested revisions or counter proposals will be appreciated and should be presented at the next regular Council meeting".

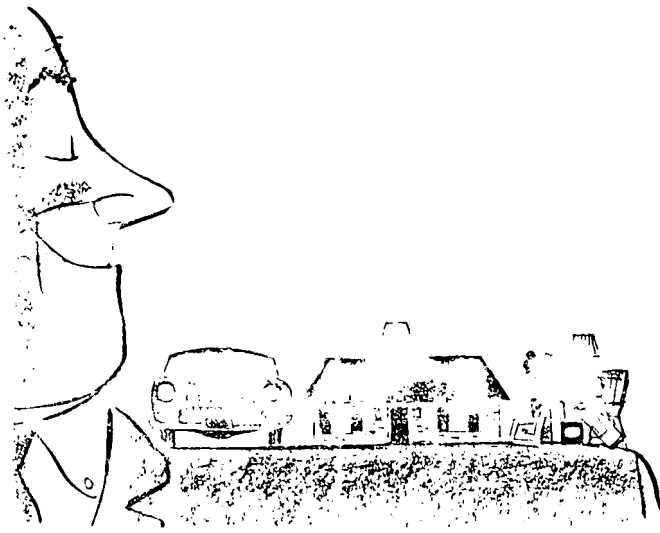

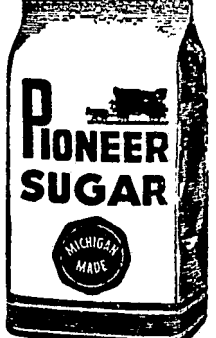
