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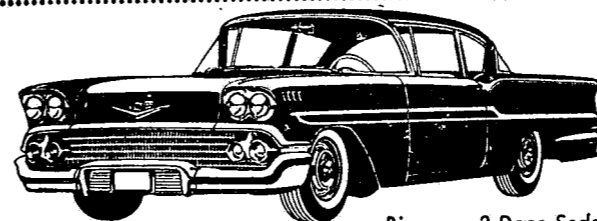
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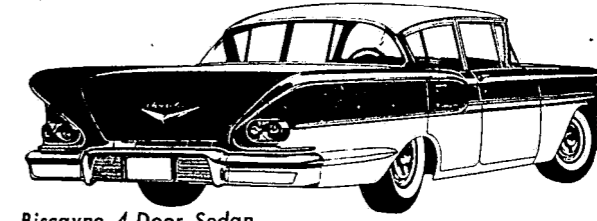
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School News

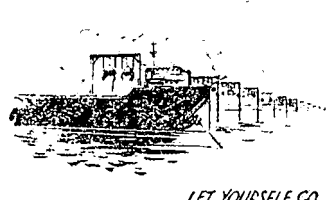

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already proved that Cinerama at the Music Hall in Detroit makes for unusual theatre parties.

According to William McLaughlin, manager at the theatre more than 135,000 persons—all in groups—have attended Cinerama since its opening at the Music Hall in March of 1953.

"This Is Cinerama" attracted the greatest number of groups, however the current production "Search For Paradise" may do almost as well if the first 12 weeks attendance can be considered any criterion.

"Search for Paradise" has already had 255 group parties since it opened February 14, and 111 more groups totaling

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6500 people are scheduled to have their parties before June Who and what are these groups? Over 40% of the organizations represented are composed of out-of-towners—from all parts of Michigan, Ohio, Indiana and Ontario.

Many of these companies and organizations are repeaters having had groups at the three previous Cinerama presentations. In many instances, when an out-of-town club schedules a Music Hall visit arrangements are made by the theatre for buses and dinner at some downtown restaurant for the group.

The group figures already given do not represent the many Saturday morning special children's performances scheduled through June. Mr. McLaughlin stated that these performances have had a total attendance of 85,000 children along with the adults, teachers and leaders who accompany them.

Music Hall projectionists act as lecturers to explain the intricate Cinerama tree strip film process under the direction of James Day, resident technician and electronics expert.
