The enrollment growth in the school system has been from 1290 in 1951-52 to 3185 in 1957-58. It takes two years approximately to build a high school after it is approved by the electorate which means that even by approving the issue now the present building will be overcrowded to where staggered sessions will be necessary before the new building can be completed. Upon completion of the new high school the old high school will be used for junior high school.

The new building will be located south of the present Elementary School on the 70 acres currently owned by the Clarkston Community School District. It will house 1000 students and consist of general classrooms, special rooms for general science, biology, chemistry, physics, art, business educa- on a large board. tion, home-making, vocal and instrumental music and shop. The school will also have a gymnasium that will seat 2000 spectators, have a regulation basketball court and adequate locker room facilities. The building also incorporates a cafeteria, libarary administrative offices and auditorium that will seat approximately 300. Future expansion of the building is being provided for in such a manner that additional classrooms can be added whenever it becomes necessary.

The total cost of the building is estimated at \$2,500,000. This costs includes erection of buildings, furnishings, landscaping, preparing site, driveways, sidewalks, architectural fees, legal






