Methodists Plan Annual Conference

The one hundred and seventeenth session of The Detroit Annual Conference of The Methodist Church will be held in Flint this year at the Court Street Methodist Church and the I. M. A. Auditorium beginning Wednesday, June 4th and lasting through Sunday, June 8th. The Detroit Annual Conference is the representative governing body for the eastern half of the State of Michigan composed of five hundred fifty-five churches. Representing most of these churches will be the laymen and ministers of the churches. Senior Lay members from the Clarkston church are Mrs. Everett Butters and Mrs. Lee Volberding, and Junior Lay Members are Perry Smith and David Sanford.

Reverend William J. Richards will be leaving for the conference on Monday where he serves on The Board of Ministerial Training of the church and will be interviewing the young men entering the ministry of the church. On Thursday he will assist in the report of the Committee on Church and Economic Life of which he is chairman, and Friday he will preside at the Interseminary Luncheon as president of The Interseminary Group. Dr. Harold Carr, president of Liff School of Theology, Denver, Colorado, is the minister.

Bishop Marshall R. Reed, resident bishop of the Michigan Area of The Methodist Church will preside at all sessions of the conference which will be climaxed with a mass meeting of over 6,000 Methodists at the I. M. A. Auditorium Sunday morning service at 11:00 a. m. June 8th. Dr. C. A. McPheeters, Superintendent of The Flint District, will lead the worship and Bishop Reed will preach on the subject "We Are God's People". A choir of over 600 voices composed of the various choirs of the Flint churches will sing. Methodists of the Clarkston area are invited to attend though services will be held as usual at First Methodist Church.

At the I. M. A. auditorium at 2:00 p. m. that Sunday afternoon the combined AC Spark Plug Chorus will prelude the beautiful and dramatic Consecration and Ordination Service where a choir of 300 Methodist ministers will also sing. Bishop Reed will then close the Conference with the reading of the appointments of the various Methodists to churches throughout the state.

SPECIAL MEETING OF THE VILLAGE COUNCIL CALLED BY THE PRESIDENT AND HELD AT THE FIRE HALL BUILDING IN THE VILLAGE OF CLARKSTON, MICHIGAN, MAY 26, 1958, AT 9:00 P. M.

Roll: Beach, Butters, Jones, O'Roark, Terry, Wilford, present. All trustees being present, the President announced the meeting was called to consider a proceeding matter in the Court Condemnation case.

Trustee Wilford made the following statement and asked that it be spread on the records of this meeting:

For more than a year, residents of the Village of Clarkston and adjoining communities have witnessed the spectacular gyrations and legerdemain of Ernest Felice as he has attempted to inflate the value of the Caribou Inn which his family purchased for approximately \$30,000.

The display has been the more fantastic because of the deterioration of the property. At the time of purchase, the property included a liquor license, a going business, and a building in fair condition. Since the time of purchase, the liquor license has been revoked by the State, the busi-

ness has been closed out, and finally the building has been destroyed for all practical purposes by fire.

In almost indirect ratio to this record of deterioration, we have been faced with Mr. Felice's announcements of "deals" which have consistently made the property appear to be more valuable than it actually is.

These so-called deals have never recognized real values of commercial properties in Clarkston, as established by actual transactions and listings. For example, the local bank purchased the Post Office building, which included such assets as a steel vault, masonry structure, and a 10-year lease to the government, for \$9,500. Another property, larger than the Caribou Inn in terms of land and building, in excellent condition, and occupying as good or better a location, is available today for \$27,500. Vacant property across the street from the Caribou Inn, requiring no removal of buildings, is not selling at its listed price of \$100 per foot, much less than Mr. Felice has asked for his property.

The Caribou Inn has an excellent potential, however, and that is for a municipal parking facility. As such, it would not only be used to the advantage of shoppers from the trading area, but it would be a step toward stabilizing commercial values in the village, as well as property values generally.

With that in mind, and following recommendations resulting from a study which began more than a year ago, the Council instituted condemnation proceedings which would determine a fair market value for the property. It was also hoped that such legal proceedings would be a direct means to consummating the sale of the property to the Village. However, even this effort has been subject to delaying tactics.

The latest development has been the introduction of a sales agreement drawn by a realty company which offers Mr. Felice \$40,000 for the property if an adjacent property can also be obtained. This purported deal, ridiculous as it appears to be in the light of other commercial listings, must be recognized. It offers Mr. Felice a price which the Village Council could not offer in good conscience because it grossly exaggerates the value of the property.

If the sale of the property is completed, it will remove the most favorable off-street parking site from further consideration, while adding to the already acute parking problem by increasing the need for parking facilities. At the present time, no alternative solution to the problem appears available.

The Council has no choice but to permit Mr. Felice to attempt to sell his property according to the terms of the offer to him. However, because we are fed up with delaying tactics of this kind, and I ask that this statement which I have made be spread on the minutes of this meeting, I offer the following resolution:

Be it reluctantly resolved as follows:

- 1. The Village Attorney is hereby instructed to request an adjournment of the condemnation case until a date subsequent to June 17, at the convenience of the Court;
2. If a conveyance of the land is consummated pursuant to the sales agreement dated May 15, and shown to the court on May 21, that the Village Attorney cause the condemnation action to be terminated;
3. If this offer is not consummated, that there be no further delays or extensions of this nature.

The President ordered the statement spread on the record of the proceedings.

Moved by Wilford and seconded by Beach, that the above resolution be adopted.

Roll: Beach, yea; Butters, yea; Jones, yea; O'Roark, yea; Terry, yea; Wilford, yea. Yeas, 6; Nays, 0. Motion carried.

There being no further business it was moved by Jones, "That the meeting be adjourned". Seconded by O'Roark. Motion carried.

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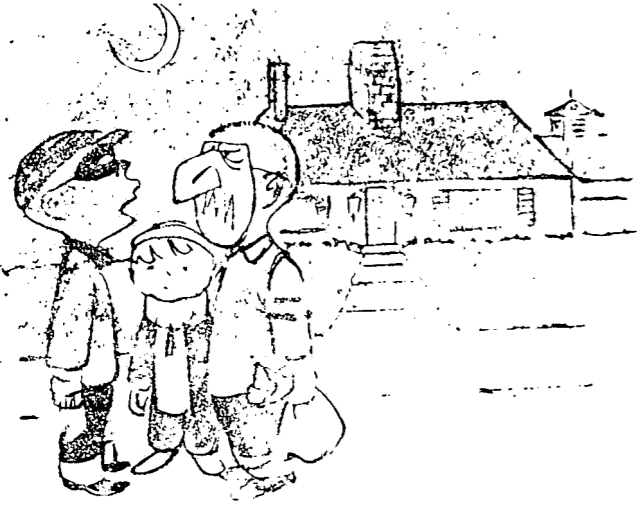

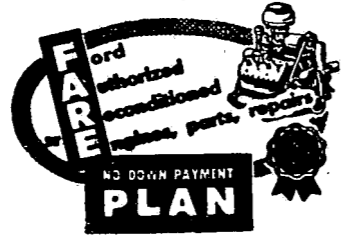

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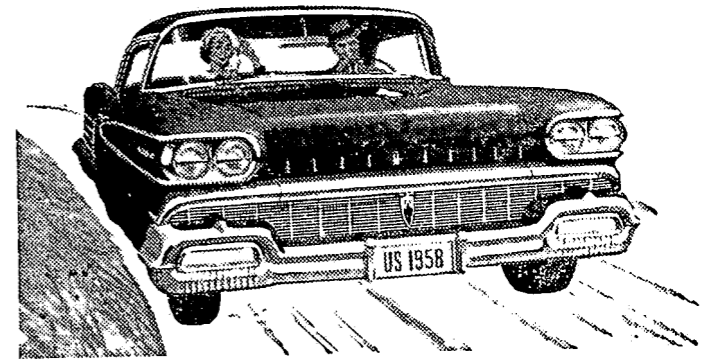
