ABE LINCOLN NICKNAMED US MICHIGANDERS

Abraham Lincoln was the first person to use the word "Michigander"—that slightly ironical nickname we're all so familiar with now, says Albert H. Marckwardt, professor of English at The University of Michigan.

He explains that officially we are all "Michiganites". That, for some strange reason, is the term approved by the U.S. Government Printing Office Style Manual, in its revision of January, 1945.

Lincoln employed the now frequently used term, "Michigander", in a speech in the House of Representatives in 1848, an election year, of course. General Lewis Cass was being boomed as the leading Democratic candidate for the presidency, and Lincoln was trying to prick the nomination bubble. In a vitriolic attack on Cass's conduct in the War of 1812, Lincoln concluded his speech in this somewhat facetious vein:

"But, in my hurry, I was very near closing on the subject of military tails before I was done with it. There is one entire article of the sort I have not discussed yet; I mean the military tail you Democrats are now engaged in dovetailing on to the great Michigander.'

Professor Marckwardt says, "Lincoln kept the same ironic tone in praising Cass for his charges on wild onions and bloody struggles with mosquitoes in the Black Hawk War. According to all our evidence, this is the atmosphere in which the word 'Michigander' first fell upon the ears of a listening audience.


