ABE LINCOLN NICKNAMED US MICHIGANDERS

Abraham Lincoln was the first person to use the word "Michigander"—that slightly ironical nickname we're all so familiar with now, says Albert H. Marckwardt, professor of English at The University of Michigan.

He explains that officially we are all "Michiganites". That, for some strange reason, is the term approved by the U. S. Government Printing Office Style Manual, in its revision of January, 1945.

Lincoln employed the now frequently used term, "Michigander", in a speech in the House of Representatives in 1848, an election year, of course. General Lewis Cass was being boomed as the leading Democratic candidate for the presidency, and Lincoln was trying to prick the nomination bubble.

In a vitriolic attack on Cass's conduct in the War of 1812, Lincoln concluded his speech in this somewhat facetious vein: "But, in my hurry, I was very near closing on the subject of military tails before I was done with it. There is one entire article of the sort I have not discussed yet; I mean the military tail you Democrats are now engaged in dovetailing on to the great Michigander."

Professor Marckwardt says, "Lincoln kept the same ironic tone in praising Cass for his charges on wild onions and bloody struggles with mosquitoes in the Black Hawk War. According to all our evidence, this is the atmosphere in which the word 'Michigander' first fell upon the ears of a listening audience."

"Nor does the satirical use of 'Michigander' cease with this episode. In the account of a Congressional session of 1879 we find Representative Omar D. Conger on the receiving end of the ridicule.

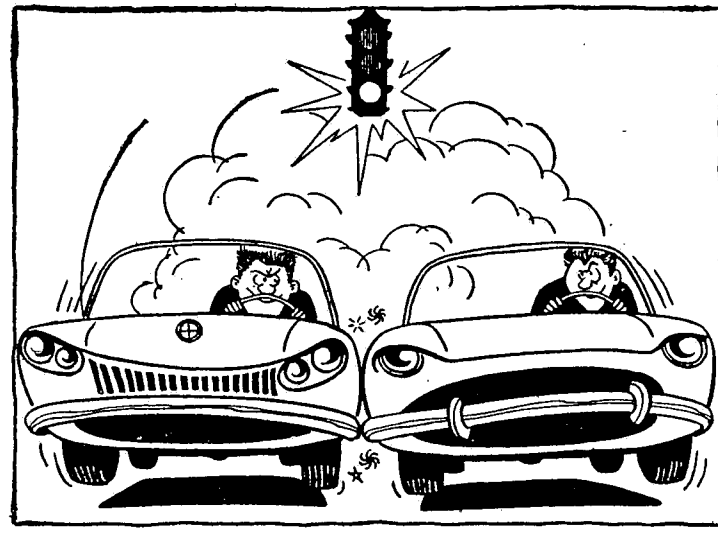
"The House was tolerably disorderly today, but it was noticed that Mr. Conger, the eminent Michigander, was refreshingly quiet. Mr. Turner, a Kentucky Democrat took his place but could not fill it. Mr. Turner is not as smart and not nearly as amusing as Mr. Conger, and if the House has to tolerate a nuisance it is easy to see that it would, by an almost unanimous vote, give the preference to Mr. Conger, who, whatever else may be said of him, is not dull."

The green flash of the starter's gun. Down goes your foot pressure; up goes your blood pressure. A fender-to-fender sprint, and then you thrust half-a-hood ahead of your rival. A grin comes—not across your face—but crinkling across your brain in an ornery kind of way.

What about the guy in the other lane? Is he really out to beat you? Take a good look at him. He's brother-man! Shar-

"Goodwill Industries drivers have set a remarkable fleet record in both safety and courtesy. Its handicapped drivers set a fine example for others. Court records show that handicapped persons who work at Goodwill and drive cars are seldom in our courts as violators."

William P. Thorpe, Jr., president of Michigan Cartage-men's Association, said recently in presenting an award to Goodwill Industries:

"I know of no other trucking fleet in the City of Detroit with a safety record comparable to that of Goodwill Industries with

have heard of. He has driven nine years without an accident or traffic ticket. He has had ten courtesy citations during this time. The Michigan Cartage-men's Association considers it a great privilege to offer commendation to both Reno and the other drivers in Goodwill's trucking department."

Half of Goodwill's drivers are physically handicapped. Seven are arm amputees. Helpers are handicapped.

Goodwill pays a salary to its truck drivers in contrast to the usual commission arrangement. This means that each driver is insured a self-supporting wage without begging the housewife for material.

Goodwill truck drivers do not solicit house to house, but only pick up materials in answer to a housewife's call to Goodwill Industries. This means that the housewife expects a Goodwill Industries driver and knows he will arrive at a convenient time.

Goodwill drivers have been carefully screened as to character. The housewife need not be afraid to allow any Goodwill driver on the premises.

Because Goodwill, a non-profit organization is self-supporting as far as operations go, there are a few items that the organization cannot take. This is because there is no resale value, as in the case of glass jars, or because the cost of reconditioning is prohibitive, as in the case of an overstuffed davenport. It is often up to the driver to explain these matters to the public.

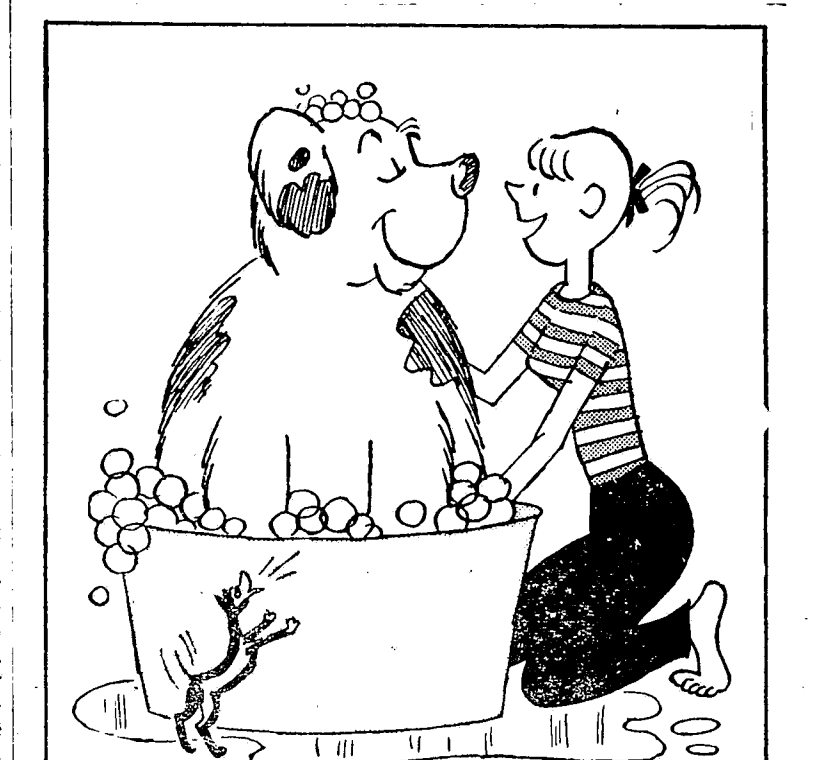

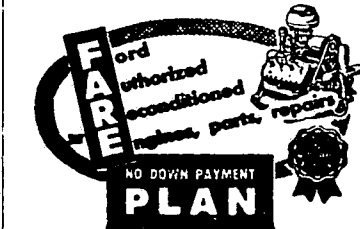

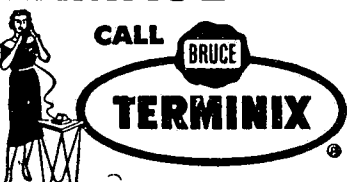
