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RELIGIOUS GROUP PLANS CONVENTION

Jehovah's Witnesses from the Pontiac congregations today announced plans are under way to attend an international convention of Jehovah's Witnesses in New York City this summer.

Mr. W. P. Strong, presiding minister of the three local congregations, said the convention

could well be the largest in the history of Jehovah's Witnesses. It is scheduled for July 27 through August 3 and will be held in Yankee Stadium and the Polo Grounds simultaneously.

The last international convention, attended by many Pontiac Witnesses, was held in 1953 in Yankee Stadium and reached a peak attendance of 165,000 in-

cluding the overflow audiences. Watchtower officials, Mr. Strong said, have arranged, this year, for the program to be held in both places, with most program features repeated at the Polo Grounds immediately following the first presentation in Yankee Stadium.

The Watchtower Bible & Tract Society, governing agency for Jehovah's Witnesses, has been making special travel arrangements for foreign delegates. Many missionaries who have served in other lands will also be brought to the United States for the Bible convention. Purpose of the gathering is to provide stimulus for the New World society of Jehovah's Witnesses in Christian association, Bible instruction and ministerial training. This, Strong said, is in accordance with provisions made for God's people in Bible days.

Mr. Strong stated that while it is not yet known how many Witnesses from the area will attend, nearly all intend to go. He said it may be necessary to make limited meeting arrangements or cancel meetings altogether during convention time.

FIFTH CINERAMA READY THIS SUMMER

Six months of work in blue lagoons under the waving palms of the South Seas have been completed by a Cinerama film-making expedition. It is being readied for showings this summer. The fifth Cinerama production is titled, "Cinerama—South Seas Adventure". It marks the first survey of the Pacific, a new world of adventure for the revolutionary three-strip film process.

Journeying by luxury liner, two-masted sailing schooner, flying boat, copra barge and trans-ocean airplane, the 18-man production crew worked in Hawaii, Tahiti, Tonga, Fiji, New Hebrides and Australia.

Orson Welles does the narration with original music by Alex North.

"Cinerama—South Seas Adventure" is the story of six adventurers who surrendered to the lure of the islands. The current Cinerama production, Lowell Thomas' "Search For Paradise" is now in its fifth month at the Music Hall Theatre in Detroit.

BE CAUTIOUS IN TRAFFIC OVER JULY FOURTH

Good as the Memorial holiday week-end traffic record was,

State Police are hoping for even a better record over the Fourth of July week-end, and are going to do their part to help bring about that result.

While the remainder of the nation was reaching a new high in traffic deaths for the Memorial week-end, Michigan's total was less than the year before with only 12, or one every six and one half hours.

Last year's Fourth of July toll was one death every five and one-tenth hours, or 20 for the 102-hour period. Because of the shorter week-end this year, the death toll will be computed over a 78-hour period beginning at 6 P. M. Thursday, July 3, and ending at midnight, Sunday, July 6. The worst 4th of July in the last eight years was in 1953, with a death every one and nine-tenths hours, or 28 in the 52-hour period.

State Police will be geared to full operating strength for the holiday period, with intensified patrols from noon Thursday till midnight Sunday. They have been assigned 128 National Guardsmen and another 96 will assist sheriffs.

Pass days of all State Police officers have been canceled, with detectives taking post desk assignments to release officers for additional patrols. Shifts have been lengthened to 10 hours.

Plain and semi-marked cars will be used as well as the regular marked cars.

"The Fourth of July fatality record is usually higher than over Memorial Day", said Commissioner Childs, "and with the possibility of a new high volume of traffic it means every driver must be thoroughly vigilant. If everyone co-operates and does as he should, the death toll can be brought down. Be safe by observing the rules of the road."

Richardson chapter had a short business meeting following the picnic.



**A Birthday Means Your Prettiest Cake and Lots Of Hot Coffee**



Of all the cakes in the whole wide world, there's none so delightful as the traditional birthday cake. The candles alone make it a thing of beauty and a joy that lasts for just one year — until the next one comes along. So let's light the candles and pour the coffee — the party's on!

Birthday cakes should, indeed, be handsome — but your decoration needn't be elaborate. In fact, the simpler it is, the prettier it is. Here's a suggestion that takes no time at all and transforms any cake into a gala confection. Simply use pastel cream mints — put a candle holder through each one and set them on your fluffiest icing.

Of course, your birthday cake has to be delicious as well as pretty — so here's a recipe that was inspired by a birthday for a birthday! It's devil's food and it's superb. When you serve it, just make certain that there's plenty of fragrant, hot coffee on hand. Your party wouldn't be complete without it!

**Happy Birthday Cake**  
2 squares (2 oz.) unsweetened chocolate  
1 cup milk, divided  
2 egg yolks, beaten  
1 cup sugar  
5 tablespoons butter or margarine  
1 1/2 cups sifted enriched flour  
3/4 teaspoon baking soda  
few grains salt  
1 teaspoon vanilla

Cut chocolate in small pieces and put in saucepan with 1/2 cup of milk and beaten egg yolks. Cook over low heat, stirring constantly until mixture thickens. Remove from heat, add sugar and butter and stir until butter melts. Stir in flour gradually and stir until smooth. Dissolve baking soda in remaining milk, adding slowly. Mix well. Add salt and vanilla. Bake in 2 greased 8-inch layer-cake pans in moderate oven, 350°, 25 minutes or until done. Cool on cake racks. Fill and frost with cooked icing (made with 2 egg whites). Decorate sides of cake with flaked coconut. Put candle holders through cream mints of any desired colors and set on cake.

Milk is the best single source of calcium. Other good sources are turnip greens, oranges, collards, cheese, kale, mustard greens, broccoli and molasses. Children who get the equivalent of four glasses of milk a day and adults who get three glasses will get enough calcium.
