Incumbents Re-Elected

Keith Leak and Walton T. Robbins were re-elected to the Clarkston School Board at the July 14, Annual School Election.

The results of the election are as follows: Total votes cast 386. Individual results were Walton Robbins, 173; Keith Leak, 167; Lester Smith, 138; Thomas Doremus, 81; George Stewart, 56; William Henry, 43. Write-in candidates and results were Raymond Gates, 3; Gilbert Gallivan, 1; John Watson, 1.

The Board of Education met following the election and unanimously elected Keith Leak, president; Walton Robbins, Secretary; Ronald Weber, Treasurer; Edward Spohn and Walter Wilberg, Trustees.

It was moved by Walter Wilberg, seconded by R. A. Weber, that present bank depositories, namely, Clarkston State Bank, Community National Bank of Pontiac, and Michigan National Bank of Flint be continued for the ensuing year. Motion was carried.

It was moved by Walter Wilberg, seconded by R. E. Spohn, that the treasurer's bond be renewed with the Maryland Casualty Co. in the amount of \$40,000 bond coverage. Motion carried.

The meeting adjourned at 10:00 p. m.

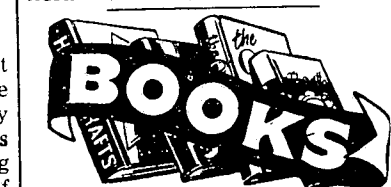

TELEPHONE COMPANY INCREASES RATES

The basic rate for residential telephone service here goes up only 10 cents a month under the recent Public Service Commission order granting Michigan Bell Telephone Company an increase in revenues, the company announced today.

The 10-cent increase applies to 1-party, 2-party, and 4-party residential service. Rural rates generally are not affected. The new rate schedule boosts the cost of 1-party and 2-party business service 20 cents a month.

Additional directory listings for business service are increased 25 cents a month, while additional residence listings go up 10 cents a month.

The \$1 charge for spring cords is eliminated in cases where a charge applies for other telephone work being done on the premises.

BRIGHT CHILDREN MAY TALK EARLY

The child who likes to talk and starts it at an early age may have superior intelligence.

This indication comes from Dr. Elizabeth M. Drews, researcher and psychologist at Michigan State University. Although there are no adequate intelligence tests for the very young, Dr. Drews reports there are several qualities which may indicate aspects of giftedness.

"The child who likes to talk or sing, speaks in sentences at the age of two (although a few very bright children may not speak until three or four); is adept at physical and motor activities at an early age—such as sitting up at five months or walking at nine months; is intensely curious, wants to really know how things work, and can follow directions and be given a series of things to do and remember them.

"Any or all of these may indicate superior ability," she said. Dr. Drews points out that a child who is intellectually superior can be measured quite accurately by the time he reaches the eighth grade. She emphasizes that selection should not be based on only one IQ test but on as many various measures and observations as possible.

There is evidence, reports Dr. Drews, that adults can not only maintain a high level of intelligence but can actually make gains. This is contrary to previous thinking that intelligence levelled off at about the age of 16 and began to decline in the 20's.

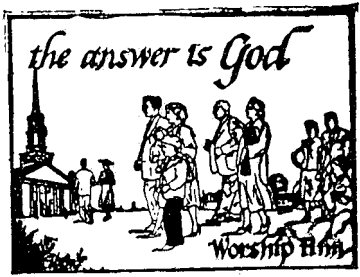
Formerly called "Young America Day", the first Sunday henceforth will be known as "Church Day".

GI insurance policyholders who plan to re-enter military service should not drop their policies in the belief that they will be covered by the so-called "free \$10,000 insurance", or indemnity.

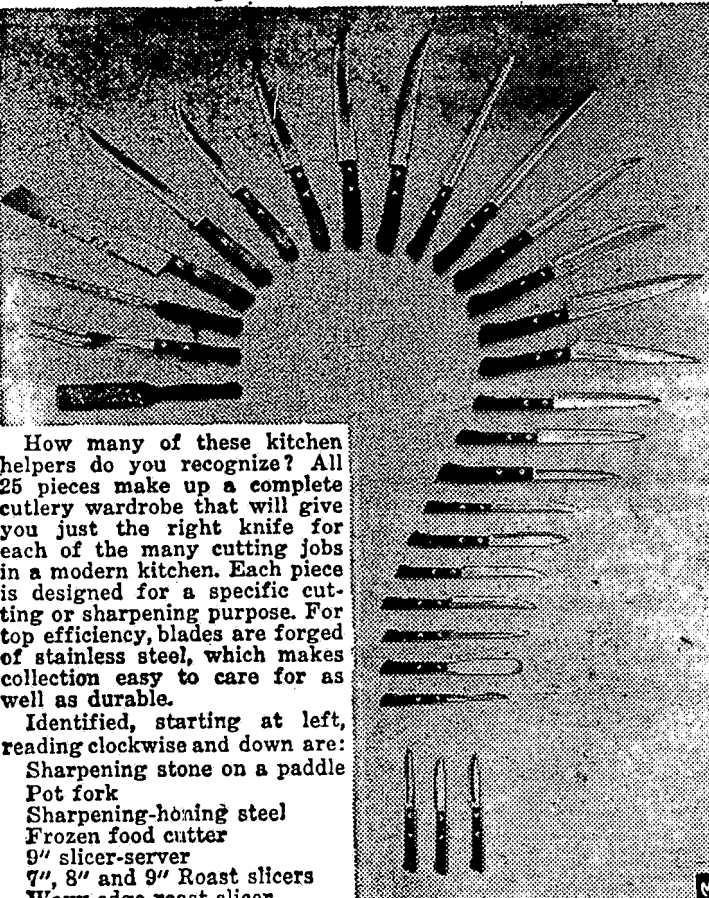

TWO MORE YEARS TO APPLY FOR GI LOANS

Veterans of World War II may know that they have two more years—until July 25, 1960—to apply for GI loans under the Veterans Administration guaranty program.

Lloyd H. Jameson, Manager of the VA Regional Office in Detroit, said the extension is authorized by Public Law 85-364.

Mr. Jameson said, however, World War II veterans may not know the July 25, 1960 deadline for guaranteed loans means that VA must receive the lender's loan guaranty application by that date.

VA has up to one year after July 25, 1960, for receiving GI loan applications processed before that date, he said.

The 1960 deadline does not apply to VA-guaranteed loans to Korean conflict veterans, who have until January 31, 1965, to use that benefit, Mr. Jameson pointed out.

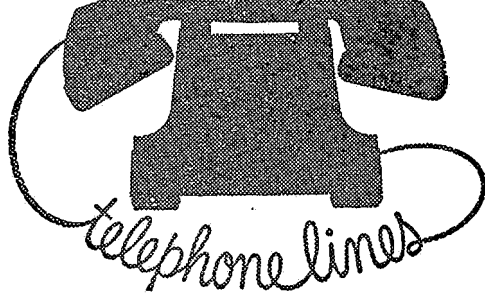

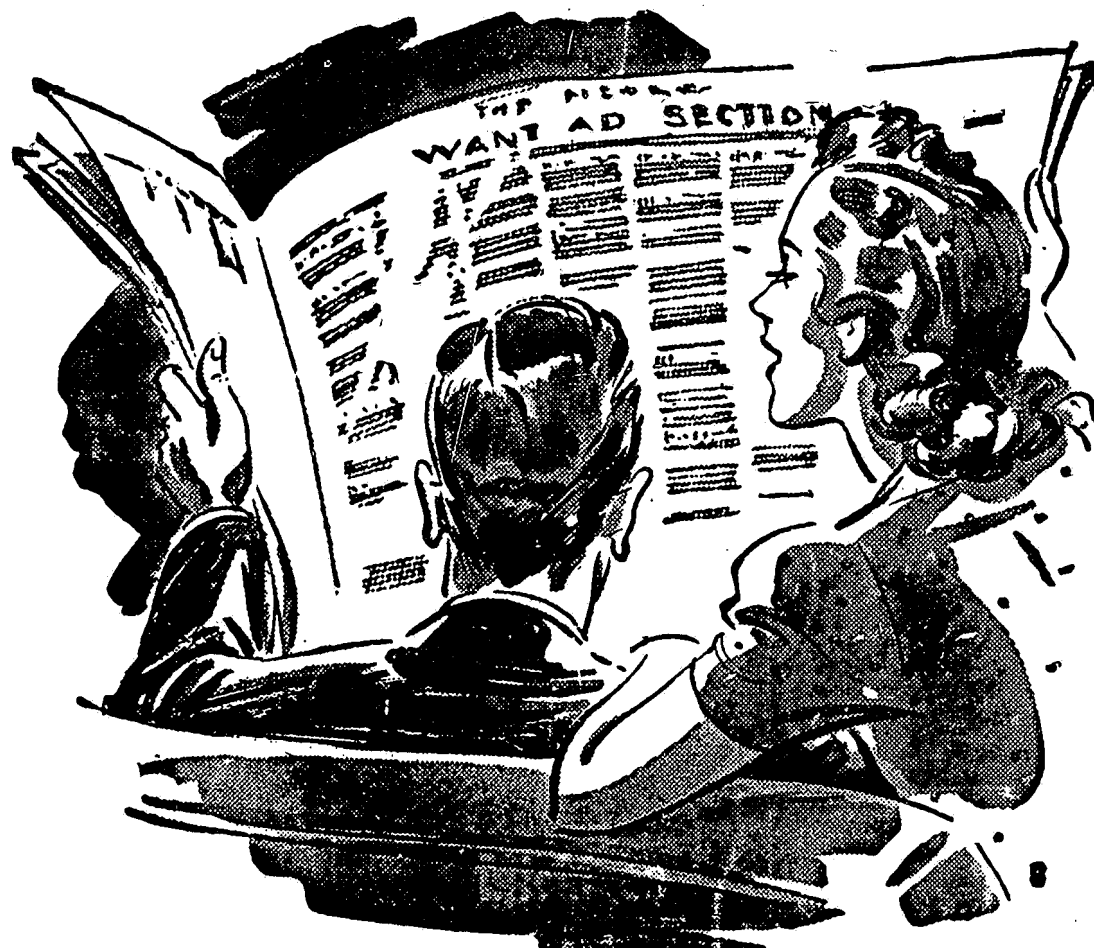
