#### TWO MORE YEARS TO APPLY FOR GI LOANS

Veterans of World War II may know that they have two more years-until July 25, 1960 to apply for GI loans under the Veterans Administration guaranty program.

Lloyd H. Jameson, Manager of the VA Regional Office in Detroit, said the extension is authorized by Public Law 85-

Mr. Jameson said, however, World War II veterans may not know the July 25, 1960 deadline for guaranteed loans means that VA must receive the lender's loan guaranty application by that date.

VA has up to one year after July 25, 1960, for processing GI loan applications received before that date, he said.

The 1960 deadline does not apply to VA-guaranteed loans to Korean conflict veterans, who have until January 31, 1965, to use that benefit, Mr. Jameson pointed out.






