## CANDIDACY ANNOUNCED FOR COUNTY CLERK

Roy M. West, Berkley resident for the past 17 years and an active leader in Oakland County Republican Circles, announced his candidacy today for the office of Oakland County Clerk on the Republican ticket. West, who strongly supported the election of U. S. Congressman William S. Broomfield and Sheriff Frank Irons in past campaigns, indicated that he intends to conduct a vigorous campaign for the County Office.

A 37 year old veteran of World War II, West promises "an effective, progressive and full time administration" in the event of his election as County Clerk and Register of Deeds. West believes in the necessity of a thorough review in the matter of selecting jurors in the Oakland Circuit with the aim of improving the selection of jurors in County cases. He believes it advisable to retain, in general, the present staff of the County Clerk's office and to use all available methods to continue and promote efficiency in service rendered to the public. West's experience with Court procedure over the past 8 years as a Court officer for the City of Berkley, and through association with the Oakland County Sheriff's Office, has given him a background of knowledge and experience in the fields of civil and criminal law.

West is married, father of three children, a member of the Berkley I. O. O. F., American Legion and an officer in the Berkley Lion's Club. He resides in Berkley at 2796 Griffith Ave. He formerly was engaged in private business in the City of Berkley and the City of Royal Oak.

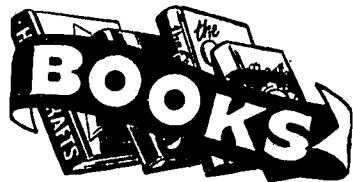
## SEEKS RE-ELECTION AS STATE REPRESENTATIVE

State Representative Lloyd L. Anderson, 1st Legislative District, Oakland County, has been appointed to three key state committees.

Anderson was appointed to the joint Senate and House committee for the revision and re-codification of township laws and a special joint committee for study of Tuberculosis problems in the state by Speaker of the House, George Van Peursen. The Township Laws Committee is composed of five senators and five representatives and the Tuberculosis Study Committee includes three senators and three representatives.

At the same time Anderson was appointed for the coming year to the state Economic Development Committee to study the population growth and needs throughout Michigan.

Anderson was elected to the first term as a member of the state House of Representatives in 1957 after serving as supervisor of Waterford Township for 6 years. He lives at 3769 Lincolnshire in Waterford Township.

## L. HARVEY LODGE CANDIDATE FOR SENATOR

Senator Harvey L. Lodge is a candidate for re-election as State Senator, 12th District (Oakland County).

Senator Lodge has already become an influential member of the Senate. He is Chairman of the important Elections Committee, member of Judiciary and also serving on Conservation.

His ability has been recognized by his colleagues in interim committee assignments. ## VETERANS ADVISED ABOUT PENSIONS

Some periods of service during wartime do not count toward eligibility of a war veteran or his widow and children for non-service-connected disability or death pension, Lloyd H. Jameson, Manager of the VA Regional Office in Detroit, announced.

Mr. Jameson said the excluded periods generally are:

1. Industrial, agricultural or indefinite furloughs.

2. Absence without leave (AWOL), if pay was forfeited for the period.

3. While under arrest, unless acquitted.

4. While in desertion status or while serving a sentence imposed by a court martial.

Mr. Jameson said none of these periods may count toward the required 90 days of minimum service which veterans of World War I, II, or the Korean Conflict period must have before they or their widows or children may qualify for pension.

Wartime veterans discharged sooner for disabilities incurred in line of duty are not subject to the 90-day service requirement, Mr. Jameson said.

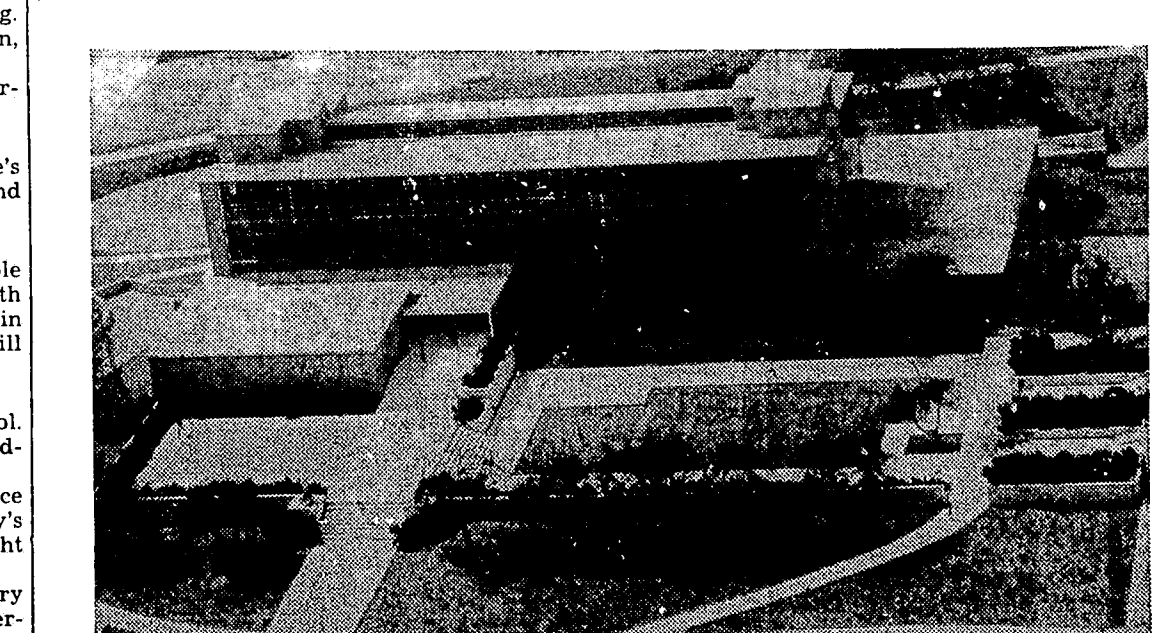

About 265 of Jehovah's Witnesses from the Pontiac and Drayton Plains congregations will attend an international convention in New York City July 27 through August 3.

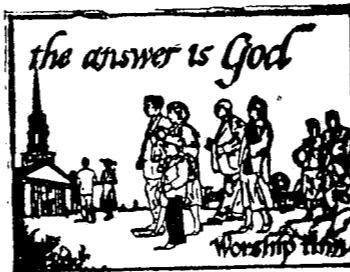
William P. Strong, presiding minister of the Drayton Plains congregation, in announcing the plans of the local delegates, said a limited program of meetings will be held in the Kingdom Hall at 600 E. Pike Street, since most of those in charge of various features will be attending the Christian assembly.

Mr. Strong said that the local delegates attending the international gathering will benefit greatly not only from the rich spiritual provisions, but also from Christian association with Witnesses from foreign lands.

When questioned about the expected attendance, Mr. Strong pointed to the record attendance of 165,000 at the 1953 international convention in New York City's Yankee Stadium. At that time several overflow

areas provided space for the Witnesses and interested persons. Yankee Stadium has again been secured, but because of the cramped quarters the previous assembly the Polo Grounds will be used in addition.

Most of those from the Pontiac and Drayton Plains congregations will be staying in private homes in New York City and nearby areas. All hotel accommodations will be filled, according to the Watchtower rooming committee, and the majority of attendees will be placed in homes following a gigantic house-to-house effort to find available accommodations.

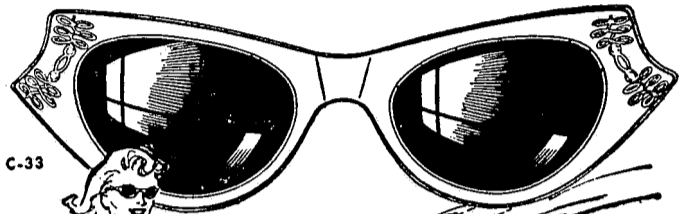

**BOATING SAFETY TIPS**

Small boat accidents are responsible for some 1,400 water fatalities each year—or more than one-fifth of all annual drownings in this country.

These grim statistics were disclosed today by Ed Mongeon, Red Cross Director of Safety Services for 16 midwestern states, in a statement giving suggestions for preventing boating accidents.

Mongeon pointed out that there are now 7,100,000 small recreational boats on American inland and coastal waterways, with an estimated 35,000,000 devotees of the sport.

He said, "Outboard motor boats are greatly in the majority of small crafts. The great popularity of the sport and resulting accident hazards turn many a week-end pleasure cruise into tragedy."

Mongeon listed the following safety rules which can prevent most boating accidents:

1. Stay ashore in bad or threatening weather. Learn to recognize signs of storms so that when out in a boat, you can return in time when bad weather threatens.

2. Don't "over-power" your boat. Many boats carry the Outboard Boating Club of America plate telling the maximum horsepower the boat's outboard

motor should have. If your boat does not have such a plate, consult a reliable marine dealer for the information before buying your outboard motor.

3. Don't overload your boat. One adult passenger to a seat is considered a good rule of thumb.

4. Avoid sudden or excessive bursts of speed.

5. When in trouble, think—don't panic.

For the sake of boating safety, Mongeon also listed the following points:

1. Know how to swim.  
2. Before leaving shore, tell someone where you're going, and then stick to this cruise plan.

3. Provide a life preserver for every passenger. Insist that non-swimmers wear a life preserver when in your boat.

4. Equip your motor boat also with oars, an anchor and line, a fire extinguisher, a first aid kit, a whistle for signaling, and, if you go out at night, flares for signaling too.

"Most boats will float when swamped or capsized", Mongeon pointed out. "Boat owners should look to their boats as a safety device, and if it is floating after an accident, by all means stay with it."

The American Red Cross has special small craft safety courses which are offered to all at no charge in the interest of public safety. These courses cover recommended methods of small craft handling and "rules of the waterways". Boat owners are advised to contact their local Red Cross for further information about the ARC Small Craft Program.

**IF YOU GO ON A TRIP TO THE 49TH STATE**

Modern-day 49ers who plan to drive to America's 49th state have an adventurous journey ahead of them, reports Harry N. Rogan, Automobile Club of Michigan travel services director.

Rogan, who has driven the 4,500 miles to Alaska, says that 3,000 Michiganders will take the trip this year. He adds that the number will increase markedly in future years due to the

flood of attention the new state has received.

Michigan motorists reach Alaska's heartland by way of Great Falls, Montana, and the Alcan Highway which starts at Canada's Dawson Creek, British Columbia. The Alcan, 1,423 miles long, cuts through a sparsely settled area with a few trading posts, road houses and camp grounds. It is about an eight-day drive from Great Falls to Fairbanks.

The Canadian portion of the road has a gravelled surface which tends to be extremely dusty during dry summer months. Motorists may find difficulty getting repair parts and should carry two mounted spare tires, spare tubes, fuel pumps, fan belt, light fuses, two ropes or cables along with standard car tool kits. Gas tanks should be protected by a rubber shield to repel flying gravel and small rocks.

Although gasoline stations are available at frequent intervals, it's generally wise to carry a spare five-gallon can.

Cost per couple on the highway would run about \$235 for the eight-day trip including \$75 for lodgings, \$80 each for
