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Clarkston Schools Announce Calendar For Opening

The calendar for the opening of the Clarkston Community Schools for the coming school year will be as follows:

Monday, August 25: High School Book Store Opens for sale of books to students in grades 7 through 12. The book store will be open Monday through Friday during the hours of 8:00 to 12:00 and 1:00 to 4:00 for the entire week.

Tuesday, August 26: All elementary buildings will have book stores open for sale of books to students in kindergarten through 6th grade. Each building will have hours from 8:00 to 12:00 and 1:00 to 4:00 Tuesday through Friday.

Tuesday, September 2: Teachers meetings. No students are to report.

Wednesday, September 3: Teachers meetings. No students to report.

Thursday, September 4: Students in grades Kindergarten through 6th grade are to report to assigned buildings at 9:15. They will be dismissed at 11:00 A. M.

Students in grades 9 through 12 are to report to the high school gym at 8:15 A. M. They will be dismissed at 12 noon.

Friday, September 5: Students in grades Kindergarten through 6th grade are to report the same as on Wednesday. They will be dismissed at 11:00 A. M.

Students in grades 7 and 8 are to report to the high school gym at 8:15 A. M. They will be dismissed at 12:00.

Monday, September 8: Kindergarten students are to attend according to their assignments. Students in grades 1 through 12 are to attend for the full day.

All building cafeterias will open on Monday, September 8.

Busses will operate on Thursday, September 4.

Students in the Clarkston School district who have not previously attended the Clarkston Community Schools are asked to register at the various buildings before September 4.

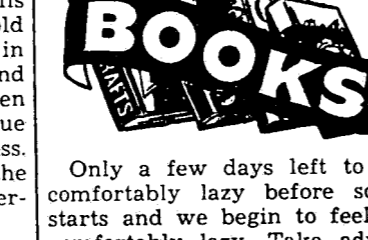

VA Office Asks Cooperation

Although "mystery mail" received in the Veterans' Administration Regional Office in Detroit has been substantially reduced, room for improvement still exists.

"Mystery mail" includes letters and other pieces of correspondence which does not fully identify the sender; thus requiring some detective work to relate it to the veteran's claim. One in 20 letters received at the office in Detroit still requires extra work to determine the subject matter and/or the writer of the letter.

Lloyd H. Jameson, Regional Office Manager, urged that persons be sure to give the benefit claim ("C") number or GI life insurance policy number, whichever applies, when writing to VA about their claims. If these numbers are not known, the veterans full name, address, date of birth, and service serial number should be given, Jameson said.

This is necessary, he said, when it is realized that there are more than 600,000 names on file at the local VA office.

In addition to saving tax dollars, Jameson said, such action allows the agency to give prompt service to veterans and their dependents.

4-H CLUBBERS GET READY FOR '58 STATE SHOW

Livestock are being carefully groomed, demonstrations rehearsed and judging eyes sharpened up in nearly every county in Michigan as 4-H Club boys and girls get ready for the State 4-H Club Show, August 26-29.

Nearly 2,000 boys and girls are expected for the event, held each year on the Michigan State University campus at East Lansing.

The 4-H Show is the climax of the 4-H year for these youngsters as they compete for premiums and awards totalling more than \$15,000. They'll stay in Shaw Hall dormitory during the four day event, where they'll catch their breath between showing steers, dairy cows, hogs or sheep or after testing their skill in judging vegetables or livestock or before displaying their ability to conduct an educational demonstration.

Girls will exhibit their skill with a needle at a dress review while boys will try their hand at doing a top notch job in handling a tractor in plowing.

The public is invited to attend the different activities during the State 4-H Show. There is no charge.

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Localite Helps Land Marines

Laurence M. Marshall, seaman, USN, of 6149 Waldon Road, Clarkston, arrived at Bari, Italy, August 5, aboard the attack transport USS Chilton after taking part in the amphibious landing by U. S. Marines at Beirut, Lebanon, July 16.

The Chilton departed from Morehead City, N. C., in late June, with over 700 Marines, provisions, ammunition, supplies and other equipment aboard. About 50 vehicles, including jeeps, and "mechanical mules", were in her cargo holds.

On the morning of July 16 combat-ready marines were ferried ashore in assault waves consisting of the ship's 25 landing craft, five boats per wave. The crew spent the next several days, working around the clock, to offload the supplies and equipment necessary to support the marines ashore.

The job was made difficult by the high surf encountered on the beach which made beaching of landing craft tricky and dangerous. Rocky beaches made frequent repairs necessary.

On completion of the landing operations, the Chilton was ordered to Bari for a well-earned rest.

DRIVE WITH CARE OVER LABOR DAY HOLIDAY

Motorists will face a real challenge on Michigan highways over the Labor Day holiday to reduce the death toll under the record low of 13 fatalities last year.

The death tolls are computed from 6 P. M. Friday to midnight Monday, a period of 78 hours. Last year the average was one death every six hours. During the five years previous to then, a death average was one every three hours, the lowest being 14 in 1951 and the highest in 1952 and 1953 with 32 each year.

The goal of the Michigan State Police is to have the lowest toll ever occurred.

Again an intensified patrol will be in effect from noon Friday, August 29, to midnight Monday, September 1. All pass days will be cancelled and more than a thousand state police on duty. Traffic patrols will work 10 hour shifts, assisted by 129 National Guardsmen. Sheriffs will have 96 Guardsmen.

State Police will use marked, semi-marked and unmarked cars. Detectives will be on desk duty to relieve unformed men for patrols.

"We will do everything we can to cut the toll", said Commissioner Joseph Childs, "but there will also be a test to just how great the improvement in driving has been. We can continue to show improvement if drivers remember to drive safely and courteously. Let's do just as good as we can."

STATE FAIR TO SEEK LONGEST PONY TAIL, BIGGEST PIE EATER

There will be a Pie Eating and Pony Tail Contest at the Michigan State Fair on Children's Day, Tuesday, September 2.

This was announced by Donald L. Swanson, general manager who said that because of the expected interest in these contests the events will be held in front of the grandstand to provide seats for spectators.

The program, free of charge, will begin at 10:30 A. M. and will be completed in time for the regular afternoon grandstand entertainment.

There will be two age groups in each contest—6 through 9, and 10 through 14.

Cash prizes of \$5, \$4, \$3, \$2 and \$1 in addition to ribbons will go to the first five places of each contest.

The colorful blueberry pie eating contest will be judged on the amount of pie eaten in three minutes without the use of the hands.

The longest pony tail will be measured from the back of the head. The hair will be drawn through a ring and measured from that point. Officials explain that the winner will be judged by length of hair only, and ask that hair decorations be omitted or limited to the front of the head.

Would be contestants should write to Children's Contest Director, Michigan State Fair, Detroit 3, Michigan. They must state their name, age, address, telephone number and the contest they wish to enter.

The State Fair opens Friday, August 29, and runs through Sunday, September 7.

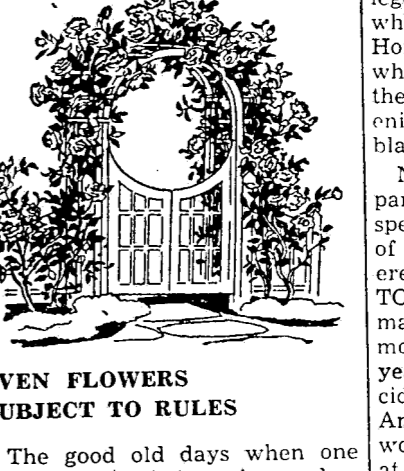

One of America's favorite legends is Washington Irving's whimsical tale of the Headless Horseman of Sleepy Hollow who rode forth at midnight from the church graveyard, a frightening figure on his powerful black charger.

Nobody believes in such apparitions in this age of high-speed realism, but the number of drivers speeding in high-powered black chargers at night TOWARD the graveyard should make 'believers' out of most motorists. Yet, it doesn't every year, some 55% of all fatal accidents occur at night, but America's Headless Horseman won't learn that excessive speed at night is like driving with a bucket over your head.

Hurried journeys present another grave danger—driving while fatigued. Eye-strain, inattentiveness, poor judgment and slowed reflexes become four deadly horsemen caused by fatigue. And when these four horsemen travel with you, you literally face a "grave" danger.

We can do without these nightmare four horsemen. We can do without "bucket-head" drivers any time—especially at night. We can do without Headless Horsemen hell-bent for the graveyard in their powerful chargers. Maybe nobody believes in apparitions, but chanting the four-word survival formula—SLOW DOWN AND LIVE—this summer long will reduce the ranks of the Headless Horseman and might keep a lot more of us alive.

Perhaps when it has become an OLDER ART, its devotees may feel more free to express their own tastes and to adapt the rules to suit their own surroundings and materials.



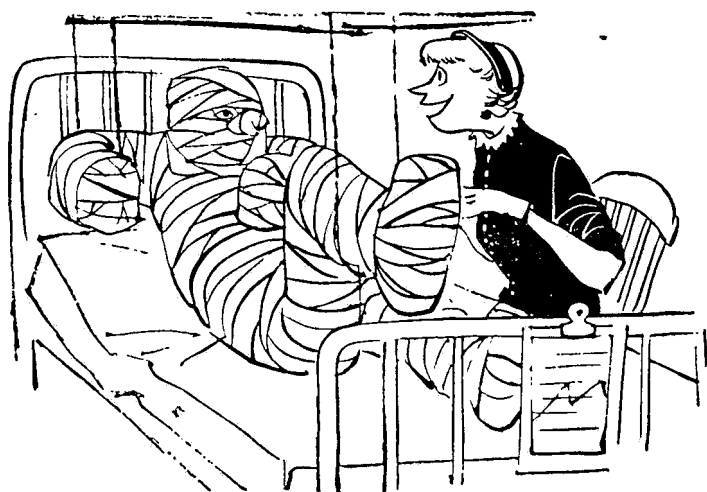
