Established in 1938, the Michigan Historical Collections contain research materials on all phases of the history of Michigan, its people, and its institutions. The Collections include over 20,000 volumes of books and pamphlets, 1,400 maps, and more than 1,000,000 letters, diaries, account books and other manuscript materials.

Some of the manuscript collections reflect the careers of men and women who have been prominent leaders in their chosen fields. Other collections contain letters and diaries written by men and women who were unknown beyond their communities, but their papers, too, are useful sources of information about social, political, and economic activities.

A trained staff sorts, cleans, repairs, catalogs, and files papers and books so they may be used for research. "Anyone who is interested in the history of Michigan or of his own community is welcome to use them in our reading room in the Rackham Building here in Ann Arbor".

Board of Education Clarkston Community Schools Clarkston Michigan

We have examined the fund balances of CLARKSTON COMMUNITY SCHOOLS as of June 30, 1958, and the related statements of cash receipts and disbursements for the year then ended. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances. The scope of our examination was not extended to include the child accounting records of the school system. State aid payments which were based on such child accounting records were confirmed directly by us from the State authorities. We also inspected a letter from the County superintendent of schools which stated that they had audited the child accounting records during the period and found that they were "correct and comply with the laws of the State of Michigan". In our opinion, the accompanying statement of fund balances and statements of receipts and disbursements present fairly the financial position of Clarkston Community Schools at June 30, 1958 and the results of its operations for the year then ended, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

Inside the Goodwill plant, girls were taking routine calls for pick-ups. The phone rang persistently. Even more persistent was the lady on the other end of the line.

"I am moving to California and wish to give everything in the house to Goodwill. Have a truck out here today! I leave tonight."

The donation of a houseful of furniture and furnishings is not an every-day occurrence. It meant work and pay to many handicapped people. Trucking supervisor Bill Baumgartner could not call a truck off its run. It would disappoint other distributors of discards.

There was one chance open. A truck was in the garage for repairs. Baumgartner put pressure on the garage. Extra mechanics were put on the job, and the truck wheeled out at 3:05 P. M. with three more men borrowed for the job.

Pulling up in front of a modest, neat home in northwest Dearborn, Goodwill's driver was happy. This trip would mean a great deal to Goodwill Industries.





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
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
