2 packages lady fingers 2 tablespoons lemon juice

Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Drain syrup from pineapple and add enough cold water to make 1½ cups. Stir into gelatin along with lemon juice. Refrigerate until thick and syrupy but not firm. Meanwhile arrange lady fingers in a 9-inch glass pie plate to form a scalloped edge. Overlap them a little and fill in the bottom to make a solid shell. Beat egg white stiff and gradually beat in sugar. With same beater, whip cream until stiff. Fold drained pineapple tidbits, egg white and cream into thickened gelatin. Save out a few pineapple pieces for the top. Chill again till it will mound and hold shape. Spoon into lady finger shelk. Chill several hours, until firm. Whip rest of cream. Sweeten lightly and spoon onto center of pie. Decorate with halved strawberries and rest of the pineapple.


