Civil service tests to pick Oakland County's candidates for West Point will be held Monday, November 18, announced Congressman William S. Broomfield (R-Oakland County) today. Candidates also will be re-

quired to pass a preliminary physical examination. The four applicants who score highest on the civil service tests will be named principal and three alternates to the United States Military Academy, said Broomfield. One will be finally selected to attend the four-year college course at the Academy. All youths who are residents

of Oakland County who are between ages 17 and 22, of good moral character, are urged to contact Congressman Broomfield at his home office, 2300 North Woodward, Royal Oak, or his Washington office, Room 1422, New House Office Building, not later than October 15. The November 17 examinations will be held in Detroit, Flint and Pontiac at times and places to be announced at a later date.

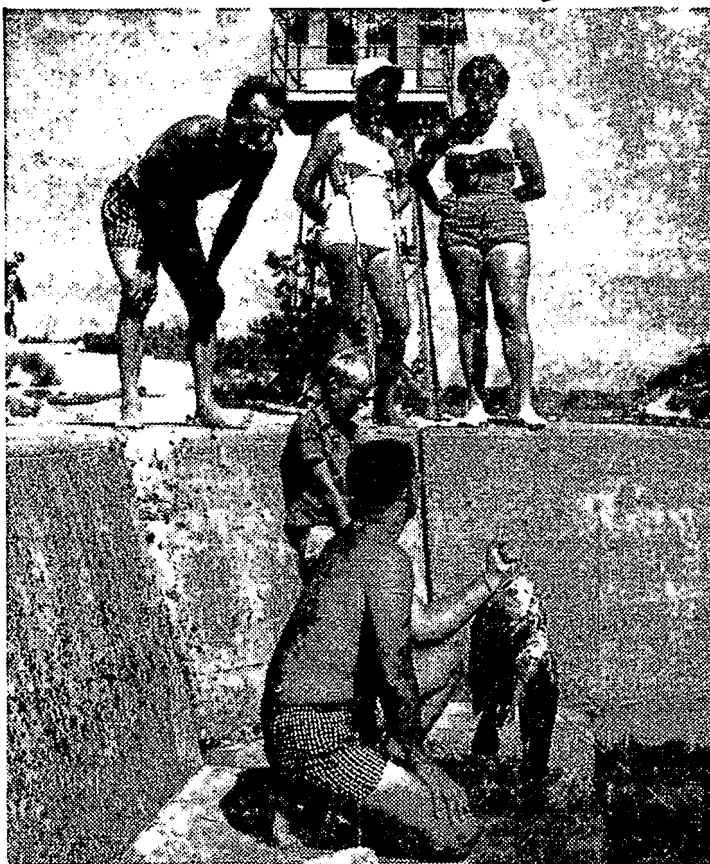
Though named for the city in which concerts are presented, the orchestra represents a large area not only in musical personnel but in supporters and concert goers.

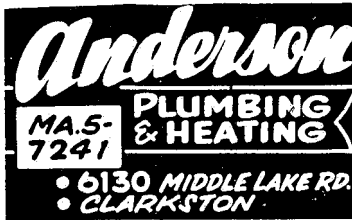
**EDISON LIGHTING SCHOOL FOR CONTRACTORS**

P.T.A. Sets Membership Month They'll Knock On Igloo Doors In Newest State When more than eleven million P.T.A. members open their annual Membership Enrollment month this October, they will be urged to "knock on every door" to find new members interested in advancing the welfare of children. Some of those doors may open to the oldest dwellings in the Western hemisphere—stone igloo homes in Alaska, scheduled soon to become the nation's 49th state. Here, as throughout the U.S., the National Congress of Parents and Teachers will seek to add some half-million new "parents, teachers or friends of children" to what is already the nation's largest voluntary service organization. Mrs. James C. Parker, of Grand Rapids, Mich., president of the National Congress, cites "the dynamic potential of Alaska, our newest state," as "comparable to the spirit which has enabled Parent-Teacher associations to contribute so much to the welfare of children. The variety and scope of P.T.A. activities in the 61-year history of the National Congress are reflected today, Mrs. Parker noted, in the everyday life of Alaskans which ranges in spirit from the quite sophisticated to the "truly frontier." Alaska's Congress of Parents and Teachers, which became a part of the national organization in 1957, today faces problems which can be compared, Mrs. Parker pointed out, with those recorded over the years in tiny American communities or in its largest cities. For it is a land where... School youngsters may ride for miles in a dog sled to a crowded, poorly-heated, open-sided hut, or walk across the street to a modern, seven-story building... teachers and government workers regularly make trips "back in the bush" to hunt and fish for food for their families—and store it in modern freezers. —Where the airplane is the accepted means of travel between cities, but where the number of sled dogs is increasing. —Where teachers in schools with large Eskimo or Indian populations must teach a second language—English—to many of their charges, while other schools, especially those on U.S. army bases, maintain typically American libraries, theaters and bowling alleys as part of their recreation program. —Aims of the National Congress membership month will apply

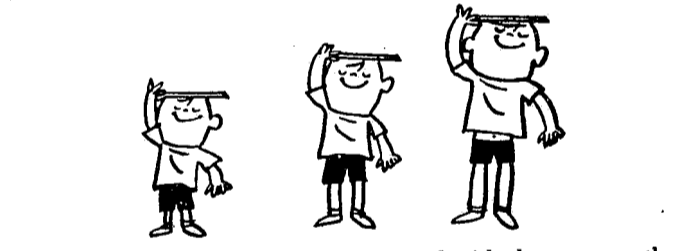

Motion by Bauer, supported by Anthony, that the Treasurer's

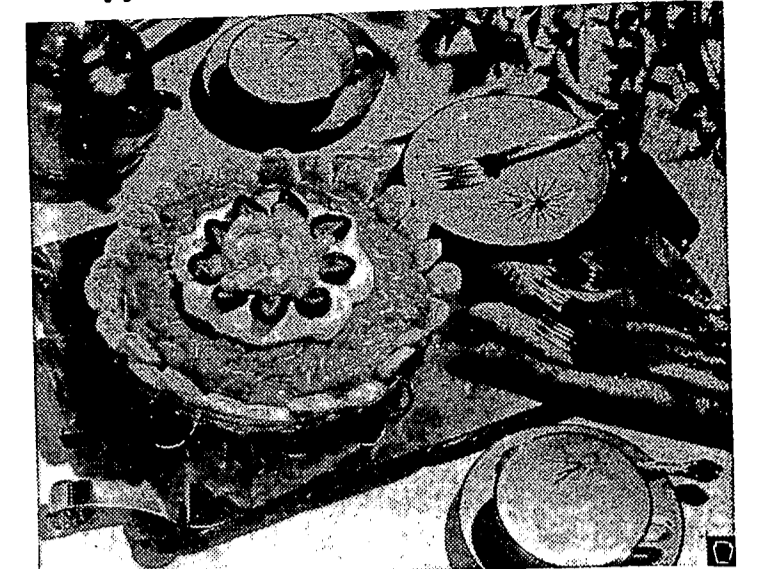
report of Water Department funds be approved for the period ending August 31, 1958. Motion Carried.

  - 2 packages lady fingers
- Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Drain syrup from pineapple and add enough cold water to make 1 1/4 cups. Stir into gelatin along with lemon juice. Refrigerate until thick and syrupy but not firm. Meanwhile arrange lady fingers in a 9-inch glass pie plate to form a scalloped edge. Overlap them a little and fill in the bottom to make a solid shell. Beat egg white stiff and gradually beat in sugar. With same beater, whip cream until stiff. Fold drained pineapple tidbits, egg white and cream into thickened gelatin. Save out a few pineapple pieces for the top. Chill again till it will mound and hold shape. Spoon into lady finger shell. Chill several hours, until firm. Whip rest of cream. Sweeten lightly and spoon onto center of pie. Decorate with halved strawberries and rest of the pineapple.

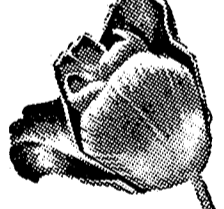
