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

custom and religion." Dr. Schuck informed President Eisenhower that the organization has taken steps for the "fullest cooperation to this noble purpose" and that the members totaling 4,751,000 boys and men have been requested to "fully support the proclamation.'

President Eisenhower, a member of the Boy Scouts' National Executive Board since 1948, wrote Dr. Schuck:

"I am heartened by your note telling me of the support to be given to the National Day of Prayer to be observed on October first. Not only am I delighted that the Boy Scouts themselves will participate, but I know that they will carry back to their homes an interest in this significant, and I hope from now on, yearly event."

Dr. Schuck wrote the local council that he "was very much moved by the thought of an entire nation on a given day, and in accordance with forms and tenets of our respective religions, praying to God for the moral and spiritual strengthening of our nation, for peace among all people, and for freedom for mankind."

He urged that, where possible 'leaders and Scouts join with others in any meeting or attend services that may be arranged of people of the same faith to participate with them in prayer, in accordance with the tenets of their religion and in cooperation with their respective religious leaders; or that at unit meetings held during the week in which October 1 occurs, where boys are of like faith, prayers be made, again in accordance with the faith of the members of the unit."

Dr. Schuck also suggested that during that week Scouts be encouraged to attend the church of their faith and engage in prayer.


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


