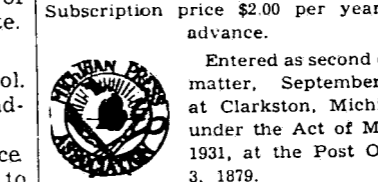

BOY SCOUTS TO OBSERVE DAY OF PRAYER

The Clinton Valley Council, Boy Scouts of America, with headquarters in Pontiac, is urging its 11,500 members to observe October 1 as a day of prayer for the nation and for mankind, in accordance with President Eisenhower's proclamation.

Dr. Arthur A. Schuck, Chief Scout Executive of the Boy Scouts of America, in a message to Scout Executive Edward H. Leland of the Clinton Valley Council, said, "Each of us, I know, covets every opportunity to make the twelfth point of the Scout Law effective. Also, each of us in Scouting recognizes the power and importance of prayer."

The twelfth point of the Scout Law reads: "A Scout is reverent. He is reverent toward God. He is faithful in his religious duties and respects the convictions of others in matters of custom and religion." Dr. Schuck informed President Eisenhower that the organization has taken steps for the "fullest cooperation to this noble purpose" and that the members totaling 4,751,000 boys and men have been requested to "fully support the proclamation."

President Eisenhower, a member of the Boy Scouts' National Executive Board since 1948, wrote Dr. Schuck:

"I am heartened by your note telling me of the support to be given to the National Day of Prayer to be observed on October first. Not only am I delighted that the Boy Scouts themselves will participate, but I know that they will carry back to their homes an interest in this significant, and I hope from now on, yearly event."

Dr. Schuck wrote the local council that he "was very much moved by the thought of an entire nation on a given day, and in accordance with forms and tenets of our respective religions, praying to God for the moral and spiritual strengthening of our nation, for peace among all people, and for freedom for mankind."

He urged that, where possible, "leaders and Scouts join with others in any meeting or attend services that may be arranged of people of the same faith to participate with them in prayer, in accordance with the tenets of their religion and in cooperation with their respective religious leaders; or that at unit meetings held during the week in which October 1 occurs, where boys are of like faith, prayers be made, again in accordance with the faith of the members of the unit."

Dr. Schuck also suggested that during that week Scouts be encouraged to attend the church of their faith and engage in prayer.

GOODWILL INDUSTRIES ASKS YOUR SUPPORT

This is the importance of rehabilitation programs for those left with permanent disabilities. It concerns the long and expensive road back to normal living. It takes time, patience and courage on the part of each person afflicted. It also takes a great

deal of money, too much money for any individual to afford. The public, through government funds and through donations, has assumed this burden.

The final steps in this long rehabilitation effort are the most important. These are vocational training and jobs.

Goodwill industries of Detroit offers this phase of physical rehabilitation to hundreds of men and women without cost to the public or to the individual. In fact the person afflicted earns money. He earns it both during vocational training period and later, if hired as a regular employee after he has become efficient enough to produce under competitive conditions.

The Goodwill program is based on public support. This support does not mean money, but comes in the form of clothes and other usable discards the people have and don't need.

The physically handicapped workers at Goodwill recondition each item and sell them at a reasonable price in Goodwill retail stores. It costs the contributor no money. It costs her little time. It benefits her in two ways—one materially and the other, spiritually. Materially, she is able to keep her closets and attics free

of articles that she does not feel like throwing away but has no need for.

Spiritually, she knows that she has helped others less fortunate and has done so in a positive way. Money cannot buy this intrinsic benefit that every person needs so much.

GET READY FOR HUNTING SEASON

Hunting seasons in northern Michigan will be in full swing October 1 with deer, bear and small game as targets.

Archery deer season gets underway throughout the state for some 35,000 - 40,000 bow and arrow enthusiasts. These modern Robin Hoods may take deer of any age, either sex, during the October 1 - November 5 season in 79 counties.

Archers are restricted to "bucks only" in Emmet, Menominee and Chippewa counties—excluding Drummond Island. However, during an October 1 - December 15 season in Allegan county, deer of either sex are legal game for archers.

Bow and arrow hunting for bears also is legal throughout the state during the October 1 - November 5 season.

Firearm hunters, meanwhile,

will be in action during an October 1 - November 5 bear season in the upper peninsula and the northern lower peninsula. Bears may be hunted under a small game license during this season and use of dogs is permitted.

In the U. P. and the northern lower peninsula, an October 1 - November 10 season is in effect for ruffed grouse and squirrels, while an October 1 - March 1 season covers hunting for cottontail rabbits and snowshoe hares.

Prairie chickens and sharpshins may be hunted in the U. P. only during an October 1 - November 10 season.

Specific areas closed to certain types of hunting during these seasons are listed in the 1958 Michigan Game Law Digest, available from license dealers or Department district field headquarters.

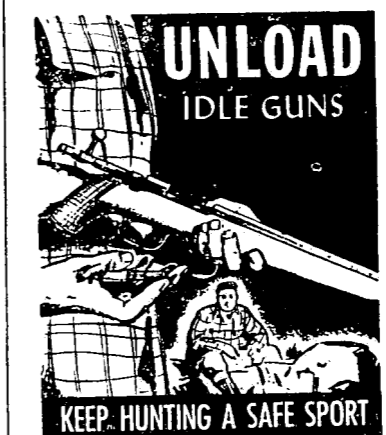

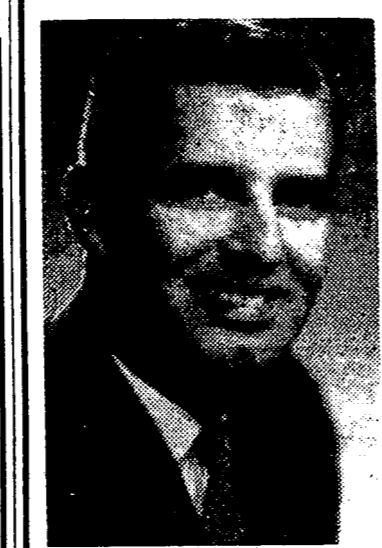
