LEADER DOGS FOR THE BLIND

Somewhere, listening to the radio, sitting quietly, hands folded, is a man who is blind. This man is quite alone, purposeless, on a long, unhappy journey through darkness.

Another man, also surrounded by the unseen, sits on the edge of his bed at the Leader Dog Headquarters in Rochester, Michigan. He is listening for something.

People are talking in the hallway, somewhere a door creaks and a car passes outside. Usual noises. Then footsteps approach, and the faint pad, pad, and click of an animal walking. Yes-a furry muzzle with a wet, cold nose brushes his hand and the instructor's ing. friendly voice says, "This is Storm. He's the dog we've chosen for you".

Yes, here is your Leader Dog, your guide through the darkness. Here are your eyes.

And somehow the world is a better place. Suddenly, the loneliness has lifted and darkness is easier to bear.

Later, after four weeks of training with his Leader Dog, after learning commands and traffic techniques and walking with the dog through as many varied circumstances as possible, after the achievement of a mutual respect, trust and friendship between man and dog, this hesitant, faltering person has changed to an erect, confident being who has challenged and conquered one of life's severest handicaps. Now, with his Leader Dog, he has a new-found freedom and independence. He can walk down the street, travel, board a bus or train, and perhaps most important of all, he can hold a job and earn his own living.

Leader Dogs for the Blind, a Michigan United Fund Agency, has supplied over 1,100 Leader Dogs to people handicapped by blindness. The following letter was received this week and by printing it in its entirety The News feels that people will be more polio conscious:

Dear Mr. Stamp:

It is repeatedly coming to my attention that a considerable number of people in the Clarkston area have not received immunization against poliomyelitis. This is especially true among adults. In the course of investigation I have found that many people labor under the idea that people over 40 do not need this vaccine. This is a serious error and in view of the fact that Detroit is undergoing a severe polio epidemic, I should like to request that The Clarkston News advise the people in the community that all people at all stages of life are vulnerable to this disease and although the percentage of paralytic polio is low, the paral-
