United Fund Enters Final Week

Hope of attaining a goal of \$6,978 continues high for the 170 United Fund campaign workers who are covering Independence Township as it has never been covered before.

As this year's campaign enters its final week, Campaign Chairman, Merle Bennett reports a total of \$3,884.50 raised, about 55% of the goal.

The Commercial and Industrial Division, headed by Jerry Wilford and "Bud" Hawke has already collected \$2,045.00 toward its quota of \$2,543.00; while Betty Gaines, Women's Division Chairman, has returns from her group totalling \$1,035.00 toward a quota of \$3,785.00.

Special commendation is due the Clarkston Community Schools, both teaching and non-teaching employees, for their outstanding increase of 77% over the amount contributed last year. This group reported \$804 collected as compared with \$456.00 in 1957.

Jerry Wilford states that his Commercial Division Workers deserve a special round of applause. All have bettered last year's solicitation results for businesses in their areas. Greatest improvement noted was shown by Phil Smith, who obtained \$74.00 from businesses which last year gave \$2.00. Others are: Glenn Rundell, \$60.00 compared to \$4.00; Tom Doremus, \$30.00 over \$5.00; Keith Hallman, \$244.50 over \$235.50; Herb Beach, \$90.00 over \$65.00; Pete Rose, \$65.00 compared to \$45.00; Everett Butters, \$35.00 over \$25; and Dean Smith \$60.00 over \$50.

Merle Bennett emphasized that these increases should not imply that attainment of the goal is assured; for it is anticipated that decreases in other Divisions may more than offset these gains. "It is going to be very close; one or two gifts can make the difference between reaching the goal and missing it," he stated.

Rotary Club Hears Engineer

Mr. Frederick P. Warrick spoke and gave practical demonstrations of electrical engineering to an interested and fascinated audience of Rotarians on Monday evening.

It was shown how a capacitor could be used for storing electrical energy. Then a resistance was placed in series to illustrate how the charging and discharging time could be controlled. A small light bulb was used to give visual proof of this process.

A simplified demonstration was given on electronic computers principles. It involved the use of resistance and capacitance. A stroboscope was used to make the blades of a fan appear motionless although they were revolving at over 1,600 revolutions per minute.

The high speed of light was demonstrated very interestingly by means of a 22 caliber rifle bullet being shot through a glass plate covered with aluminum foil. An ordinary camera was used to photograph the bullet in flight by means of the light which flashed for only eight-millionths of a second.

Next week a film will be shown depicting trajectory bombing methods used during the last war.

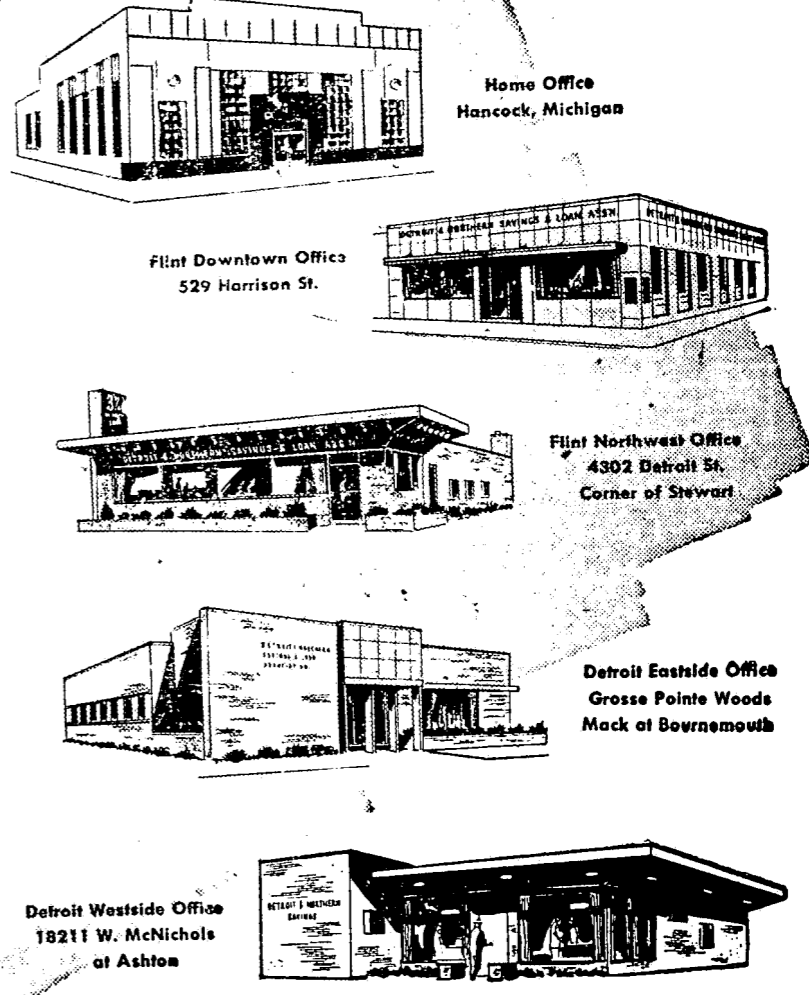

1. were filed together. Now juveniles between seven and 17 years of age are covered in a new separate form.

The new form asks for different information than is recorded for adults, and is a different color to prevent mis-filing with adult records.

Separation of the records is in keeping with current trends recommended by juvenile authorities. Most juvenile apprehension records will be destroyed when the person reaches age 21, giving him a clean slate with which to start his adult years.

Only records of youth involved in serious crimes and those of repeated offenders and incorrigibles will be kept for reference purposes.

Generally, juveniles are turned over to the custody of their parents or legal guardians when apprehended, with the promise that the offenders will appear in probate court on a designated date. If, however, a juvenile requires immediate detention for a specific reason he is turned over to probate custody, but it is not permissible to put him in jail.

Two copies of the State Police juvenile apprehension reports are prepared. One is kept at the post and the other goes to headquarters in East Lansing. The reports are confidential to police departments and probate courts.

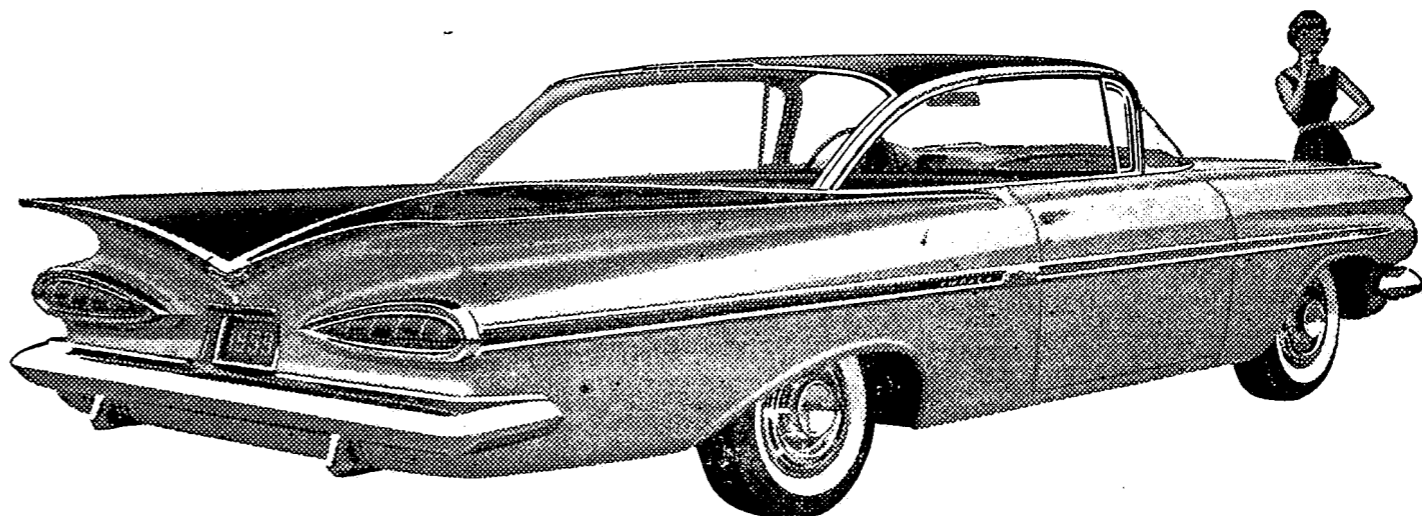

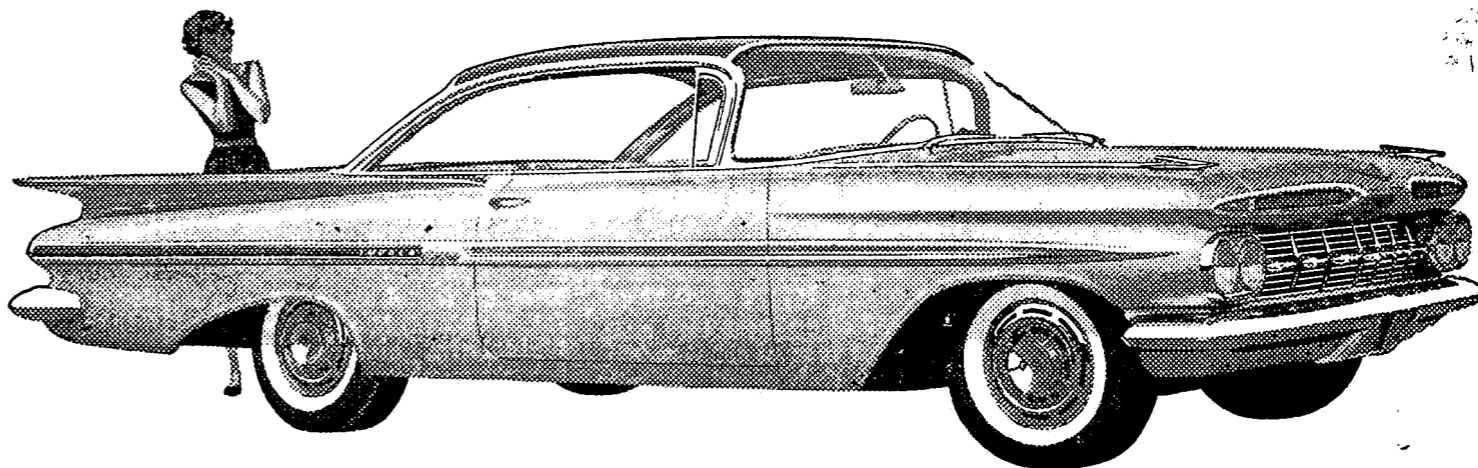

HIGH TEAM SERIES
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STATE POLICE TO GET NEW WEAPONS

Michigan State Police officers are to be equipped with 30 caliber M-1 folding carbines to give them greater effectiveness in combat with criminals in get-away cars.

Use of the new weapons was prompted by a gunman a year ago in which a Michigan and an Indiana trooper were shot to death, a Michigan trooper was critically injured and an Indiana city patrolman hurt.

Bullets from police revolvers used in the 300-mile pursuit from Clinton, Mich., into Indiana were not effective in piercing the car used by the two gunmen. The gunmen later were forced to abandon the car and in a gun battle one was fatally shot and the other captured.

About 500 of the short, light-weight, convertible type rifles have been obtained, sufficient to equip each patrol car and have a reserve. The guns were made available through the Michigan office of Civil Defense from military supplies at a price low enough to enable the purchase.

A training program to acquaint each officer with the new equipment will be started soon.

The main advantage of the

carbine is its maneuverability. It is only 25 inches long with the 11-inch steel frame stock folded in and weighs about five pounds compared to nine or 10 pounds for standard rifles.

The quickness with which the carbine can be used with hand grips or brought into shoulder shooting position makes it a good weapon for blockade or other police work. A flick of the stock from its folded-in position makes it ready to place against the shoulder like a regulation rifle for greater steadiness and accuracy.

The carbine takes 15 and 30-round clips, is semiautomatic and has nearly as much piercing power as a heavier 30 caliber rifle. It has enough power to pierce a car body from any angle, whereas revolver shots

often ricochet off. The M-1 has a maximum range of 600 yards, which is not as far as the higher powered rifles currently used by the State Police, but is farther than the regulation rifle will shoot. It is the first semiautomatic weapon the department has ever used.
