IMPROVED POSTAL SERVICE FOR CLARKSTON PATRONS

Faster and improved mail service for a 9-county area was announced by Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield last month. The new service which started October 20, 1958, will cover Genesee, Lapeer, Livingston, Macomb, Monroe, Oakland, St. Clair, Washtenaw, and Wayne Counties. A 7,000 square mile area with 156 postoffices serving over 4,000,000 people will be involved in a speed-up of all first class mail. Letters mailed before 5 P. M. on a weekday will be delivered to their destination within the area on the following day, barring occasional human errors Over 1,400,000 pieces of first class mail will be handled daily within this 9-county area.

A new Sunday pick-up of mail for the Clarkston Post Office was also started. This mail will bear a Drayton Plains postmark.

The following is a schedule of mail departure from Clarkston Post Office: Monday through Saturday. 8:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M.; Sundays and Holidays, 1:00 P. M. (bearing a Drayton Plains postmark).
