Dr. Sarah Van Hoosen Jones was speaker at the November meeting of the General Richardson chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution. Dr. Jones, a member of the chapter, spoke on Land Grant College Culture and in particular of Michigan

State University of which she was a former regent. She said the earliest colleges founded by the church had a curriculum comprising generally theology and the dead languages. Michigan Agricultural College founded in 1855 was the first such college in the United States, but with the passage of the Land Grant Act which was signed

by President Abraham Lincoln in 1862 the way was paved for others to be established. This act gave acreage which could be used for agricultural colleges and now they number 69. Because of different interests these colleges developed an expanded curriculum, adding engineering, physics and other similar courses, and in addition farmers' institutes and extension courses.

The development of Michigan Agricultural College to Michigan State University is of particular interest to Dr. Jones and Oakland County, since this county is the site of the new Michigan State University Oakland.

**SAFETY SUNDAY  
NOVEMBER 16**

Governor G. Mennen Williams has proclaimed Sunday, November 16, 1958, as Traffic Safety Sunday at the request of an inter-faith committee of prominent Catholic, Protestant and Jewish clergy. This is sponsored by an inter-faith committee of Catholic, Jewish and Protestant members and is a special Sunday set aside during the season of Thanksgiving for citizens to take inventory of their moral responsibilities as safe and courteous drivers on our highways.

The Governor said, "Unfortunately, during this period of joyful and solemn celebrations, we may expect our most serious and heartbreaking losses of the year, those caused by preventable traffic accidents."

Traffic Safety Sunday has the cooperation of the State Safety Commission, Michigan Citizens Highway Safety Action Committee and the National Safety Council.

Gerald W. Shipman, Executive Secretary of the State Safety Commission, said this is the fifth year the Traffic Safety Sunday program has been carried out state-wide in Michigan. Although our death toll from traffic accidents has been reduced in the last two years, it is a known fact that the last three months of the year are still the deadliest with November and December raking the highest toll in that order. "We hope that Traffic Safety Sunday intended to be only a one day program", Shipman said, "but that the citizens of Michigan will more firmly sense their responsibility as safe drivers every day of the year."

**FIREARM DEER SEASON  
OPENS SATURDAY**

More than 400,000 hunters will open Michigan's firearm deer season on November 15.

By season's end, Conservation Department officials estimate 450,000 hunters will have been afield.

The opener this year falls on Saturday, which should intensify the usually heavy hunting on the front end of the season.

Of prime interest will be the state-wide concurrent special seasons. The Department has issued special permits to 55,601 licensed hunters, each of whom may hunt the entire 16-day season in their properly permitted area, and take a buck, doe or fawn, as they choose.

This is the first year all special seasons have run concurrently with the regular 16-day buck season. Experience with these

concurrent seasons has shown them popular with hunters. Also, some deer that might otherwise be wasted are recovered by permit holders.

Again this year, the Department will operate deer checking stations along principal north-south highways where hunters may, if they like, have their deer checked for age, weight and physical development. Information gathered at these stations helps state biologists with deer management programs. Also, highway counts of deer

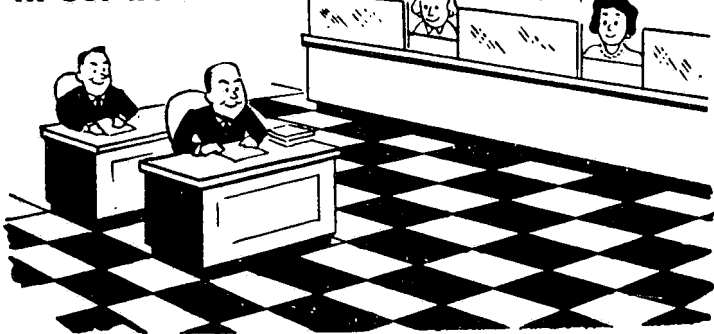
on cars will be made and the figures statistically calculated to determine total deer kill.

In past years, this method has given quick and rather accurate estimates of the kill.
