We're in for a feal treat at Clarkston High, on Thursday, December 4, at 7:00 P. M. The Biology Club is bringing Paul Allen and some of his snakes from his famous Serpentarium on the Dixie Highway. His program will include a display, lecture and film.

The display is a series of glassfront cages containing living specimens of American and other reptiles, including the poisonous species of the United States. It is perfectly safe.

The lecture covers basic knowledge of reptiles, including biological aspects. It is highly entertaining and is accompanied by live specimens. The lecture m slanted for any age group and includes a question and answer period.

The film is a pictorial record of an actual bite by a Michigan rattlesnake and the treatment and development of the injury. This film, under medical supervision, is the most comprehensive study ever made of the bite of a Massasauga.






