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Snakes Alive !!!

We're in for a real treat at Clarkston High, on Thursday, December 4, at 7:00 P. M. The Biology Club is bringing Paul Allen and some of his snakes from his famous Serpentarium on the Dixie Highway. His program will include a display, lecture and film.

The display is a series of glass-front cages containing living specimens of American and other reptiles, including the poisonous species of the United States. It is perfectly safe.

The lecture covers basic knowledge of reptiles, including biological aspects. It is highly entertaining and is accompanied by live specimens. The lecture is slanted for any age group and includes a question and answer period.

The film is a pictorial record of an actual bite by a Michigan rattlesnake and the treatment and development of the injury. This film, under medical supervision, is the most comprehensive study ever made of the bite of a Massasauga.

Tickets may be purchased at the door or from Mr. Terry Thomas in the high school, or any member of the Biology Club. There is a small admission charge.

PLANS BEING SET UP FOR BUILDING OF CHURCH

The Township of Independence, Oakland County, Michigan, hereby grants to the Consumers Power Company a corporation authorized to transact business in Michigan, its successors and assigns, hereinafter called "Grantee," the right, power and authority to lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges, and other public places, and to do a local gas business in the Township of Independence, Oakland County, Michigan, for a period of thirty years.

SECTION 2. In consideration of the rights, power and authority hereby granted, all of which shall vest in the Grantee for a period of thirty years, said Grantee shall faithfully perform all things required by the terms hereof.

SECTION 3. Said Grantee shall at all times keep and save the Township free and harmless from all loss, costs and expense to which it may be subjected by reason of the negligent construction and maintenance of the structures and equipment hereby authorized. In case any action is commenced against the Township on account of the permission herein given, said Grantee shall, upon notice, defend the Township and save it free and harmless from all loss, cost and damage arising out of such negligent construction and maintenance.

SECTION 5. The rights, power and authority herein granted, are not exclusive. Either manufactured or natural gas may be furnished hereunder.

SECTION 6. Said Grantee shall from time to time extend its gas distribution system to and within said Township, and shall furnish gas to applicants residing therein whenever the amount of gas to be furnished thereby shall provide an adequate and reasonable return upon the cost of making such extensions and providing such service.

Said Grantee shall be entitled to charge the inhabitants of said Township for gas furnished therein, the rates, including minimum charges, as approved by the Michigan Public Service Commission, to which Commission or its successors authority and jurisdiction to fix and regulate gas rates and rules regulating such service in said Township, are hereby granted for the term of this franchise. Such rates and rules shall be subject to review and change at any time upon petition therefor being made by either said Township, acting by its Township Board, or by said Grantee.

This ordinance shall cease and be of no effect after thirty days from its adoption, unless within said period the Grantee shall accept the same in writing filed with the Township Clerk, subject to confirmation of the grant hereof by at least a majority of the electors of said Township voting thereon at a regular or special township election to be held in the manner provided by law. Upon the acceptance and confirmation hereof, this ordinance shall constitute a contract between said Township and said Grantee for a period of thirty years from the date of such acceptance.
