Beat egg whites stiff and slowly pour remaining hot syrup into egg whites, beating con-stantly until mixture is cold and stands in sharp peaks. Drain pine-apple; cut cherries in half. Whip cream. Stir cream, raisins, pecans, pineapple, cherries, flavoring and cereal into beaten egg white mix-Unmold. Makes 6 to 8 servings.


