CENSUS BUREAU TO COLLECT EMPLOYMENT INFO.

Information to be used in compiling national figures on employment and unemployment will be collected locally during the week of December 15 in the Current Population Survey, it was announced today by Supervisor J. E. Tharaldson of the U. S. Census Bureau's Regional Office in Detroit which will participate in the survey.

The information collected from local families will be combined with that collected in 329 other areas of the country to provide the national estimates. Approximately 35,000 households are included each month in the Current Population Survey. These households are selected at random under the Census Bureau's scientific sampling program to provide a representative cross-section of all classes of the population, and all types of areas in the country, large cities, small towns, rural areas, and so forth.

Facts on employment and unemployment collected locally are forwarded to Census Bureau headquarters in Washington to be processed by the Bureau's electronic computer known as Univac, to provide the national estimates. The national report covering the information to be collected locally during the week of December 15 will be issued in Washington early in January.

Current Population Survey information will be collected from a number of local families by certified enumerators.

All of the families of the church are cordially invited to enjoy the evenings program with the children of the church. The service is under the direction of Mrs. Millie Broadway.

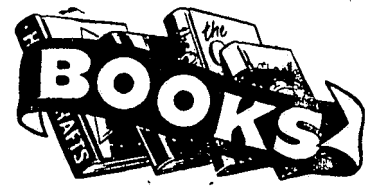
ALIENS TO REPORT ADDRESSES IN JANUARY

District Director Walter A. Sahli of the Immigration and Naturalization Service states that the annual alien address report program usually causes a sharp rise in the number of applications for naturalization.

The law requires all aliens in the United States with few exceptions, to report their address each January. Throughout the United States almost thirty percent more applications for naturalization are received during the months of January, February and March than are received during other months. Mr. Sahli attributes this sudden rise to the Alien Address Report Program.

Aliens not required to make this report are diplomats, those accredited to certain international organizations and those who have entered temporarily as agricultural laborers.

Forms for making the reports will be available to aliens at all Post Offices and offices of the Immigration and Naturalization Service during the month of January. Mr. Sahli indicated that aliens desiring information concerning naturalization or similar matters should obtain the forms at an office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service where personnel trained in these fields will be available to answer inquiries.

He filed a petition bearing the names of fourteen qualified electors requesting a Special Election for the purpose of granting a franchise to Consumers Power Co., its successors, assigns, for the purpose of conducting a local gas business within the Township.

Mr. Anthony then introduced a resolution as follows:

WHEREAS, at a meeting of this Board, held on the 2nd day of December, 1958, an Ordinance was adopted, granting a franchise to Consumers Power Company, its successors, and assigns, for the purpose of laying, maintaining and operating gas mains, pipes and services on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges and other public places in said Township, and to do a local gas business therein, all in accordance with the terms thereof, to which reference is hereby made; and WHEREAS, there has been presented to this Board a petition signed by at least twelve electors of the Township requesting that a special election and Township meeting be called for the purpose of voting upon the question of confirming the grant of said franchise; and

WHEREAS, said franchise has heretofore been accepted by said Consumers Power Company, subject to confirmation, and it has also requested in writing that the same be submitted to the electors at a special election, and has heretofore paid to this Board the sum of Three Hundred Fifty dollars which, in the opinion of the Board, is sufficient to defray the expenses of said special election;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, THAT a special township meeting and election of the Township of Independence, Oakland County, Michigan be and is hereby ordered held at: Precinct No. 1, Township Hall, 90 N. Main St., Clarkston; Precinct No. 2, Sashabaw School, 5275 Maybee Road; Precinct No. 3, Fire Station No. 2, 7825 Sashabaw Road, in said Township, the same being the place or places where the last annual township meeting was held, which said special election shall be held on the 21st day of January, 1959. 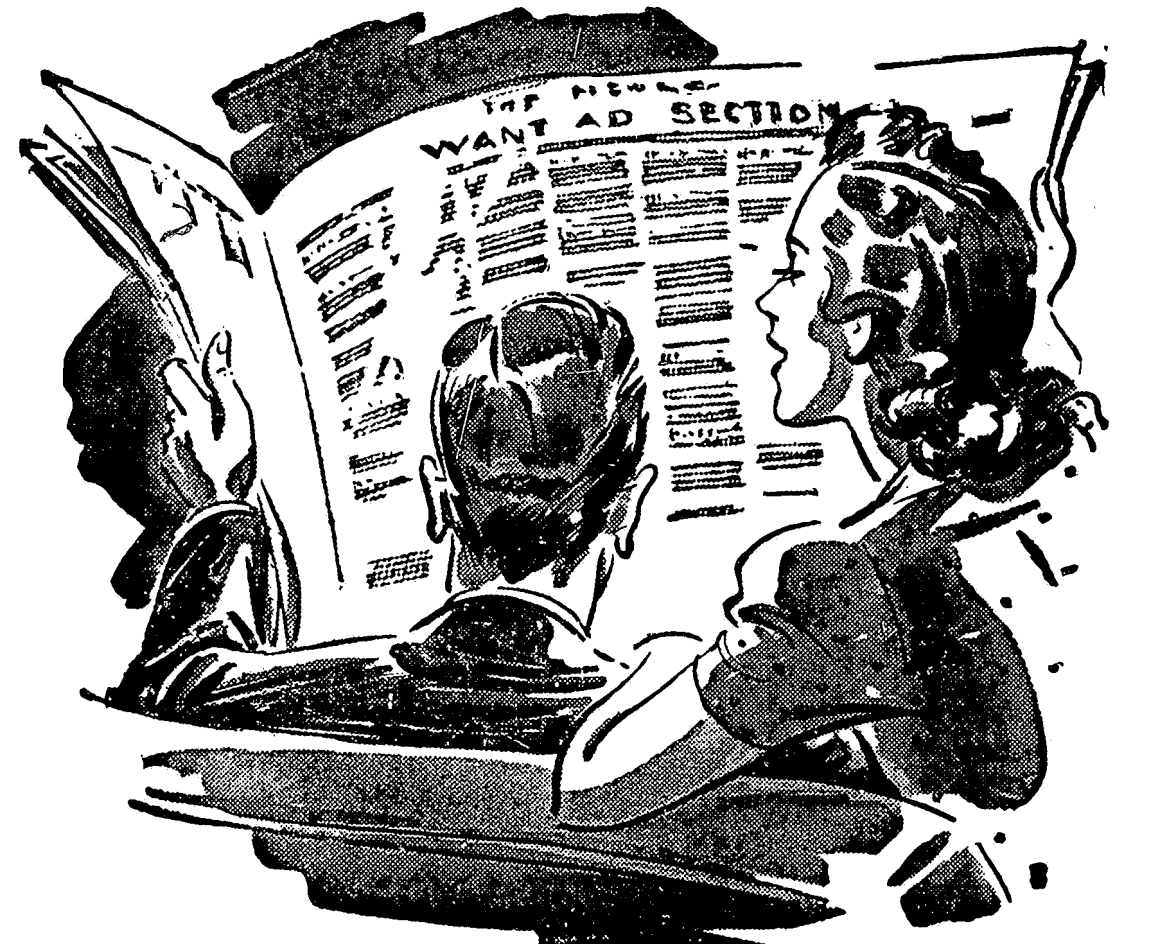

2 egg whites
1 tablespoon white corn syrup
1 can (9 oz.) crushed pineapple, drained
20 maraschino cherries
1 cup heavy cream
1/4 cup golden raisins
1/4 cup finely chopped pecans
1 teaspoon imitation rum flavoring

Combine sugar and water in a saucepan, stirring constantly until sugar dissolves. Cook to 245°, or hard ball stage. Remove from heat and pour half of the syrup over cereal. Mix lightly until cereal is coated; spread on waxed paper to cool. Beat egg whites stiff and slowly pour remaining hot syrup into egg whites, beating constantly until mixture is cold and stands in sharp peaks. Drain pineapple; cut cherries in half. Whip cream. Stir cream, raisins, pecans, pineapple, cherries, flavoring and cereal into beaten egg white mixture. Spoon mixture into individual molds; freeze until firm. Unmold. Makes 6 to 8 servings.
