## Christmas Services At First Methodist

First Methodist Church, Clarkston, will celebrate Christmas Sunday, December 21st, with four morning Christmas Services and a live Christmas Tableau on the church lawn at 7:00 p. m. followed by The Christmas Communion Service at 7:30 p. m. to 9:00 p. m.

Rev. William J. Richards, the pastor, announces that the four morning services will be at 8:00 a. m., 9:15 a. m., 10:30 a. m. and 11:45 a. m. Each service will be of fifty-five minutes duration when Rev. Richards will tell the children's Christmas story, "In Clean Hay." There will be no sermon in as much as children are invited to be with their parents. It has been a traditional custom at First Methodist Church to omit the Church School classes on Christmas Sunday that whole families might worship together.

The five choirs of the church numbering 125 voices will participate in the services. The Primary Children's Choir under the direction of Mrs. Donna Redwood; the Junior and Intermediate Chorus directed by Mrs. Phyllis Mansfield; the Youth Choir directed by Miss Beverly Bell, and the Senior Choir under the supervision of Director of Music, William Mansfield will sing anthems and carols.

Instrumental music will be played on the cello and organ by Mrs. Mary Lee Eliason and Mrs. Adele Thomas. Leading in the Worship Services will be guest associate pastor the Reverend Mr. James C. Braid.

Boy Scout Troop No. 126 will check coats and hats in the dining room while officials of the troop will assist in the parking of cars. The Clarkston police under the direction of Chief, Frank Green will direct the flow of traffic to and from the church.

The services will take place amid the beautiful decorations of wreaths, green roping, candles, and a poinsettia banked altar. A life-size Nativity scene beautifies the dining room, and Christmas chimes have been installed in the tower.

At 7:00 p. m. that evening at the church the youth of the church will lift their voices in carols as the annual tableau is presented on the church lawn under the direction of Miss Beverly Bell, dramatizing the birth of Jesus. Forty young people are expected to participate in this beautiful portrayal.

Following the tableau the Christmas Communion Service will begin in the darkened sanctuary lighted only by the soft glow of many Christmas candles. Members and friends of the congregation may attend the service as they desire up until 9:00 p. m. as it is a continuous communion service with people coming and leaving as they desire. The choirs of the church will provide a choral background of singing. Rev. William J. Richards will officiate at the service and will be assisted by Altar girls, Marlene Smith and Joan Mansfield.

The youth of the church will go caroling throughout the community after receiving communion and will enjoy a social evening afterward at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Edgar Collick on Middle Lake Road.

## STUDIES AT COLOMBIERE START IN JANUARY

In January of 1929 the first group of about 40 novices will move into the new Colombiere College, coming from Milford, outside Cincinnati, Ohio. Later in the year the Juniors, in their 3rd and 4th year of religious training, will move into the new building which has accommodations for 140 scholastics, 20 priests for faculty and administration and 40 Brothers. The men who begin their training at Colombiere College will be the future teachers, preachers and pastors, and administrators of 16 of the Jesuit institutions in the states of Michigan and Ohio. The seminary is located on a 350 acre site 34 miles northwest of Detroit about halfway between Pontiac and Flint just off of Highway 10.

The new College is dedicated to the young Jesuit Father, Blessed Claude Colombiere, confessor of St. Margaret Mary Alacoque who sought his direction concerning the revelations she had received from the Sacred Heart. Claude studied the revelations carefully, judged them genuine, and directed the saint and became engaged himself in the promotion of devotion to the Sacred Heart. He was beatified on June 16, 1929 by Pius XI.

Music Hall manager, William McLaughlin, announces that "South Seas Adventure" now in its 11th week has equalled the business done by any of its Cinerama predecessors and will continue on indefinitely, at the Madison Avenue Playhouse in Detroit.

TEST LIGHT BULBS BEFORE HANGING ON TREE

Detective Captain Glenroy Walker, chief of the fire marshal division of the Michigan State Police, is warning that some foreign made Christmas tree light bulbs being offered for sale have been found defective by American standards and are dangerous fire hazards.

He recommends that they be tested by lighting them before being hung on the tree. Defective bulbs will either short out, burst into flame or give visible indication of overheating during a 10-minute period.

Well known American brand name Christmas tree bulbs usually have the brand name or trademark stamped on them and can be expected to be in accordance with American standard specifications. It was pointed out, however, that only the wiring, not the bulbs themselves, carry the Underwriters Laboratories, Inc., approval.

Not all imported bulbs are hazardous. Some that have been laboratory tested perform equally as well as American standard bulbs.

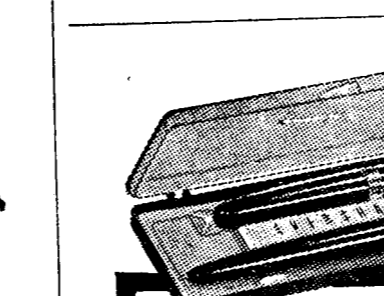


