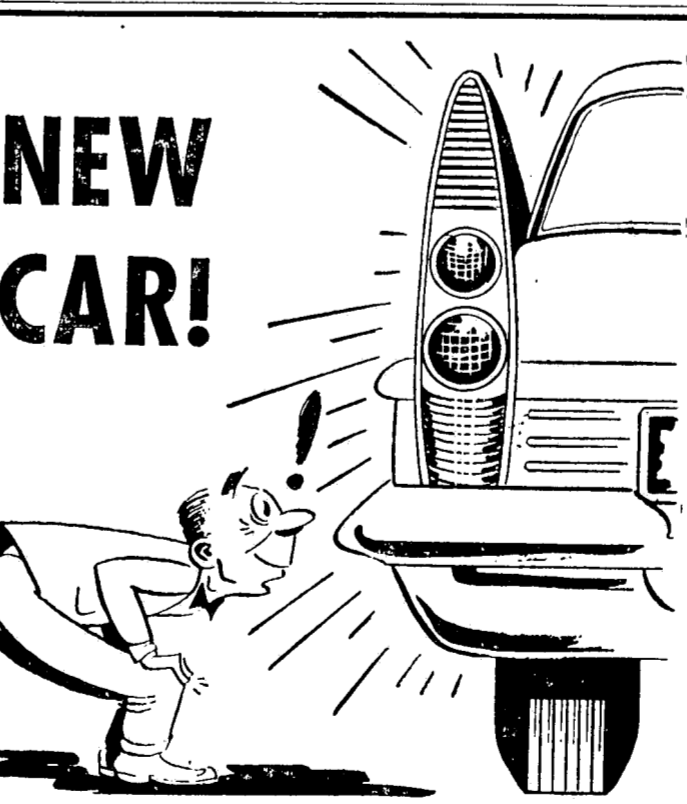

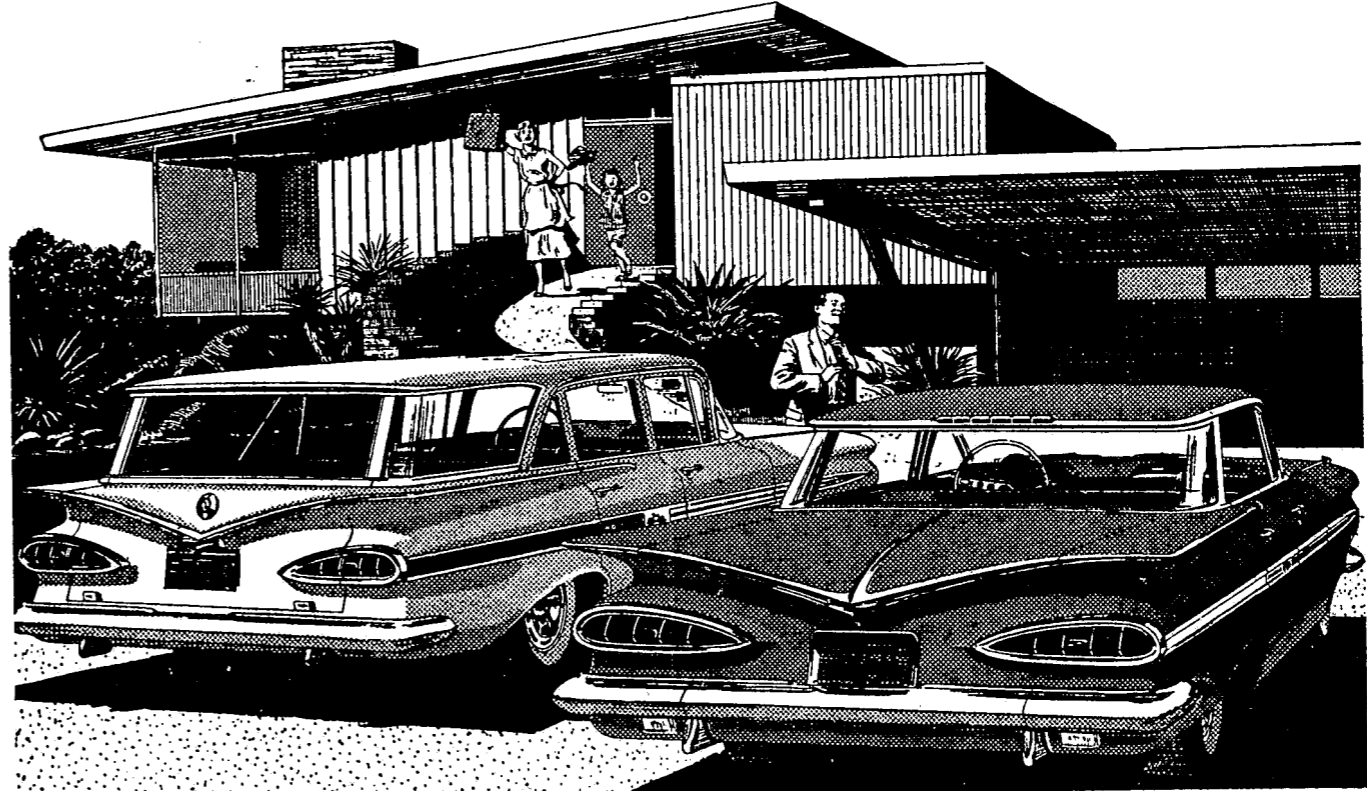


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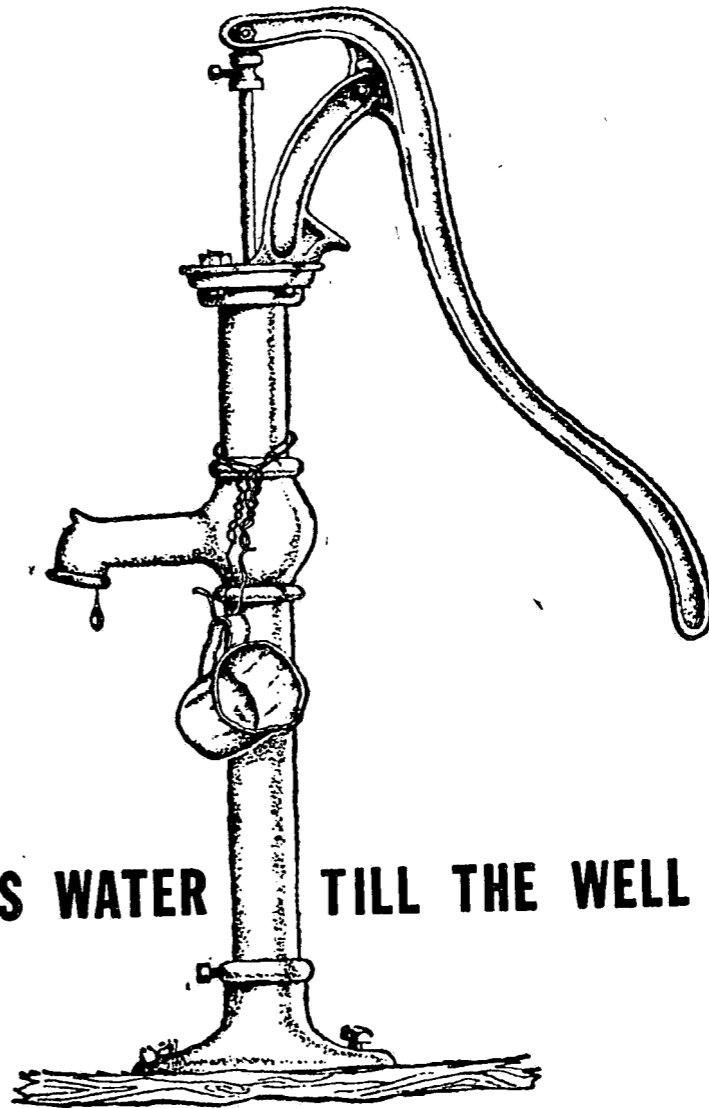

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PROCEEDINGS OF SPECIAL MEETING OF THE INDEPENDENCE TOWNSHIP BOARD HELD DECEMBER 26, 1958.

Meeting called to order by Supervisor Hursfall.  
ROLL CALL: Hursfall, Doebler, Snader, Anthony, and Bauer present.  
Motion by Bauer supported by Anthony that the reading of the minutes of the last meeting be waived and they be approved as printed in The Clarkston News of December 24, 1958. Carried.

Mr. Karkau of the Consumers Power Company was present to request the Board to cancel the Special Election slated to be held January 21, 1959.

The Clerk, Harold Doebler, announced in regard to the special election scheduled to be held on Jan. 21, 1959, which had been called on December 2, 1958 by the Township Board to confirm the grant of a gas franchise to Consumers Power Co. that information had been received that the Attorney General of the State of Michigan has ruled that no such special elections may be held within 60 days before the February 16, 1959 state primary election and, therefore, it would be legally impossible to hold the special election on the date originally scheduled. The Clerk further announced that the Attorney General had also ruled such special elections can be legally held on February 16, 1959, the same day as the State Primary Election.

Mr. Bauer then introduced and moved the adoption of the following resolution, which was supported by Mr. Anthony:

WHEREAS: The Township Board did, upon the 2nd day of December, 1958 adopt an ordinance entitled as follows:

AN ORDINANCE, granting to CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY, its successors and assigns, the right, power and authority to lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges and other public places, and to do a local gas business in the Township of Independence, Oakland County, Michigan, for a period of thirty years, the same being a public utility franchise; and, WHEREAS, the Township Board also upon the 2nd day of December, 1958, did call a special election to be held upon the 21st day of January, 1959, for the purpose of confirming the grant of said ordinance, as required by constitution and statutes of the State of Michigan; and

WHEREAS, information had been received that the Attorney General of the State of Michigan has ruled that no such special elections may be held within 60 days before February 16, 1959 primary election and, therefore, it would be legally impossible to hold the special election on the date it was originally scheduled.  
WHEREAS, it is the desire of the Township Board and Consumers Power Co. that there be no question concerning the validity of said ordinance or the special election confirming the same;  
NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that all action of the Township Board taken on the 2nd day of December, relative to said ordinance and said special election be and is hereby rescinded, and the adoption of said ordinance is hereby revoked, and that the special election ordered to be held on the 21st day of January, 1959 is hereby cancelled;  
RESOLVED FURTHER, that said ordinance should be introduced and adopted by the Township Board, and the necessary resolutions passed to call another special election to confirm the grant of the franchise contained in said ordinance, said special election to be held the 16th day of February, 1959.

The foregoing resolution was adopted by the following vote: AYES: Hursfall, Doebler, Snader, Anthony, and Bauer. NAYES: None.  
The following ordinance was introduced by Bauer and supported by Anthony. (see Legal Notices in Clarkston News and Pontiac Press for the Ordinance in full.)  
The adoption of said ordinance being put to a vote, the same was carried by the following vote:  
AYES: Hursfall, Doebler, Snader, Anthony, and Bauer. NAYES: None.  
Thereupon there was presented to the Board, a communication in the following form from said Consumers Power Co., accepting said franchise:

ACCEPTANCE  
TO THE TOWNSHIP BOARD OF INDEPENDENCE TOWNSHIP, OAKLAND COUNTY MICHIGAN:  
The Consumers Power Company hereby accepts the franchise granted to it by your Board, on the 30th day Decem-

ber, 1958, which said franchise is titled as follows:  
AN ORDINANCE, GRANTING TO CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY, its successors and assigns, the right, power and authority to lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges, and other public places, and to do a local gas business in the Township of Independence, Oakland County, Michigan, for a period of thirty years.  
The undersigned does also hereby request that the question of confirming said franchise be submitted to the electors of said Township at a special election to be called and held in accordance with the law, and such time as the Township Board may determine, and does hereby offer to pay the Township Board such sum of money as shall be sufficient in the opinion of the Board, to defray the expense of such special election. December 30, 1958.

Accompanying the above Acceptance was a duly signed petition signed by fourteen qualified electors requesting a special election on confirming the grant of a franchise, which was received and filed.  
(See Legal Notices, in the Clarkston News and Pontiac Press for the full Notice of said election.) The original papers were filed and now are on file with the Clerk and are hereby made a part of the proceedings of this meeting.

Mr. Robert Anglemier of 4801 Riverview appeared before the board to call their attention to new test track at the eastern part of the Oakland County Sportsman Club property. He stated it was noisy and dangerous to the property owners in the subdivision to the east. The Board decided that the attorney would be asked for an opinion regarding the Township's position relative to regulating or controlling of the use for testing and racing.

Mr. Hursfall read a communication from John W. DeLind, Jr. offering to give the Township all of the peninsula extending into Parke Lake described as all of Outlet A, and part of lot 7 of Assessors Plat of Clarkston for a Wild Life Sanctuary or Park only. Laid. the

matter on the table for further study.

Motion made and supported to adjourn. Carried.

AN ORDINANCE, granting to CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY, its successors and assigns, the right, power and authority to lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services on, along, across and under the highway, streets, alleys, bridges, and other public places, and to do a local gas business in the TOWNSHIP OF INDEPENDENCE, OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN, for a period of thirty years.

SECTION 1. The Township of Independence, Oakland County, Michigan, hereby grants to the Consumers Power Company a corporation authorized to transact business in Michigan, its successors and assigns, hereinafter called the "Grantee," the right, power and authority to lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges, and other public places, and to do a local gas business in the Township of Independence, Oakland County, Michigan, for a period of thirty years.

SECTION 2. In consideration of the rights, power and authority hereby granted, all of which shall vest in the Grantee for a period of thirty (30) years, said Grantee shall faithfully perform all things required by the terms hereof.

SECTION 3. No highway, street, alley, bridge or other public place used by said Grantee shall be obstructed longer than necessary duration of the work of construction or repair, and shall be restored to the same order and condition as when said work was commenced. All of

Grantee's pipes and mains shall be so placed in the highways and other public places as not to unnecessarily interfere with the use thereof for highway purposes.

SECTION 4. Said Grantee shall at all times keep and save the Township free and harmless from all loss, costs and expense to which it may be subjected by reason of the negligent construction and maintenance of the structures and equipment hereby authorized. In case any action is commenced against the Township on account of the permission herein given, said Grantee shall, upon notice, defend the Township and save it free and harmless from all loss, cost and damage arising out of such negligent construction and maintenance.

SECTION 5. The rights, power and authority herein granted, are not exclusive. Either manufactured or natural gas may be furnished hereunder.

SECTION 6. Said Grantee shall from time to time extend its gas distribution system to and within said Township, and shall furnish gas to applicants residing therein whenever the amount of gas to be furnished thereby shall provide an adequate and reasonable return upon the cost of making such extensions and providing such service.

SECTION 7. Said Grantee shall be entitled to charge the inhabitants of said Township for gas furnished therein, the rates, including minimum charges, as approved by the Michigan Public Service Commission, to which Commission or its successors authority and jurisdiction to fix and regulate gas rates and rules relating such service in said Township, are hereby granted for the term of this franchise. Such rates and rules shall be subject to review and change at any time upon petition therefor being made by either said Township, acting by its Township Board, or by said Grantee.

SECTION 8. This ordinance shall cease and be of no effect after thirty days from its adoption, unless within said period the Grantee shall accept the same in writing filed with the Township Clerk, subject to confirmation of the grant hereof by at least a majority of the electors of said Township voting thereon at a regular or special township election to be held in the manner provided by law. Upon the acceptance and confirmation hereof, this ordinance shall constitute a contract between said Township and said Grantee for a period of thirty years from the date of such acceptance.

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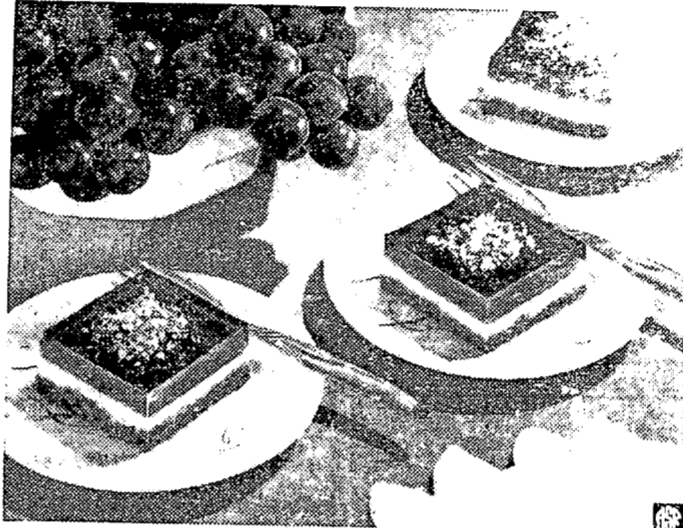

**Grape Gelatin Surprise**

1 package grape-flavored gelatin 1/2 cup butter, melted  
 1 cup hot water 1 package (3 ounces) cream cheese, softened  
 1 cup cold water 2 tablespoons cream  
 1 cup graham cracker crumbs 1/4 cup confectioners' sugar  
 Dissolve grape-flavored gelatin in hot water. Add cold water. Chill until slightly syrupy. Mix graham cracker crumbs with butter. Reserve about 1/3 cup of crumb mixture for garnish. 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**Preparedness for Peace Stressed In First Annual CD Observance**

Remember Pearl Harbor? Most adult Americans do. And they still remember the chill that ran down their spines as radios blared forth the news of the sneak attack on Pearl Harbor. America was plunged into war. Seventeen years after that infamous December 7, Americans have just been reminded by the first annual Civil Defense Day how the chances for peace can be improved through the preparedness of every family and the enemy's knowledge that we are prepared.

IN HAWAII, now well aware of the need for vigilance and preparedness, the Territorial Civil Defense Agency today is ready to help minimize the effects of any future attack with trained manpower. In a tunnel under famed Diamond Head, tons of emergency supplies and a smoothly-functioning control center would provide a nucleus for all civil defense operations in an attack.
