Remember Pearl Harbor? Most adult Americans do. And they still remember the co. chill that ran down their spines as radios blared forth the news of the sneak attack on Pearl Harbor. America was plunged into war. ivil defense, in these Pacific isles as elsewhere, is only as its public support. Preparations for a nuclear attack, or even natural disaster, must be made in advance; afterwards, it is too late.


