"BIG BROTHER WEEK" The annual observance of Big Brother Week, January 11 to

18, was officially announced by Mr. John Sterling, President of Big Brothers of Oakland County, Inc.

In making the announcement Mr. Sterling said, "The Big Brothers are combatting the crime among youth. However, as important as it is to keep boys out of trouble, our primary objective is to help each boy reach his highest physical, mental, emotional and spiritual development. This is done through the understanding and personal guidance of a Big Brother."

The basic philosophy of the Big Brother Movement is "One Man and One Boy" and its slogan is "No Man Ever Stands So Straight As When He Stoops To Help A Boy".

Mr. Sterling said that the Big Brother Association's program of youth counselling in which volunteer men work with boys on an individual basis, is the only one of its kind. Because of this unique "personal touch", he said, it is considered one of the most effective programs in the field of social welfare.

Explaining the service of the Association, Mr. Sterling said that a Big Brother is a volunteer who gives fully of himself to guide and befriend a boy with

Food for Thought



Some 94,587 cords of aspen timber were harvested and skidded out of Michigan's state-owned forests during the 1958 fiscal year which ended June 30. Aside from the aspect of conversion into salable commodities, the cuttings are of two-fold significance. Commercially valueless tops and limbs from these cuttings are left at harvest sites to provide a ready and welcome browse supply for deer. These winter cuttings coincide with the peak season of food scarcity. Revenue from timber sales is pumped into the state treasury for subsequent financing of reforestation programs; pulpwood receipts totaled \$179,863 last year.

problems, a boy who is in need of a mature man's companionship. After careful screening the Big Brother is assigned to a boy whose interests match his own and whose needs can best be met through his friendship.

With the counsel of a professional social work staff always at hand, the Big Brother builds a close and meaningful friendship with the boy.

Mr. Sterling praised the men who have given of themselves in behalf of the youth in Oakland County "and who have helped through Big Brother work, many boys to reach a goal of happy and productive maturity."

Big Brothers of Oakland

County is a non-denominational interracial social agency which covers the entire County of Oakland. It is supported by the United Foundation of Detroit and the United Fund of Pontiac.

At the present time there are 81 active Big Brothers working with 81 boys.

CENSUS BUREAU TO CONDUCT SURVEY

A new survey of consumer plans to buy autos, TV sets, washing machines, and refrigerators will be launched by the Bureau of the Census in January, according to Supervisor John E. Tharaldson of the Bureau's regional field office in Detroit which will participate in the project. The survey is being made for the Federal Reserve Board for use in a national study of consumer buying trends.

These questions will be asked in conjunction with four of the Bureau's regular Current Population Surveys which provide monthly figures on employment

and unemployment in the United States.

The questions asked about TV sets, washing machines and refrigerators will be relatively simple. Respondents will be asked if they own any of the items, when each was purchased and if they plan to purchase one in the next three or six months.

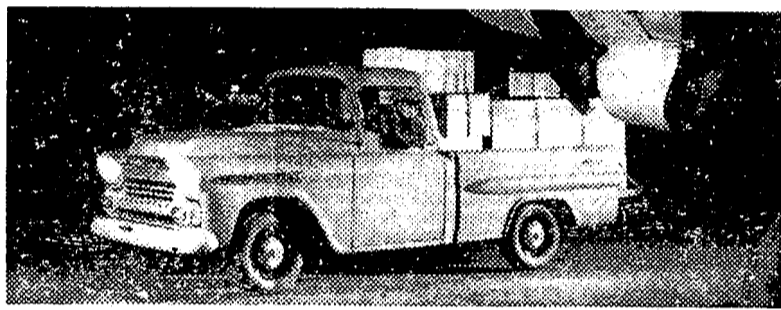
For cars, information will be obtained not only on ownership and buying plans, but also on methods of financing, outstanding indebtedness on the car, and recent repair costs.

Current Population Survey statistics will be collected locally during the week of January 19 by certified enumerators.

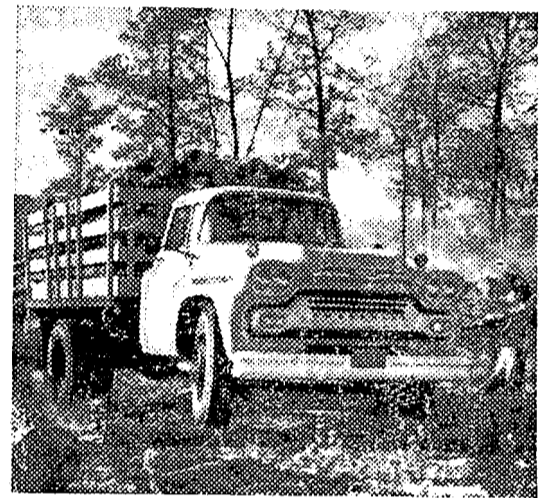

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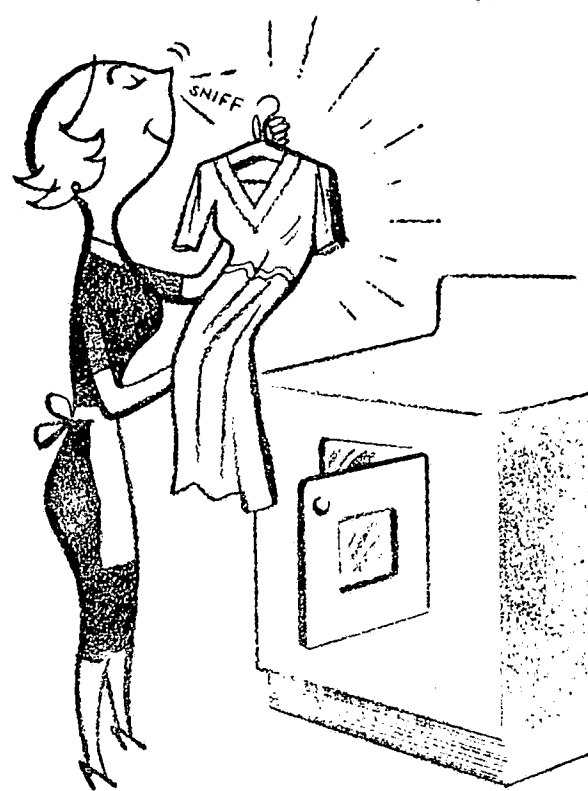

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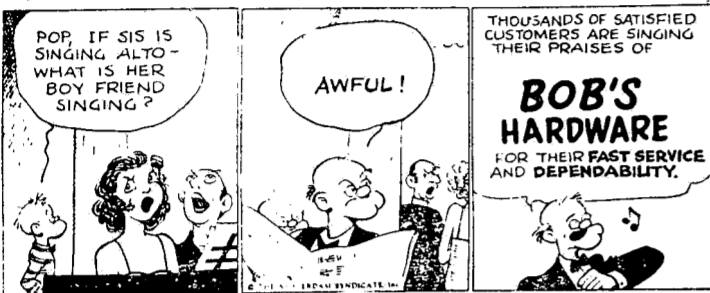

NOTICE is hereby given that a special Village election will be held at the Village Hall, 25 S. Main Street, in the said Village, upon Wednesday, the 25th day of February, 1959, at which there will be submitted to the vote of the electors of the Village the question of ratifying a certain public utility franchise contained in an ordinance adopted by the Village Council at its meeting held upon the 12th day of January, 1959, which said ordinance is entitled as follows:
AN ORDINANCE, granting to CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY its successors and assigns, the right, power and authority to lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges and other public places, and to do a local gas business in the VILLAGE OF CLARKSTON, OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN, for a period of thirty years.
If the date of said election, the polls will be open at 7 o'clock in the forenoon, or as soon thereafter as may be, and will be kept open until 8 o'clock in the afternoon, Eastern Standard Time, when they will be finally closed.
The Village Clerk will be in his office on the 26th day of January, 1959, said date being the thirtieth day, as determined by statute, preceding the date of said election, for the purpose of reviewing the registration, and registering such of the qualified electors of the Village as shall appear and apply therefor, which registration may be made on said date between the hours of 8 o'clock A.M. and 8 o'clock P.M., Eastern Standard Time.

BY ORDER OF VILLAGE COUNCIL.

AN ORDINANCE, granting to CONSUMERS POWER COMPANY, its successors and assigns, the right, power and authority to lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges and other public places, and to do a local gas business in the VILLAGE OF CLARKSTON, OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN, for a period of thirty years.
THE VILLAGE OF CLARKSTON ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. That wherever the word "GRANTEE" appears in this ordinance, it is hereby intended to designate, and shall be held to refer to the Consumers Power Company, a corporation duly authorized to do business in the State of Michigan, its successors and assigns.

SECTION 2. The right, power and authority is hereby granted and vested in said Grantee to lay, maintain and operate gas mains, pipes and services on, along, across and under the highways, streets, alleys, bridges and other public places, and to do a local gas business in the Village of Clarkston, Oakland County, Michigan, for a period of thirty years.

SECTION 3. In consideration of the rights, power and authority hereby granted, all of which shall vest in the Grantee for a period of thirty (30) years as aforesaid, said Grantee shall faithfully perform all things required by the terms hereof.

SECTION 4. No highway, street, alley, bridge, or other public place used by said Grantee shall be obstructed longer than necessary during the work of construction or repair and shall be restored to the same good order and condition as when such work was commenced. No part of the highways, streets, alleys, bridges or other public places of said Village shall be permitted to remain in a dangerous or unsafe condition by reason of anything done or omitted to be done by the Grantee, and it shall be liable for such damage as may be suffered by any person or corporation by reason of its negligence in the use of such highways, streets, alleys, bridges or other public places, and shall be harmless said Village from all damage and liability on account thereof.

SECTION 5. The Grantee shall be entitled to charge the inhabitants of said Village for gas, the rates now on file with the Michigan Public Service Commission and at present effective within said Village. Said rates shall be subject to review and change at any time by the Michigan Public Service Commission or its successors, upon proper application by either said Grantee or the Village, acting by the Village Council, being made thereto, and the regularly filed rates as approved by said Michigan Public Service Commission or its successors, as applicable to said Village of Clarkston, shall at all times be the lawful rates, maintain commercially accurate meters to measure the gas so furnished, and it shall, by its representatives, have at all reasonable times, access to the premises of its customers, for the purpose of reading, inspecting, removing and replacing such meters.

SECTION 6. Said Grantee shall construct and extend its gas distribution system within said Village, and shall furnish gas to applicants residing therein whenever the amount of gas to be furnished thereby shall provide an adequate and reasonable return upon the cost of making such extensions and providing such service.

SECTION 7. The rights and authority herein granted are not exclusive. Either manufactured or natural gas may be furnished hereunder.

SECTION 8. Said Grantee shall, as to all other conditions and elements of service not herein fixed, be and remain subject to the reasonable rules and regulations of the Michigan Public Service Commission or its successors, applicable to gas service in said Village.

SECTION 9. The franchise granted by this ordinance is not subject to revocation, and shall be and become valid and binding only upon its ratification by the affirmative vote of at least three-fifths of the electors of said Village voting hereon at a regular or special municipal election to be held in the manner provided by law. This ordinance shall not be submitted to the electors unless the Grantee shall, within thirty days after the adoption hereof, file with the Village Clerk its written acceptance, subject to ratification by the electors of the Village of Clarkston. Upon the acceptance hereof and the ratification by the electors as aforesaid, this ordinance shall constitute a contract between the Village of Clarkston and the Grantee for the full term of thirty (30) years from and after the date of such ratification by the electors.

We hereby certify that the foregoing ordinance was duly enacted by the Village Council of the Village of Clarkston, Oakland County, Michigan, on the 12 day of January, 1959.
