"The Middle Ear" By H. G. Kobrak **Ready For Public**

Until the time of his death Dr. Heinrich G. Kobrak of Clark ston had interests which extended into many fields, but his work on hearing and the mechanism of the middle ear was most widely known.

Early in his medical training in European schools, Dr. Kobrak agers are invited. began research on the function of the middle ear muscles and after coming to the Otolaryngology laboratory of the University of by the Skee Brothers and their Chicago he continued studies on the function of the sound-conducting mechanism, making use of the middle ear muscle reflexes as an objective measure of hearing. For this work he was awarded the Ph. D., degree by the Department of Physiology.

His investigative work was partly interrupted in the midthirties by the demands of practice and later by military service in World War II. However on returning to civilian life he decided to enter full-time academic work and a half ago. in order to have the time and opportunity for continuing with research in otology

Dr. Kobrak decided that the results of this investigative work and findings were so valuable that they should be passed along to other men and women in the field of medicine — thus the book "THE MIDDLE EAR".

In the Preface, Dr. Kobrak be gins, "The prime ingredient of this book is optimism". This is a guidebook for physicians and surgeons concerned with the treatment of middle ear deafness, and its optimism is richly justified.

Several world-renowned surgeons have contributed chapters to this valuable book. Also the book contains six color plates and 240 black-and-white illustrations.

Dr. Heinrich G. Kobrak received his M.D. degree at the University of Munich in Germany and his Ph.D., at the University of Chicago, where he also engaged in otological research for many years. Prior to his death in November, 1957, he was professor of otological research at the College of Medicine, Wayne State University in Detroit.

ing to L. B. Stuart, manager of the Denver office of Previews, Inc., The National Real Estate sections of Germany under the Clearing House, marketing a-Jack A. Jyleen of Clarkston, Michigan, purchased the property,

which is on the Wind River and has several streams and lakes. The ranch is near the gateways to Teton and Yellowstone Natonal Parks.

There are a main lodge, five guest cabins, and a caretaker's cabin, all of log construction. A barn, corralls and smaller buildings and ten horses are included

in the sale. The main lodge, which was sold furnished, has a 45' X 18' living down on the millage requested room with a native stone Heatilator fireplace, a raftered ceiling
