Broomfield said the proposed aw would also force disclosure of trips on Air Force planes and Navy ships at government expense. All such trips and expenses would be printed in the Federal Register, the official publication reimbursed for expenses MUST

Childhood dreams come true at John F. Ivory's 140-acre estate, 9960 Cooley Lake Road in Milford, about eight miles west of Pontiac.

For that is where the kiddies can enjoy free rides through six miles of wood and roads behind teams of hnadsome, high-stepping ponies. In little more than two years Mr. Ivory has provided free pony rides for approximately 225,000 children — and grown ups, too.

This diversion has become so popular that Mr. Ivory can no longer invite everybody to drop in whenever they feel like it, as he did in his early days on Cooley Lake Road. Now he suggests advance reservations, because the demand for the gratis pony rides is often far greater than his six hitches can accommodate.

"We have never turned down a bona fide request for rides yet, but sometimes we have to ask folks to wait a bit," he says. "We feel that any boy or girl who comes here should have a good, long ride. That takes time. We have accommodated as many as 9.000 guests in a single day - but we have had requests for as many as 23,000 rides in one day."

Mr. Ivory is tickled by the fact that adults show as much fondness for the rides as the children He says that about one-fourth of his passengers are adults - and most of them have never enjoyed pony rides before.
