An inspired way to serve salmon, an old Lenten standby, is borrowed from Italy and adapted to combine the pink-meated king of fish with spaghetti. A rich cream sauce is used to incorporate fish and mushrooms. Serve with crusty bread sticks and a tossed green salad.

SALMON TETRAZZINI

8 tablespoons (1/2 cup) butter 1/2 cup flour 2 cups hot milk 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/s teaspoon pepper

A 1-pound can salmon
1/2 cup cream
1 pound spaghetti
1/2 pound mushrooms, sliced
2 tablespoons butter 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese 1/2 cup bread crumbs

in a saucepan melt the 8 tablespoons butter and stir in the flour. Gradually stir in the hot milk and cook, stirring, until sauce is smooth and thickened. Stir in salt, pepper, nutmeg and sherry. Stir in Ilquid from the can of salmon and cook for 5 minutes, stirring occasionally.

and sherry. Stir in liquid from the can or samon and cover to the cream.

Cook spaghett! In rapidly bolling salted water until tender and drain. Saute mushrooms I the 2 tablespoons butter for 5 minutes, or until lightly browned. Mix half the sauce with the spaghett! and mushrooms and pour into a baking dish or deep platter. Make a hole in the center of the spaghett!. Mix remaining sauce with the salmon, flaked, and pour into the hole in the center of the spaghett!. Sprinkle with cheese mixed with bread crumbs and brown lightly in a 350° F. oven for 15 to 20 minutes. Serves 4.
