ELECTRICAL WEEK FETES YOUNG SCIENTISTS

Outstanding high school science students will tour Southeastern Michigan electrical installations during Electrical Week, February 8-14, it was announced today by John O'Rourke, District Manager of Westinghouse Electric Supply Company and chairman of this year's celebration.

On February 11, the 112th anniversary of Thomas A. Edison's birth, the students visited the Enrico Fermi Atomic Power Plant at Monroe, and Edison's original Menlo Park Laboratory and other exhibits at Greenfield Village.

Designated as "Science Youth Day", this is part of the 3rd International Celebration of Edison's birthday which was sponsored locally by the Engineering Society of Detroit.

4-H Club members will be guests of Detroit Edison on February 14 at three of the company's power plants.

Electrical safety will be discussed in the schools and students will receive a simple home electrical inspection form.

All segments of the electrical industry - manufacturers, distributors, contractors, inspectors, dealers and power suppliers are taking part in the observance, according to O'Rourke.

This year's slogan is "Electricity Builds Jobs". In recent estimates the American electrical industry in 1959 is measured at approximately 40 billion dollars - 14 in wages and salaries to its millions of employees and 26 billion dollars in goods and services.

Climax of the observance for the industry will be reached on February 12 when the Electrical Association of Detroit sponsors a dinner dance at the Sheraton-Cadillac. Speaker of the evening will be Kenneth Haagensen, Director of Public Relations for Allis Chalmers.

Appliance dealers will observe the week with special displays and special prices on electric appliances. Contractors will exhibit the Electrical Week emblem and give free HOUSEPOWER

ratings to homeowners, O'Rourke said. HOUSEPOWER is a term meaning the ability of a home's electrical system to supply all the electricity required by lights and appliances. A HOUSEPOWER Rating includes inspection of wiring, outlets, switches and fuse box. The electrical contractor also recommends what is necessary to make the system adequate for present and future needs. The Electrical Association of Detroit estimates at least 80 per cent of the homes in this area do not have proper, modern wiring.


