WSU OFFERS SIX NURSING GRANTS

Six scholarships for students who wish to study nursing will be available at Wayne State University during the 1959-60 academic year. Dean Katharine Faville of the College of Nursing has announced.

High school graduates and college students in the Detroit-area can apply for five Helen Newberry Joy Scholarships. A College of Nursing Alumni Association Scholarship is available to students throughout Michigan.

D. A. R. CHAPTER EMPHASIZES AMERICANISM

Along with the hurried and flurried lives that we Americans lead and in a period of wondering if we are losing some of the ideas of our republic and democratic tenets, here is proof that we have not lost all.

This historian of the General Richardson Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution has learned of some very worthwhile public activities. These promote patriotism and further education along historical lines. We are thinking now chiefly of mediums of public schools and public libraries.

The D. A. R. is primarily a patriotic organization and we are proud to be Revolutionary descendants, but we don't live entirely in the past. We are also much concerned with issues of the day and are vitally aware of the terrible urgency and need of being good and loyal Americans. These are reasons why this reporter most happily learned recently what our children are learning and doing under expert teaching by qualified instructors, the teachers and librarians.

Area schools, Pontiac and townships have curriculums which embrace courses in History and civics. They study the Constitution of the United States, the Bill of Rights, Gettysburg Address and biographies of great Americans. After the learning process the students preserve their knowledge in dramatics, essays, posters and the like. Their ingenuity in creative writing and skill at artistic illustrations are truly commendable.

At a recent meeting of the D. A. R. was an exhibit of twenty essays on topic What Freedom Means to Me. These essays were composed by Junior American Citizens, fourth through sixth grades. Essays were in prose and in rhyme, well written in contents and in good penmanship. Other students had submitted booklets on biography of Theodore Roosevelt, 1959 being his centennial year and February being history month. This material is now on display in the Pontiac Glass Company on W. Lawrence Street.

There are historical books on the shelves of Clarkston and Keego Harbor libraries. All good schools have helps to the children and special studies and activities prepared by students and teachers.

One very enthusiastic Clarkston High School boy, Terry Kelly, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Kelly, told of his most enjoyable class study of the history of Michigan. In Junior High they enjoy movies, especially of the Army and Navy. Currently their work is about World Wars I and II. Special reference is that of following book reviews on different phases of the wars given by the boys and girls.

We have found that most areas have a constantly growing reserve of books and pamphlets and of teaching aids. They have children's reading rooms and the assistance of kind librarians.

There is a growing story-telling club of women in our county who do a very good work quietly and efficiently. Yes, we are cheered at the evidences of our youth looking into our past and toward our future. We are gratified that there are many of their elders who are glad to help them help themselves. What the future will bring no one knows, but we do know it will be in the hands of these bright, interested and loyal young Americans. We thank them and we trust them. — Agnes Hilton

WITNESSES PLAN SPECIAL PROGRAM

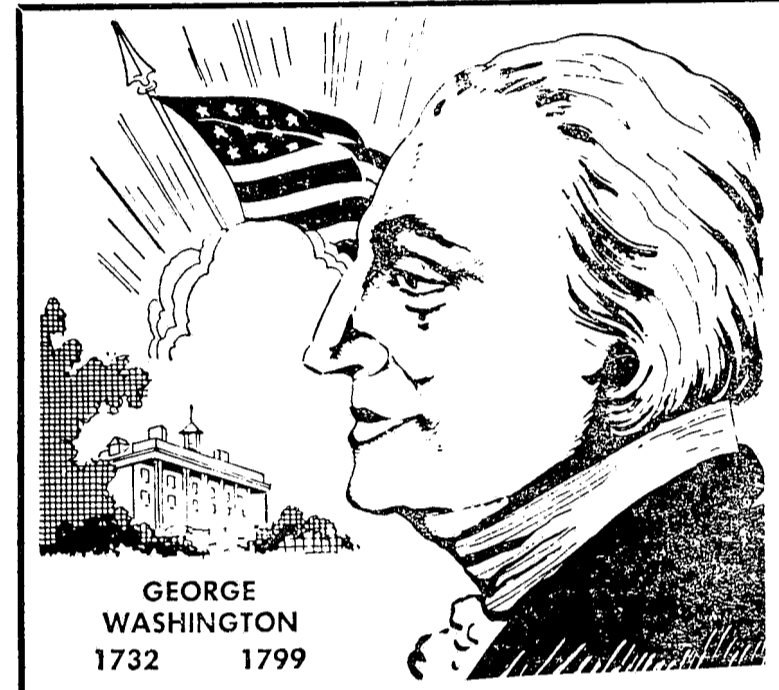
