Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie will officially open the Highway Department's new District 9 office at Pontiac on March 10, with a few, brief remarks before highway personnel, contractors and public officials from the three counties—Oakland, Macomb and St. Clair—in the district. An "open house" is planned at the new building at 926 Featherstone Ave., from 2:00 to 4:00 P. M. The new building has 6,400 square feet of space for the 40 personnel assigned to the office. Formerly, District 9 personnel shared office space with District 10 personnel at Department's Redford office. Overcrowded facilities at the Redford office caused the shift. This new building, built expressly for lease to the Highway Department, is the first of the 10 district offices designed solely for the Department's use.

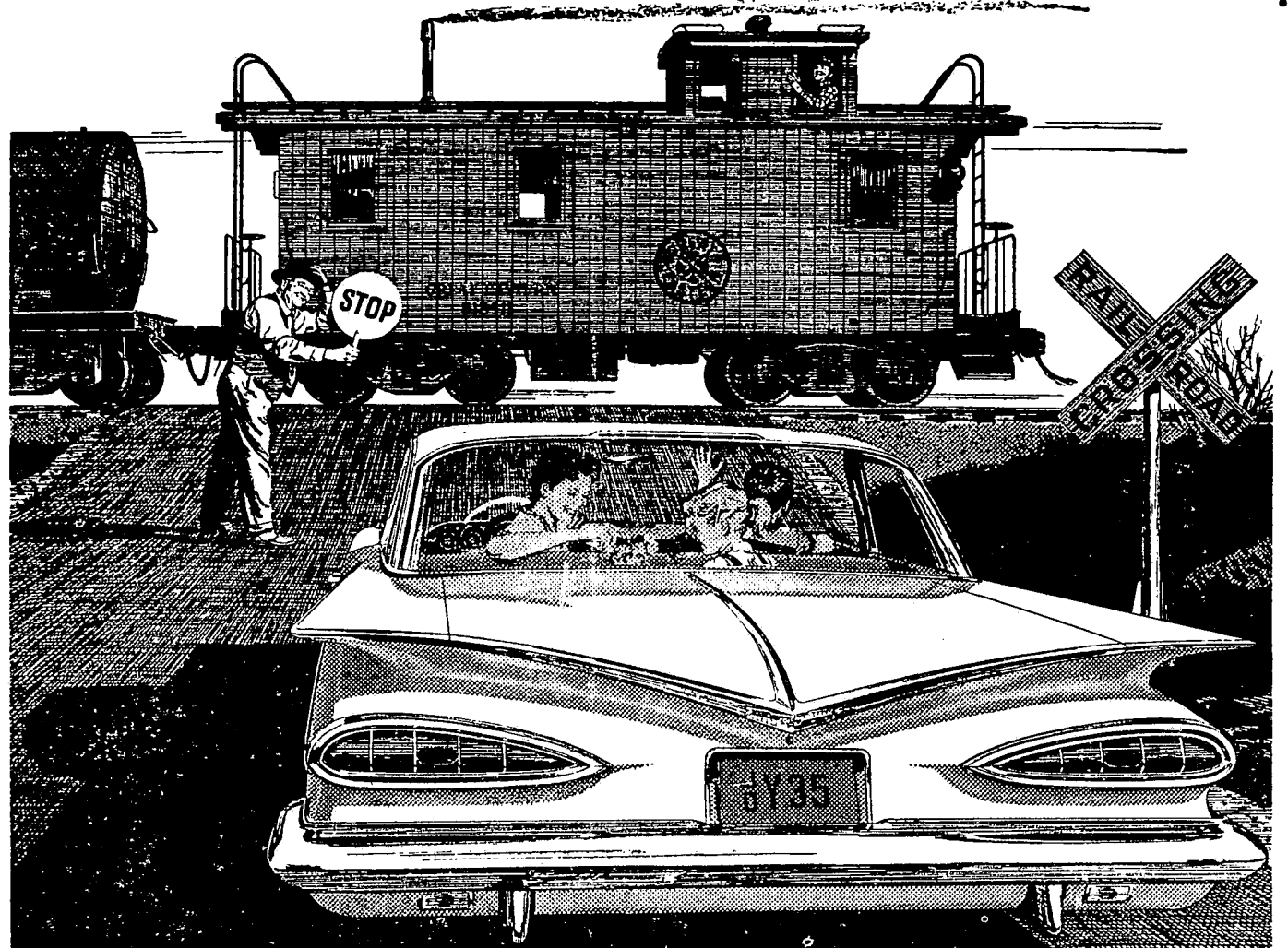

FOOD NEEDED FOR HUNGRY DEER

The Lower Peninsula's starving deer and the public's concern about them called 50 conservation department workers to a meeting in Roscommon on February 24. Subject of the get-together was how to help groups of sportsmen, Boy Scouts, school children and others who are showing an unprecedented interest in tree-cutting projects for hunger-stricken whitetails. It was pointed out that groups planning cutting projects should notify the conservation district headquarters in the area of their choice in advance of their trip. All possible assistance will be given them. They will get advice on what types of trees to cut, how to cut them and most important, where to cut them. Cutting without permission is against the law on either state or private land. Groups should understand, it was said, that cutting trees for deer food is not a "one-shot job;" that repeated cutting in an area is essential. "If you cut food just once, and don't go back, it's worse than no cutting at all," said a veteran game biologist. "A single cutting will attract deer, they'll clean it up in a hurry, and may stay there to starve," he said. I. H. Bartlett, Department deer

authority, pointed out that timber cutting is not the solution to the deer starvation problem, but it does help. "It is an expedient that could mean the vital difference of a week or two of life at the end of winter," he said. Basic reason for the present condition of the herd is the deer range, according to Bartlett. "Actually our deer food is in worse shape than the deer. Deer can recover quicker than their food supply," he added. Only real answer to the problem, he said, is to prevent large scale starvation by taking more antlerless deer each hunting season. For those planning tree-cutting trips, these suggestions were made at the meeting: Take a com-

pass, and know how to use it. Chocolate bars are quick sources of energy and are most welcome after slogging through deep and crusted snow. Snowshoes are a necessity. Don't go into the woods alone. Don't over exert yourself.

YOUNG REPUBLICANS TO HEAR JOHN MARTIN

Mr. John Martin, Republican National Committee man, will be the guest speaker, March 10th, when the Young Republicans of Oakland County hold their meeting at the Republican Headquarters, 351 N. Woodward Birmingham at 8:00 p.m.

John Martin has a broad ground in politics and government. In 1948 he was elected Senator from Grand Rapids and Kent County and served in the Michigan Senate until his election as Auditor General in 1950, which office he held for four years. In 1956 he was the Republican candidate for Secretary of State. He was elected Republican National Committee man in 1957 to serve until 1960.

Born in Grand Rapids in 1909, he graduated from public school in that city and later from Dartmouth and Oxford Universities. He received his law degree at the University of Michigan. He is presently a partner in the law firm of Harrington, Waer, Cary & Martin.

During World War II, he helped organize and served as deputy director of the National Office of Civil Defense in Washington. He later was commissioned in the Navy and assigned to secret service work in Europe. After the war, he served on the United States prosecutor's staff at the War Criminal Trials in Nurnburg. Upon his discharge from the Navy as a Lieutenant Commander in 1946, he returned to Grand Rapids to practice law. Martin is President of the Kent County Mental Health Center, projects chairman of the Michigan Crime and Delinquency Council, Chairman of the Michigan Legislative Advisory Council on Problems of the Aging, President of the Grand Rapids Rotary Club, a member of the American, Michigan, and Grand Rapids Bar Associations. He is also an American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, AMVETS, the Grange and the Farm Bureau. Mr. Martin was married in 1934. He has four children and lives in Grand Rapids.

After Mr. Martin's talk there will be a question and answer period and a social hour to give the new members a chance to get acquainted.

EXPECTANT PARENT CLASSES

Expectant Parent Classes are again being offered in Oakland County for future fathers and mothers. The series of classes are taught by public health nurses and are sponsored by the Oakland County Medical Society, the Oakland County Department of Health and various Adult Education Departments.

These classes have become increasingly popular throughout the County. In 1954, two series of six classes each were offered. From September, 1958, through May, 1959, twenty series, eight classes in a series are being conducted at the four offices of the Oakland County Department of Health.

Attendance is limited to a maximum of twenty-six people, to provide ample opportunity for discussion. Classes begin at 7:30 p.m. and end at 9:30 p.m. Films and other audio-visual aids are used to highlight certain topics; a conducted hospital tour is arranged during each series. Topics covered during the series include the mental health of the family unit; growth and development of the baby prior to labor and delivery and care and feeding of the infant.
