We use the library regularly for this purpose."

Mrs. Kreger added, "The library is important to the family; to teaching us more about our religion, about hobbies, and the ways of other people.'

Among its services, the library is currently providing religious books to churches requesting them for Lenten readings and studies for their members.







#### MANY DEER KILLED BY DOGS

Despite thawing temperatures last week, Michigan's starvationplagued deer herd remained confined to deeryards in most areas. Additional starved deer were found in four of the northern

lower peninsula's five districts while several deer losses were reported in Baraga district of the upper peninsula.

Indications point to heavy star vation losses in Gaylord, Mio, and Gladwin districts.

Dogs are creating a major problesm in Baldwin, Gladwin and Traverse City districts and southern lower peninsula counties. The total number of deer killed by dogs is unknown but reported kills have mounted to 121 in the northern lower penin-

The Conservation Department urges dog owners to keep their animals tied up and points out that owners, whose dogs are caught killing deer, are liable to \$100 fine and/or 90 days in jail. Land owners, who catch dogs harassing deer on their property and law enforcement officers are authorized to shoot the animals.
