Red Cross Nursing Service Marks 50th Anniversary

Red Cross nursing has its roots in the battlefields of the Crimean War of 1855, some 54 years before American Red Cross Nursing Services was formally organized on May 5, 1909.

four great pioneer leaders in care of the sick injured and wounded: Florence Nightingale, founder of emergency nursing services.

Henri Dunant founder of Red Cross and originator of the Geneva Conventions. In 1872, he said the work of Florence Nightingale in the Crimea inspired his work on the battlefields of Solferino during the Italian War of 1859.

Clara Barton, founder of the American Red Cross. Her work with the wounded during the Civil War won her praise as "a gifted amateur before there were professionals."

Jane A. Delano, volunteer nurse during the 1888 yellow fever epidemic in Jacksonville, Florida.

Today, more than 58,000 professional nurses are enrolled for Red Cross service in disaster relief, home nursing and volunteer nurse's aid instruction.

Broomfield said today he has been informed by Congressman Wayne N. Aspinall, chairman of the House Interior and Insular Affairs Committee, that only a "very small percentage" of land

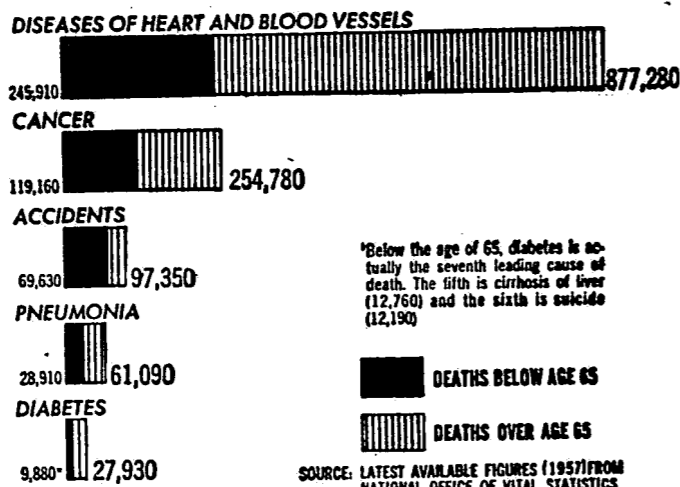

homesteaded in Alaska is actually farmed on a continuing basis.

Less than 20,000 acres in the entire newest and largest state is being harvested for crops.

In addition, Aspinall told Broomfield that complaints against "land agents" and "land locaters" who charge fees to assist persons in applying for public lands are becoming widespread, and that new laws will be proposed to control this practice.

Broomfield has urged the committee to tighten up our Nation's homestead laws so that they are "brought up to date."

Some homesteaders are attempting to use their land for

subdivision or resale, rather than for farming purposes, said Broomfield. In some cases, homesteaders can acquire title to government land by living on it for seven months and cultivating one eighth of the land they seek.

Aspinall told Broomfield that his suggestion to enlarge the existing 160-acre limit on homesteads might run into difficulty. He said the present acreage limit has had "such a long history in the Western States and Alaska and is so firmly entrenched that a clear-cut showing undoubtedly would be needed to enlarge it."

On another of Broomfield's recommendations to provide for the establishment of new com-

munities in Alaska, Aspinall said that the Interior Department is expected to propose such legislation soon.

The changes would make it easier for the Federal government to sell public land for industrial, urban and suburban purposes.

Broomfield also urged the House Agriculture Committee to provide a "more flexible" surplus food distribution program not only for Alaska homesteaders, but also for residents of other states. "We think nothing of giving away large amounts of surplus food to foreign countries," he said. "It's about time we started taking care of our own and provided more of our surplus food to those who need it."

Storage and interest charges alone on our Nation's farm subsidy program are costing \$1,000,000,000 (billion) a year, said Broomfield. "With many of our surplus crops lost through

rot and decay, we should see that this food is put to good use."

AIR FORCE NEEDS MORE YOUNG MEN

"The Air Force Pilot will never be replaced by guided missiles," said Major General Edwin S. Ligon Jr., in charge of the U.S. Air Force Recruiting Service. "At least not in the foreseeable future. The missile will not replace the pilot, it will only aid him in the event we are attacked."

General Ligon readily admits that the Air Force has an increasing need for Pilots and Navigators because many of the flying personnel now on active duty are WW II veterans and will be retiring within the next five years.

"We must fill these vacancies with younger men," said General Ligon "otherwise, how can we

hope to maintain our aerial supremacy?"

Many young men shy away from the Air Force because they believe that there is little future as a pilot or a navigator. This attitude is reasonable, but it is far more reasonable to believe that the unmanned missile is a transitory stage preceding space craft. Therefore, the future offered the young pilot and navigator of tomorrow has a broader scope than ever before.

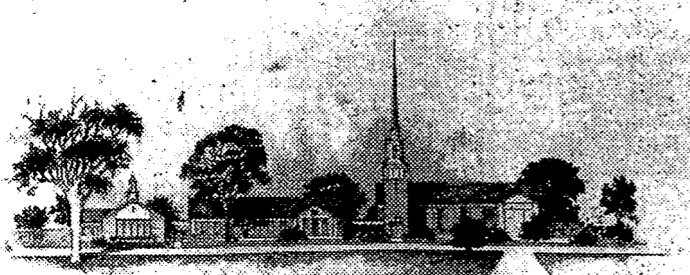

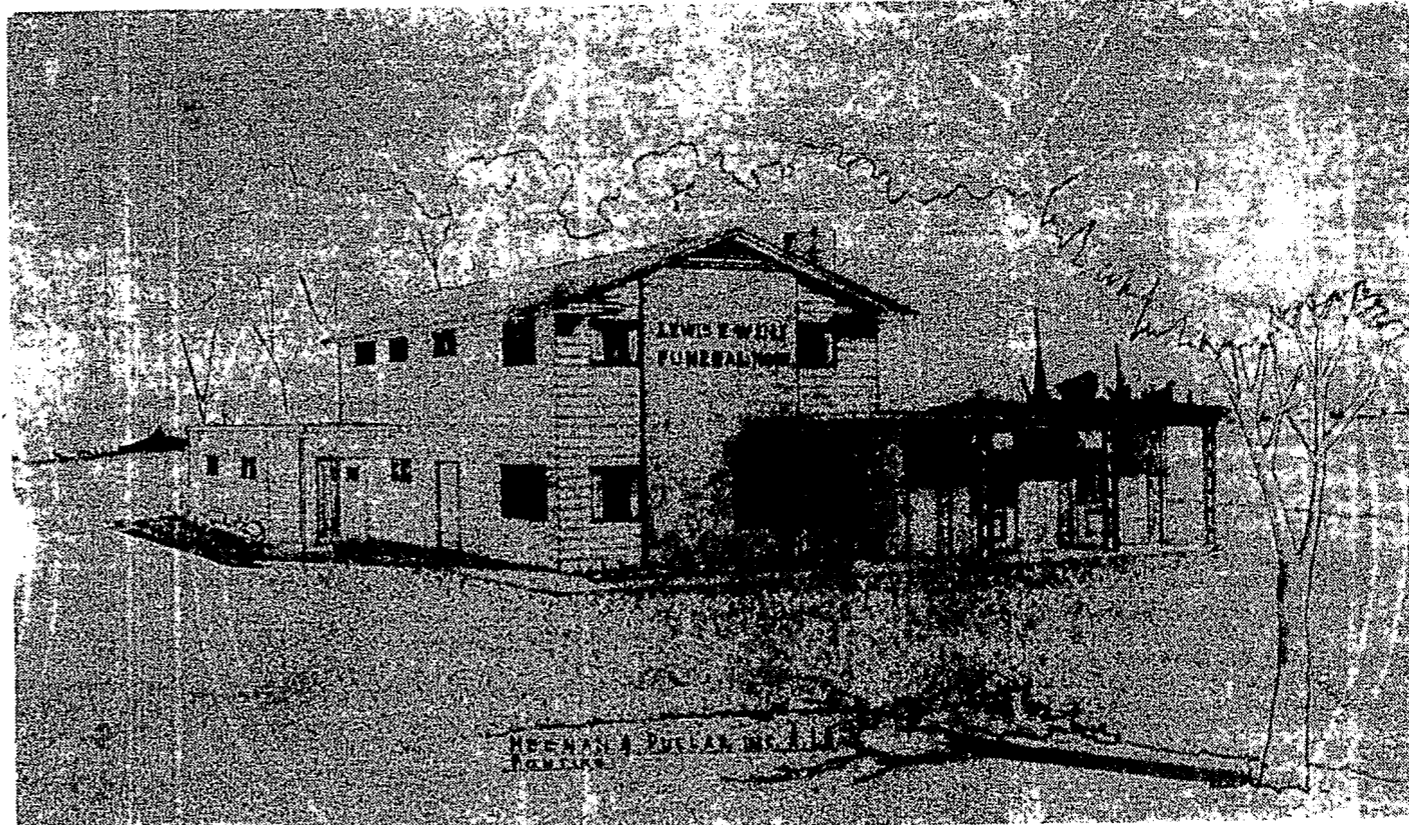

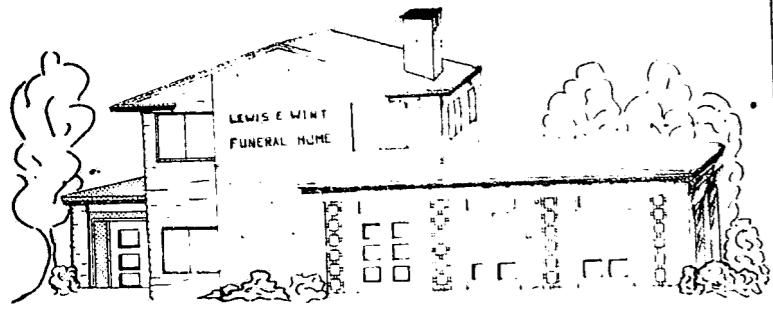

"March 23 this year corresponds with Nisan 14 of the calendar used by the Jewish nation in Jesus' day," Mr. Strong explained. "It is the anniversary of the betrayal and death of Christ."

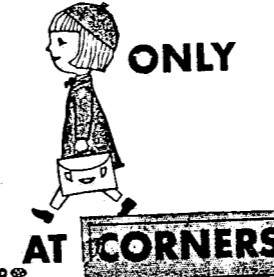
Curley Tables His Motion

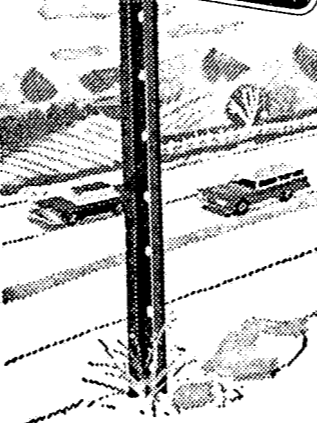

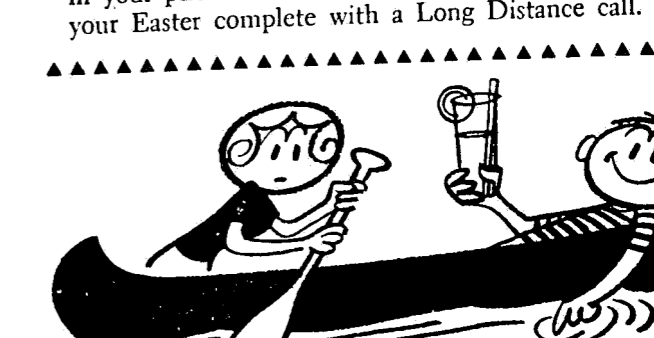

CINERAMA CELEBRATES SIXTH ANNIVERSARY IN DETROIT

In Detroit as in other cities in the country, Cinerama has become big business.

In the face of continued Hollywood skepticism and varied competition the Cinerama productions go merrily along establishing record grosses at the boxoffice and rolling up high attendance figures.

The Music Hall Theatre in Detroit, one of the 15 theatres in the United States showing Cinerama pictures, has sold tickets to more than five million people since opening March 23, 1953.

Celebrating its sixth anniversary in Detroit, this week, the current Music Hall offering, "South Seas Adventure," has had a terrific spurt in attendance since Hawaii has become the newest state. A major part of the production was filmed in the Hawaiian Islands.

Across the nation the Cinerama houses maintain a steady place among top money makers listed each week by Variety, the show business record keeper. The first two Cinerama productions, one with four years of limited showing (in Cinerama theatres only), the other with two, moved into the first 10 of all time money makers in motion picture history. "Gone With The Wind" still holds first place but that film has been playing 17 years.

The Cinerama presentations, five now showing and one more in preparation, have received many citations. The wide screen film is the first and only picture to be honored by Congress, cited and read into the Congressional Record for a "notable contribution to the United States foreign policy in the Near East."

The chambers of Commerce in cities with Cinerama theatres have cited frequently the pictures influence in bolstering local economies. Showtrains, but excursions and groups coming from within a 200 mile radius of Detroit have contributed many hundreds of thousands of dollars in downtown expenditures here.

Frank Upton, Cinerama mid-west division manager has arranged a program of entertainment for the sixth birthday performance on Monday, March 23 starting at 8 p. m., and has engaged Maurice Guilmet and his Royal Hawaiian Orchestra and hula dancers. A six year old "Junior Miss Cinerama" and "Junior Mr. Cinerama" will officiate as official hosts and will snip the ribbon in front of the Music Hall Theatre doors; also cut the 6 foot high birthday cake and greet the mayors and city managers of 20 Greater Detroit area communities who will attend with their families.

Tickets for the birthday performance, at no advance, are now on sale at the boxoffice, or can be ordered by mail.

VETERANS ADVISED TO PAY GI LOANS ON TIME

Despite what some veterans may believe, there is no grace period for the late payment of installments on GI loans, Lloyd H. Jameson, Manager of the VA Regional Office in Detroit, said today.

Thus, he added, veterans should make their GI loan payments on or before the date they are due.

Failure to do so may prove costly, he pointed out, since GI lenders may make an extra service charge when payments are received late.

Mr. Jameson warned that veterans who gain the reputation of being "chronic delinquents" will find their lenders taking that fact into account if the veterans should ever need an extension of repayment time on their GI loans.

In addition to their loss of credit standing, veterans who become delinquent in their payments may ultimately be faced with the loss of the property acquired with their GI loans.
