The proposal for public operation requests funds "not to exceed one mill", in accordance with the wording of the Michigan State Library Law. If the proposal passes, members of the present library board say that a budget for no more than onehalf mill would be submitted in December, 1959, for the following year. This means that about 80 cents per \$1,000 equalized valuation would be sufficient to provide full time library service.

If the porposal passes, the library would be supervised by a Seal Societies, he stated, 'are one public library board.
