TRAINING OPPORTUNITIES AVAILABLE TO VETERANS

GI Bill training opportunities are available to World War II and Korean War veterans whose military discharges have been

changed from "dishonorable," and the like to "honorable." Lloyd H. Jameson, VA's Regional Office Manager in Detroit, announced today. Under the law World War II veterans whose discharges have been changed have four years to start training under the World War II GI Bill. Korean War veterans will have three years to begin training under the Korean GI Bill. Mr. Jameson explained that one of the basic requirements of both GI Bills is a discharge under conditions other than dishonorable. In some instances the branches of service have reviewed less-than-honorable discharges and have changed them to honorable, whenever the facts warranted the change. But very often these new honorable discharges came too late for veterans to make use of their new-found GI training opportunities, since their deadlines for starting training had passed. Mr. Jameson said that eligible veterans may apply for GI training at any VA office. Along with their applications, they should include a photostat or certified true copy of their new honorable discharge certificate.

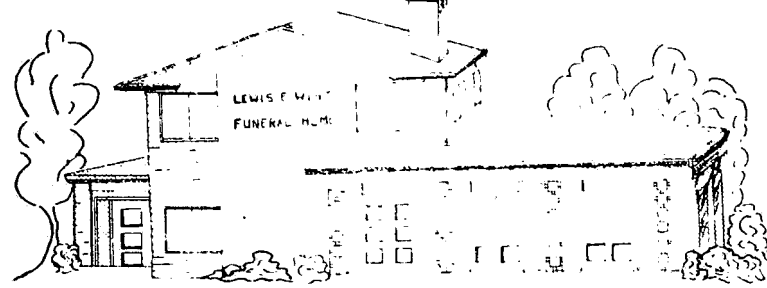

LARGE CROWD AT WITNESSES' CONVENTION

One hundred and ten Clarkston and Drayton Plains residents were among the 1682 who attended the semi-annual convention of Jehovah's Witnesses from Eastern Michigan, Friday through Sunday at Port Huron, Michigan, according to Mr. W. P. Strong, local presiding minister.

The theme of the assembly, "Be a Teacher of the Good News", was emphasized by talks and demonstrations on Bible sermons to the householder and conducting home Bible Studies. The highlight of the convales was Sunday when Peter D'Mura, Watchtower official from New York headquarters of Jehovah's Witnesses, spoke on "A Paradise Earth Through God's Kingdom".

"A park-like paradise not an atomic waste, is the real outlook for man's home, the good earth", D'Mura said, under compulsion of fear, men and nations feverishly prepare to make an atomic 'no man's land' of earth, while Jehovah God, moved by love and justice, is gathering earth's sheep-like persons together into safety before he shortly destroys the earth.

"This is Armageddon", said D'Mura. "God's judgment against wickedness and misuse of earth. So God removes trouble-makers from earth and leaves the sheep-like ones to dwell under the literal rule of God's Kingdom on an earth filled with paradise conditions."

At a mass baptism Saturday 50 were immersed, including five from Drayton Plains. Mr. Strong said those baptized will join the teaching fellowship of Jehovah's Witnesses.

Mr. Strong was on the program Friday evening in a discussion on the Bible book of Mark. He also served on the Publicity Committee. Others locally who served were Frank Woods, Ushering Committee, and Louis Biles, Baptism Committee.





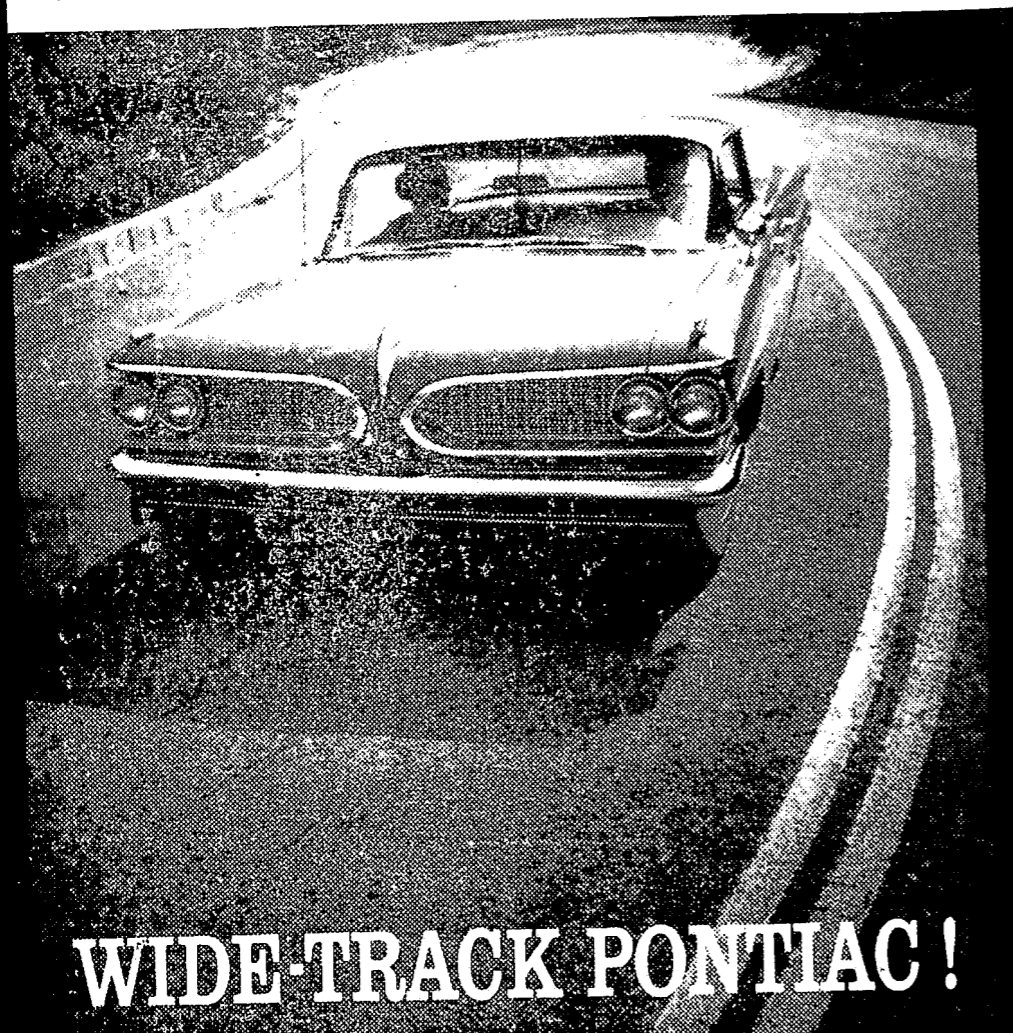
